Queen's Again in the Headlines; but Through no Fault of Her's; Battle Lost

ROLLING HILLS FARM—Out here in Polk county we've just had a battle, not a gun shootin' battle, but a conflict of one strong will against another.

Queenie has adopted a son—but reluctantly.

Both Queen the cow and I learned a great deal these two weeks. We learned a lot about cow experts too. First thing is not to believe the man down at the Farmers Union who says "Oh, you won't have any trouble, just put the calf on her and when she licks it, she'll accept it."

Also don't believe the fellow who says it can't be done. It can, if you, the cow and the calf live long enough.

Fortunately at that frightful moment, Moe came to the rescue with a blood curdling cry for ma, and Queen, forgetting her hateful purpose and dashed off in haste.

So after following the helpful suggestions of the experts, and bucking the scorn of the skeptics, we flung wide the gates, opened the barn door and drove the whole temperamental trio out into the pasture—where they are now living

amicably. Mo is still a spoiled child, Jo overbearing personality that he is, holds his own and Queen is a contented matron with a large family. To save face, Queen feels it necessary to clip her foster child occasionally, just to show she has no intention of accepting him completely.

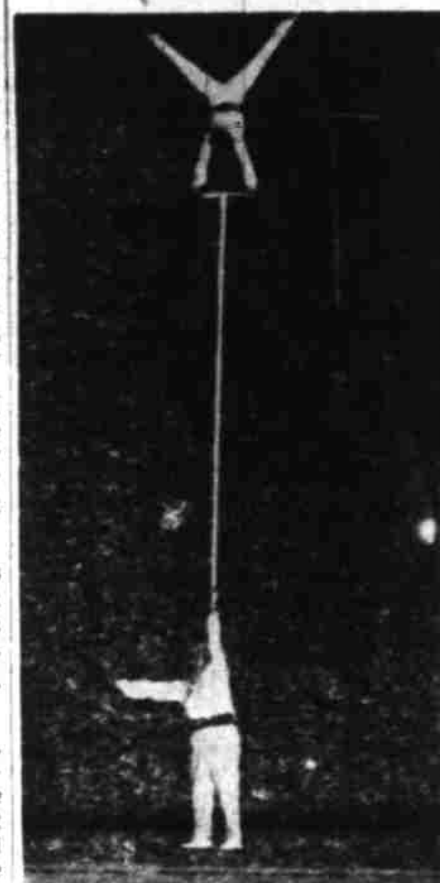

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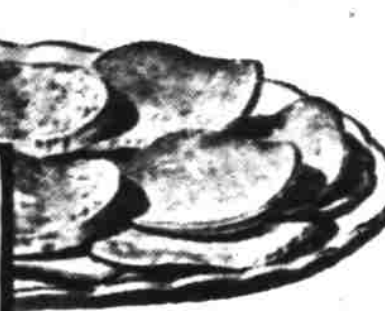
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
