Dr. Nace Given Home Missions Secretary Post

Word has been received in Salem of the appointment of Dr. I. George Nace, former executive secretary of the Portland and Oregon Councils of Churches, as executive secretary of the Home Missions Council of North America.

After leaving Portland, where he served for seven years, Dr. Nace served for several years as general secretary of the board of national missions of the Evangelical and Reformed church, with headquarters in St. Louis. This body is now merging with the Congregational and Christian church.

Dr. Nace will assume his new office in October, succeeding the Rev. Dr. Mark A. Dawber, who will retire. The Home Missions Council is an agency maintained by 23 Protestant denominations to direct work in missions in the United States.

It is the oldest bank building in Salem, built around 1884, according to owner Max Gehlhar. The three-story structure housed the first national bank and also was the original Masonic lodge home here.

A few years after its construction, another building was erected directly across Commercial street. It was the old William and England bank. The two buildings were situated in what was then the center of Salem's business district.

The top story of the Gehlhar building is being removed because part of the top cornice is unsafe, Gehlhar said. Work, estimated to cost about \$1,300, will start immediately. The lower floor is occupied by the Willamette National Farm loan association.

Mrs. Hatfield was a member of the First Christian church and the Rebekah lodge.

Other survivors are two sons, Olive and Eldon Scott, both of Salem; sister, Mrs. Ora Isbel of Pasadena, Calif.; brother George Poage of Lebanon, and five grandchildren.

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Dallas Lumber Worker Dies In Auto Crash

DALLAS, May 31 — (Special) William Delisle Brooks, 26, Dallas route 1, box 361, was killed today when his auto struck a lumber truck about four miles west of here on the coast highway.

State police said the accident occurred about 11:30 a. m. The truck, owned by the A. F. Coach Lumber company at Tillamook, was operated by Robert Doyle Bishop, Tillamook route 2. Neither Bishop or his 12-year-old boy passenger was injured.

The collision took place on a sharp curve at the foot of a hill at the Dallas-Perrydale corner. The truck driver, was not held. Although both cars were coming from opposite directions the result was not a head-on collision as the Brooks car appeared to have struck the tail gate of the truck as the vehicles passed, police said. Brooks was going to his home from Dallas.

He was born Jan. 13, 1923, at Bend. He married
