The following classes will be open for entries: Class 1, one bloom and three blooms of one variety each in yellow, white, pink, red and multicolored; class 2, one open rose, any color; class 3, polyantha roses, one to three to the container; class 4, single roses, one to three to the container; class 5, miniature roses; class 6, twelve roses of one color and 12 roses of mixed colors; class 7, decorative arrangements with roses predominating; class 8, other flower arrangements, any flowers; class 9, novelty arrangements, horticulture and potted plants.
