

Salem High Seniors Receive Scholarships, Cash Awards

Marilyn Quamme, Phil Ringle and Alberta Fern, all Salem high school seniors, Wednesday received scholarship or cash awards for outstanding student work.

Phil Ringle, senior class president at Salem high school, was notified Wednesday that he had been awarded a \$100 scholarship to the University of Oregon for the school year 1949-50. The University of Oregon Mothers' club sponsors the award.

Ringle is the son of Mr. and Mrs. P. H. Ringle, 2115 S. Church st. He has been active in school activities and was one of the leaders for the Salem High Improvement plan.

Alberta Fern was announced Wednesday as a Salem high faculty representative as the winner of a \$250 college scholarship awarded by the Sears, Roebuck foundation. Selection was made by a faculty committee.

Kilgus for the scholarship requires that the student demonstrate good character and leadership rank in the upper one-fifth of the senior class, and have a record of college acceptance.

Air Reservists Hear Program Explanations

About 65 air force reservists from the Salem area heard the new air force reserve program explained Wednesday night by two officers from McChord air force base, Washington. Maj. Jack Mastie and Capt. Pat Manley spoke at a meeting in Salem Chamber of Commerce.

Salem's present 458th composite squadron will be reorganized into a volunteer air reserve unit, effective July 1, 1949.

Activated at Portland that date will be the 2345th air force reserve training center, and the goal of many of the living and ground personnel in Salem is to qualify for assignment to wing headquarters there. Those who are accepted for that unit will train at Portland two days each month and will qualify for inactive duty training pay.

Masonic Ring Waits Ownership Claim

Young Polish DP Family Begin Life Anew at Mt. Angel Abbey

ANTONI and Antonia Glogowski and their three children are the latest European displaced persons to arrive at the Benedictine abbey in Mt. Angel.

They arrived Sunday after a long, tiring journey from their native land of Poland, ready to begin a new life after surviving the terrors and oppression of both Germans and Russians during and after the late war.

Through an interpreter the happy couple said they were impressed greatly by the kindness and friendliness of the American people. They said they are deeply appreciative to have a chance to earn a decent living for themselves and their youngsters after living in poverty and fear for seven years.

Their arrival brought to nine the number of displaced persons who have found shelter and hope in a new land through the benevolent monks at Mt. Angel. The first four, all men, have arrived during the past two months, but the Glogowskis are the first family brought to the abbey.

The Rt. Rev. Thomas Meier, abbot, and the Rev. Cyril Leibold, in charge of the abbey farm, are busy this week renovating a house on the abbey farm for the new family.

French Consul General Visits Capitol, Notes French Recovery

French Consul General Jean de LaGarde of San Francisco accompanied by his assistant, Pierre LaNail and Alfred J. Herman, French consul in Portland, called on Gov. Douglas McKay at the capitol Wednesday. Later the governor entertained the party and Mayor Elstrom. Manager Clay Cochran of Salem Chamber of Commerce and newspaper representatives at luncheon in the Marion hotel.

"France is making rapid strides toward recovery," said the consul general who looks after the interest of his country and its citizens on this coast. "Thanks to the aid received under the Marshall plan France is restoring its industry and agriculture. We are trying to make our country once more self-sufficient in agriculture and are increasing the number of tractors, urging farmers to consolidate their acreages for more economical farming and are trying to improve seed strains."

"In industry our steel production last month broke all previous records. Restoring the rail system was the first undertaking after liberation and is now completed. More goods are being produced and the black market has almost disappeared."
