

Solons Move to Bar Reds from A-Scholarships

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—Aroused senators moved today to bar communists from atomic scholarships and to hold a public investigation into the disappearance of a tiny cylinder of uranium-235.

There was nothing to indicate that communists had anything to do with the disappearance, but Chairman McMahon (D-Conn.) of the senate-house committee on atomic energy said:

"Quite frankly, there are several aspects of the matter with which I am not satisfied and which obviously need vigorous attention."

He announced he would propose a public hearing into the incident, which occurred at the Argonne national laboratory in Chicago.

Meantime senators shot angry questions at David E. Lilienthal over the award of federal money to communist students and told him flatly it was not to stop.

Lilienthal is chairman of the atomic energy commission.

Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) served the warning on Lilienthal at a heated session of the senate appropriations subcommittee which is considering the AEC's request for \$1,090,000,000 to spend in fiscal 1950.

Lilienthal agreed, but registered opposition to having an FBI check on students receiving government-subsidized scholarships who are not given access to secret information.

Flying Boat Lifts 308 Men

SAN DIEGO, Calif., May 19 (AP)—The giant Marshall Mars navy flying boat—with a record load of 308 men—landed here this afternoon on a flight from the naval air station at Alameda, Calif.

The huge plane carried 301 passengers—plus seven crewmen. The total is 308 greater than any previous record load. A sister-ship, the Caroline Mars, carried the previous record load of 269 passengers on a flight from San Diego to Alameda March 4.

Gen. Clay Given Hero's Welcome

NEW YORK, May 19 (AP)—Gen. Lucius D. Clay got a roaring hero's welcome today from 250,000 New Yorkers.

Ticket tapers and torn paper floated down on the former American military governor of Germany as he rode up Broadway in an open car.

Police said a quarter of a million persons lined the route from the Battery to City Hall.

Labor Party to Purge Commies

LONDON, May 19 (AP)—Britain's labor (socialist) party ordered its entire membership of more than 5,000,000 today to purge itself of any fellow traveling with communists.

Simultaneously party leaders in parliament sharply ordered an end of labor rebellions against communist policy.

The crack down followed the explosion from the party yesterday of two left members of parliament, Kenneth Zilliacus and L. J. Solley, for persistently heckling British policy toward Soviet Russia.

There was a ban on fellow traveling and on rank and file party members as well as party officials and members of parliament.

Requests for Berry Pickers Start Monday

Strawberry pickers by the hundreds will be needed in Salem area berry patches next week.

This was the word Thursday from William H. Baillie, manager of the local state employment office, already had orders from growers for 200 pickers starting Monday.

Baillie predicted that up to 10,000 persons will be picking berry by the end of next week, including growers' families and neighbors. Need for adult pickers is unusually strong at this time, because the strawberries will be ripe in a week or two before school children are out on vacation.

Of the 200 pickers to be placed through the Ferry street employment office, about half will be trucked to fields at 6 a.m. daily, starting Monday, and the others will be referred by telephone to places where pickers are needed. Prospective pickers may call the office at 3-9288.

Stone Crushes Bend Woman

BEND, May 19 (AP)—A Bend woman who went into the country to gather flagstones for her garden was killed today by one of the stones.

A rock crashed off a cliff upon Mrs. Robert H. Douglas, 33, as she was clambering up the cliffside examining the stones. The impact knocked her 20 feet down the cliff and fractured her skull.

A friend, Mrs. Sterling Sorbenson, summoned help, but rescuers found Mrs. Douglas dead.

E.O. Pond Win Poster Contest

Bids Opened on Sewer Line

Empire Construction Co., Portland, submitted a low bid of \$69,948 today on constructing a sewer line from Fairview home to the state tuberculosis hospital and to Hillcrest school. The work will require about five months.

Acheson Leaves On Cautious Note

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—An eve of his departure for the Paris Big Four conference, Secretary of State Acheson sternly declared tonight he would refuse to "barter away" to Russia successes already scored by the west in rebuilding a democratic Germany.

He warned the American people against "the luxury of either undue pessimism or premature optimism" as to the outcome of the new east-west talks.

Becomes Man When Offered Choice of Sex

YONKERS, N. Y., May 19 (AP)—A slender, dark-haired woman of 23 has been changed into a man at her own request, Yonkers professional hospital said today.

A change of sex operation disclosed the young woman also had characteristics of a man.

Asked whether she would rather be a man or a woman, the patient replied:

"I'd rather be a man."

From Joan to John

The hospital did not disclose the patient's name. Doctors called her "Joan" before the series of sex-altering operations and "John" afterwards.

Since birth, doctors said, Joan considered herself a girl. She dressed as one and was graduated from high school as a girl. She worked as a woman secretary, they added.

A stomach ailment led her to consult a surgeon who discovered her dual sex. He performed a series of operations that began two weeks ago. He was assisted by two others. All declined use of their names.

Wears Male Clothing

After the operations, the hospital said the patient's hair was trimmed in masculine fashion and he changed from dresses to male clothing.

The patient, with a boyish 135-pound figure of medium height, was described as having been an attractive girl and having become an equally handsome man.

Dr. John A. Faeila, president of the hospital and deputy health commissioner of Yonkers, said he saw Joan in a cafeteria today and asked how he enjoyed his new male role in life.

"Swell," John told the doctor.

The patient plans to go to an undisclosed southern city to begin a new life with his parents, the hospital said.
