

Codling Moth Control Spray Needed Now

The first cover spray for codling moth control in apples and pears should be applied now, according to R. G. Thompson, entomologist at Oregon State college. Codling moths are present and now laying eggs. The spray must be applied before these eggs start hatching around June 7.

The recommended spray is powdered lead arsenate used at the rate of 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water. Where wormy apples from codling moths are not a serious problem, two pounds of lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water will prevent worm injury.

Another suggested spray is 3 pounds of powdered calcium arsenate to 100 gallons of water. Tests by OSC entomologists have shown that calcium arsenate is only slightly less effective than arsenate in codling moth control under Willamette valley conditions.

DDT has proved effective for codling moth control. However, results the past few years have shown that the seasonal use of DDT may cause one or more of the following complications: It may increase the population of several species of mites with consequent severe injury. It may increase the population of the woolly apple aphid which in turn may increase damage from perennial canker. It may create a new pest control problem with insects which now are of little or no economic importance.

For those orchardists who propose to substitute DDT for lead arsenate in codling moth control this season, the following is suggested: two or three applications of DDT should be made during the season. The first application, 2

Bankers Warn Business Now In Downswing

PORTLAND, May 31—(AP)—American bankers were warned today that business is on the downswing into a "recession."

The assertion came from R. M. Alton, Portland banker, at the 47th annual convention of the American Institute of Banking.

He likened the business cycle to a clock, with the high point at 12 o'clock and the low point at 6. "The clock struck 12:00 in November, 1948. It is my guess that we now are somewhere between 1 and 2 o'clock—or in the early stages of the downswing of the business cycle," Alton said in a conference on trust business and investments.

He cautioned the bankers that "this is a poor time to assume risks. We want as few of them as possible."

"If the beneficiaries of trust can stand the current low rate of return, the ideal investment, we believe, is short and medium term governments, and best-grade corporate and municipal issues. Later in the cycle, certain of these might well be replaced with higher income investments. It is now the time to stress quality," he said. Alton said experts were divided on whether "this recession" will be a small or large one. He offered no guess himself.

Hugh S. Hauck, St. Louis, Mo., banker, told the group the importance of trust investments was almost incalculable.

He said personal trust assets were valued at more than fifty billion dollars, and "the volume of corporate trusts administered is two or three times as large."

Both he and Clarence R. Chaney, Minneapolis banker, advised the group to build up their trust departments.
