

Solons Pass Provisions for Wheat Storage

WASHINGTON, June 2—(AP)—Congress today passed a compromise bill to provide critically needed storage facilities for the nation's bumper wheat crop.

The compromise, which broke a long deadlock, was approved by both Senate and House and sent to President Truman for his signature.

The legislation gives the commodity credit corporation power to provide storage facilities on crop—especially grain—on which the CCC makes loans to maintain crop-price support. Grain must be in storage to qualify for government loan.

The action came as a storage crisis was reported developing in the southwest. Earlier, the agriculture department had asked the Maritime commission for some laid-up Liberty ships to use as emergency storage bins.

Coincidentally, Secretary Brannan announced the agriculture department had started work on control measures designed to cut the 1949 wheat crop as much as 25 percent under this year's yield—likely to be of near-record proportions.

Youth Pleads Innocent to Bombing Home

TACOMA, June 2—(AP)—A University of Washington student pleaded innocent today to a charge of dynamiting his parents' home, and said he wanted to consult a psychiatrist before trial.

The formal plea was entered by Lawrence J. Sharp, 20, in a brief appearance before Federal Judge Charles H. Leavy. The judge set June 22 as a tentative trial date.

The youth is charged with destruction of government property by setting a blast last April 1 that destroyed the Vancouver, Wash., housing project home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence J. Sharp, and damaged 27 other buildings.

Asked repeatedly by Judge Leavy if he had funds to employ counsel, young Sharp refused court-appointed counsel, replying: "I don't wish to have an attorney."

When the judge asked when Sharp would be ready for trial, the youth replied: "First I'd like to talk to a psychiatrist."

Sharp was brought here from Seattle, where he is being held in jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond. He and his parents have declined to discuss the case.

Indeps to Have Ball Park 'Nite'

INDEPENDENCE, June 2—(Special)—It will be "Independence Night" at Waters field in Salem Friday night, and a load of Salem Senators baseball rooters from this area will attend the Senators-Tacoma game. Sen. Morse Claims Congress Loses 'Common Touch'

PORTLAND, June 2—(AP)—Congress, says Sen. Wayne L. Morse, has lost the "common touch" and ought to go home and hunt for it. The Oregon republican, here from the nation's capitol, declared that congress "is out of step with the thinking of the nation. It looks as if we will be in session through August and into September. What we should do is adjourn and get home to see what is going on there, and what people are thinking."

Morse predicted a new labor bill very similar to the one he co-sponsored in the 1947 congress. It was turned down in favor of the Taft-Hartley law.

Chinese Reds Take Tsingtao

SHANGHAI, Friday, June 3—(AP)—A reliable source said today Chinese communists had occupied Tsingtao, the north China port which until recently was the anchorage for the U.S. western Pacific fleet.

U.S. ships and personnel pulled out of Tsingtao several days ago. The informant said the Chinese nationalist navy also had withdrawn and the communists took over the city and port without a fight. It was the last city held by the nationalists in northeast China.

8 Army Airmen Found in Idaho

OROFINO, Idaho, June 2—(AP)—Eight airmen who parachuted from a crippled B-29 bomber Tuesday were spotted from the air late during the day by the pilot of a private search plane.

A radio message from search headquarters in the heavily forested mountain area of northern Idaho said the men were found by Pilot Glenn Walker who reported none appeared seriously hurt.

The pilot dropped supplies to the men who were returning from Salina, Kan., when they bailed out, and swooped low over them to shout directions to the nearest road. George Hjort, assistant fire warden of the district said he believed the men could be brought out of the forest during the night.

O & C Timber Sale By Quota Considered

A proposed program to make possible a "planned sale" of Oregon and California grant land timber was discussed here Thursday at a meeting of the Salem district advisory board of the bureau of land management.

Representatives of labor, industry and other groups from 12 northwestern counties of Oregon held their initial meeting and elected Dr. W. F. McCulloch, professor of forestry at Oregon State college, chairman. Clay Cochran, manager of the Salem Chamber of Commerce, was elected vice chairman.

A. P. Collins of Salem, district forester, and Daniel Goldy of Portland, regional administrator, outlined the new timber sale program.

Final Decision
The proposal will come up for what will probably be final discussion at the next meeting of the board which Collins intends to call in about two weeks.

According to the program the district forester would plan annually how much timber could be sold in certain areas, and would publicize a list of interested buyers could apply for timber purchases at a designated time. The program would be guided by the allowable cut of timber on a sustained yield basis; amount of manpower available in the forester's staff to process the sales; the past history of timber sales.

Not All Quota Cut

Based on the present strength of the staff, only about 50 per cent of the timber which could be harvested actually will be cut. An average of about 67,000,000 board feet of timber has been harvested annually during the past three years in the Salem area, while the allowable cut was 112,000,000 feet.

Other board members at the meeting were J. L. Chambers, chairman of the Linn County Lumbermen's association of Albany; R. E. DeCamp, forester for the Willamette Valley Lumber company of Dallas; Frank Hoyt, Coast-Columbia district council, Timber and Sawmill Workers, AFL, of St. Helens; James Loder, president of the Oregon Wildlife Federation of Salem; Thomas H. Malarkey, vice president of the M & M Woodworking company of Portland; and Arne Nordstrand, International Woodworkers of America, CIO, of Lebanon.

Polio Strikes Texas Area

SAN ANGELO, Texas, June 2—(AP)—Polio laid its dread hand heavily on Texas today.

Schools, movies, churches and swimming pools were closed here. The city health director there has declared polio is in the epidemic stage. Four deaths and 61 cases have been reported.

Waco and Austin reported additional polio deaths.

San Antonio has had 51 cases and six deaths this year. Austin has had ten cases and five deaths. SAbilene is treating 19 cases. Wichita Falls has had eight cases, Fort Arthur one, Big Spring one and Plainview two.

Stock Rally in Summer Seen

PORTLAND, June 2—(Special)—J. Henry Helsel, head of an investment counselors firm bearing his name, said today there was indications that stocks had reached the low ebb of a seasonal slump and that with continued high employment and production the prospects were "good" for a summer rally. He based his comments on advice to his firm from eastern correspondents.

U.S. Asks New Government in Berlin Zones

PARIS, June 2—(AP)—The United States asked the foreign ministers conference today to give the whole of Berlin a new government.

It would operate with greater freedom from interference by the allied occupation powers after being set up in free city-wide elections under four-power supervision.

The proposal was made in a simple document on a single sheet of paper and was coupled with a demand for discussion in secret. Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky agreed to the secret meeting, along with the others.

While the proposal was made independently by Secretary of State Dean Acheson for the United States, French sources indicated earlier it had approval of Britain and France.

It agreed on one point asked earlier by Vishinsky: Reestablishment of the allied commandatura which administered Berlin until the Russians boycotted it early in 1948.

But the great change asked—and this was certain to bring some heavy scuffling—was the proposal to trim the power of the commandatura and leave more administering powers in the hands of German officials.

Bridges Flays Court Decision

SEATTLE, June 2—(AP)—Harry Bridges, president of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union (CIO), lashed out today at a \$750,000 federal court judgement against his union recently at Juneau, Alaska.

A jury there awarded damages for that amount to the Juneau Spruce corporation, which sued the Longshore International and its local as an outgrowth of picketing. The longshoremen are appealing.

Bridges, here to address Seattle union members, said the suit was an attempt to "put our union out of business."

"If the verdict is upheld in higher courts after appeal we either will have to try to scrape up \$750,000 or go out of business. I'm not so sure we intend to do either."

Bus Strike Slows Massachusetts

BOSTON, June 2—(AP)—A strike of 2,200 bus drivers and workers today tied a gigantic knot in the everyday transportation routine of some half million riders in 79 eastern Massachusetts communities.

Employees of the Eastern Massachusetts Street Railway company walked out after negotiations over wages failed. Railroads added extra trains to meet the rush. War-time car pools reappeared. A shift to private autos clogged roads in the worst traffic jams in years.

'Spy Deal' With Hiss Described By Chambers

NEW YORK, June 2—(AP)—Whittaker Chambers pointed at Alger Hiss today and said the former state department official fed government secrets through him to a prewar Soviet spy ring.

The deal to funnel secrets from the state department to the spy ring was made across a table in a dimly lit restaurant in New York's Chinatown, Chambers said.

The Russian ring also sounded out the possibility of getting documents from Hiss' brother, Donald, the witness said, but Hiss was not sure he could be used.

Former Courier

Chambers, self-styled former courier for the communist spy ring, said Hiss was connected with the same Russian underground "apparatus" that he was.

He described Hiss and his wife, Priscilla, as stubborn communists who refused to leave the party when Chambers did in 1938.

"I urged the Hisses to break with the party," Chambers said. "They replied that they would not break. Alger Hiss said what a great pity it was I had broken."

Cross-Examination

Shortly before the trial recessed for the night, the defense began cross-examining Chambers. Hiss' attorney hammered away with questions intended to show up Chambers as a liar.

Chambers admitted that he committed perjury in 1937 when he took an oath of office for a job with the Federal Works Progress administration.

He swore to uphold the constitution, he said, at the same time he was working as a communist for the government's overthrow.

The witness was vague as to what secrets Hiss allegedly passed on to him.

"They bore on munitions but I cannot be more explicit," he told Federal Judge Samuel H. Kaufman and a jury of 10 men and two women.

Baptists Vote Name Change

SAN FRANCISCO, June 2—(AP)—The Northern Baptist convention voted today to change its name to the American Baptist Convention, a move designed to merge all Baptist groups in the nation.

The actual change will be made effective at the 1950 convention in Boston.

The convention voted unanimously to invite the Southern Baptist convention to unite with the northern convention under the new name. The southerners withdrew in 1945 over the issue of slavery.

YACHT TO WORK AS FERRY
SEATTLE, June 2—(AP)—Adm. Ernest R. King's wartime flagship is going to Cuba. The Vixen, largest yacht in the world, which has been tied up quietly here the last two years, has been chartered to run as an 800-passenger ferry between Key West, Fla., and Havana, Cuba.
