

Over 2 Score Nations Remain 'At War' 5 Years After D-Day

WASHINGTON, June 4—(AP)—Five years after D-Day in Normandy, the war with Germany and Japan is still legally on for more than two score nations.

Through the United States and most of the other allies have formally declared actual hostilities to be at an end, the technical windup of World War II is still waiting for an agreement between the west and Soviet Russia to go ahead with the drafting of peace treaties.

The progress of the Big Four foreign minister conference at Paris thus far has failed to encourage hopes that such an agreement may be in sight. American officials experts meantime are trying to master the legal and diplomatic tangles resulting from a situation which contributes materially to post-war instability.

Just how many nations are still at war cannot be stated positively. The state department figured at the time of the Japanese surrender that 46 countries were official enemies of Japan and 47 remained at war with Germany. It is standing by that figure, subject to a number of special interpretations.

Numerous side issues remain unsettled. Greece and neighboring Albania appear uncertain whether they are in a handover state of war, while the Big Four allies never declared war on Austria. They have been unable to agree on a treaty restoring the country as a victim of Nazi aggression, to full independence. Meanwhile, allied troops occupy it in the same way as Germany.

The peace treaties already signed five axis satellite countries have proved only partially satisfactory to the west. The United States and Britain are pressing charges just now that communist-run Rumania, Bulgaria and Hungary have flouted their treaty pledges to give their peoples such human rights as fair trials and free speech.

A new search centered between Donald and Fargo Saturday following word that a man resembling Pinson had aroused suspicion. The area is about six miles southwest of Aurora. Late Saturday night state police said that trail, too, was growing cold.

Backdown on T-H Act Repeal Pleases GOP

WASHINGTON, June 4—(AP)—Senate republicans' battling to keep a big part of the Taft-Hartley law contained today that a democratic compromise drive plays into their hands.

But Senator Douglas (D-Ill.), a leader of the move to revise the Truman labor bill, took a sharply different view. He said: "I think we've got a very good chance to put our program across."

Senate debate on the administration bill is scheduled to start Monday. It would repeal the Taft-Hartley act and replace it with a slightly modified version of the old Wagner act.

Three Republicans, Senators Taft (Ohio), Donnell (Mo.) and Smith (N.J.), are sponsoring a substitute measure which would repeal the basic provisions of the T-H law.

Five proposed amendments to the administration bill, including the severe proposal, were outlined to an all-day meeting of democratic senators yesterday.

Besides Douglas, original sponsors of the five amendments included Senator Hill (D-Ala.) and Republican Senators Aiken (Vt.) and Morse (Ore.).

Millard Hardin, prosecuting attorney, said a coroner's jury found two children suffocated by a cause or circumstance, not yet known. The third child, who survived several hours after the ordeal, died from a cause not yet established.

Hardin said it was possible the children themselves locked the doors, "but it is highly improbable." He said state and county authorities are continuing their investigation.
