For Big or Small

Meat Loaves Handy for Weekends as They'll Serve a Crowd or Small Group

Ground meat made into loaves is one of the most satisfactory main dishes for a weekend when company may or may not drop in for dinner. Persons with country homes or beach places are those most likely to have unexpected guests or weekends without a sign of visitors.

The nice thing about meat loaves is their versatility. They will replace a roast nicely, will go into sandwiches, and ultimately end up as hash if necessary. The investment is smaller than a large roast. Here are three good loaves suited to summer eating:

PIMIENTO MEAT LOAF

1/2 pound each, beef and veal
Small piece salt pork ground
1 cup bread crumbs
Milk to moisten
Small can pimientos
Small can mushroom
Add a little milk to top as it bakes. Bake about 1 hour in 400 degree F. oven.

Also may cook mushrooms in butter, then place mixture in greased ring mold about 1 hour at 350 F. For a large ring mold make 3 times recipe.

CARAMEL HAM RING

1 1/4 lb. ground round steak
3/4 lb. ground raw ham
1/2 loaf stale bread
1 pint milk
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
2 eggs

Break up bread and stand with milk while mixing other ingredients. Beat eggs, add mustard, meat and soaked bread. Sprinkle ring mold with 1/4 cup brown sugar and heat until melted, sprinkle with a few whole cloves. Pack in meat mixture and bake 1 hour in a 350 F. oven. Turn out and serve with potato salad in center. Serves 16. For large ring mold make 1 1/2 times recipe.

BANANA MEAT LOAF

1 lb. ground raw beef
1 tablespoon chopped onion
1 tablespoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 cup soft bread crumbs
3/4 cup mashed bananas (1 to 2)

Use all - yellow slightly green-tipped bananas. Mix together with meat, onion, salt, pepper and bread crumbs. Combine bananas, mustard and mix. Add to meat mixture and mix well. Form mixture into well-greased baking pan. Bake in moderate oven, over 350 degrees for about an hour, 4 to 6 servings.
