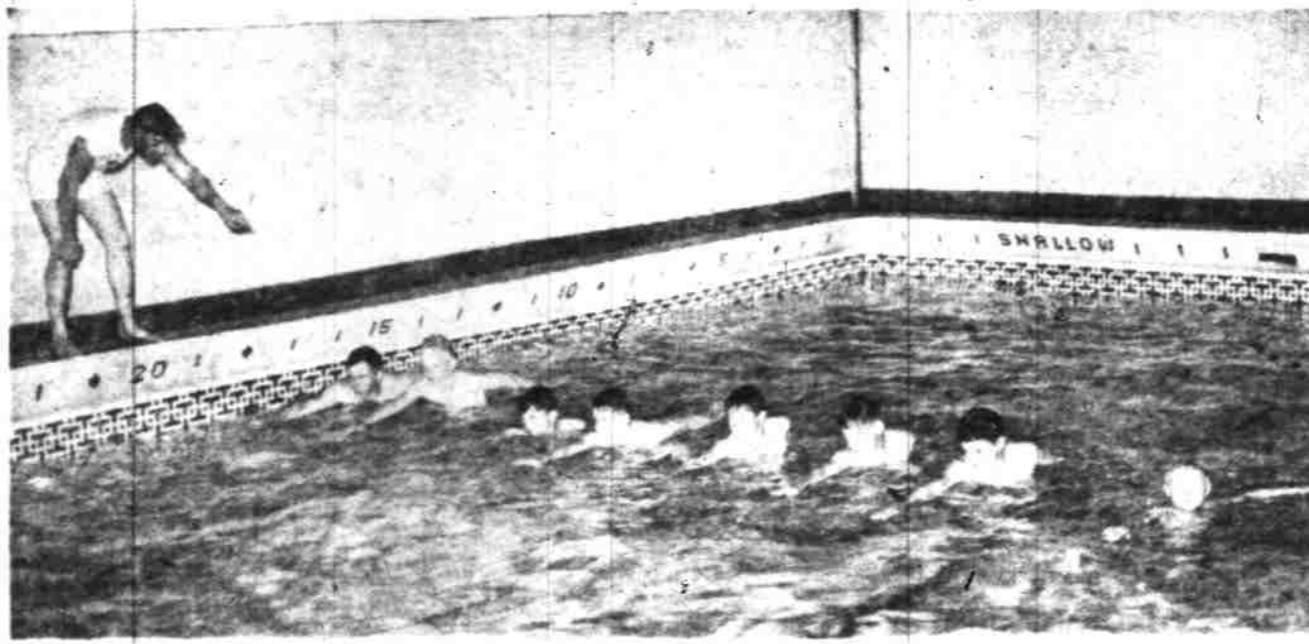

# 3 Escapees Caught; Leaves 3 Uncaptured

CADIZ, O., June 5 (AP)—Three life-term convicts who, with 11 other inmates, cracked out of West Virginia state penitentiary were recaptured near here today. Sheriff D. J. Topp of Harrison County, Ohio, said one of the trio, 38-year-old Otto Neff, was felled by gunfire as he and his companions tried to abandon a stolen car outside of Brilliant, O., some four miles northeast of Cadiz.

The sheriff reported Neff, John Valyko, 36, and Stanley Sheffie, 33, were surrounded by a posse under the direction of Marshall James Bailey.

Harrison County officers arrived to find Neff bleeding from wounds in the head and shoulder. Valyko and Sheffie had dashed into the hills nearby but surrendered without resistance when they were tracked down moments later. Topp said.

Recapture of the three life-termers left only three of the original 14-man fugitive group still at large.

CONNELLSVILLE, PA., June 5 (AP)—Detective John B. Kane said a 20-year-old Dunbar man was shot today by a gas station operator who thought he was one of the escaped convicts from West Virginia state penitentiary.

William Porter was released after treatment at Connelville state hospital. He sustained superficial wounds in the arm and rib.

Kane said the filling station operator, Edgar Thrasher, was awakened by noise Porter and two other men were making in front of the station. The men refused to leave and during an ensuing argument Thrasher fired.

State police said prosecution may not be made.

MOSCOW, June 5 (AP)—The Moscow circus elephant Punchy likes to walk and nothing makes her so happy as to walk the streets of the capital.

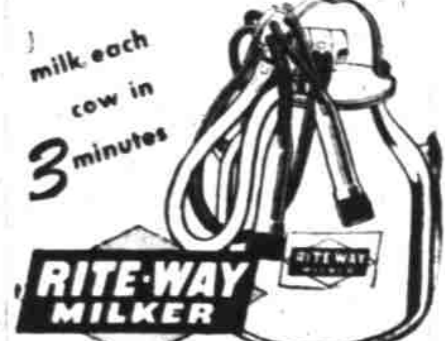

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# Claire Inman, Ex-Law School Instructor, Dies

Claire M. Inman, a Salem attorney and instructor at Willamette university's law college more than 30 years, died Sunday at his home at 1445 Mission st. at the age of 74 years. He had been in poor health for several years, retiring from the Willamette faculty in 1947. Death was caused by cancer. He was born Sept. 4, 1874, in O'Brien county, Iowa, and came to Salem with his parents in 1893. He attended Willamette university and graduated from the law school in 1901. After a year of practice in Baker county he returned to Salem, where he was a lawyer more than 40 years. He was a partner of Frank A. Turner and Capt. M. W. Hunt during the early years of his practice.

On Aug. 14, 1946, at Salem he was married to Katie E. Dixon of Portland. This was his second marriage.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church, Salem Elks club, the Oregon State Bar association and Sons of the Union Veterans of the Civil War.

Surviving besides the widow are a son, Van Claire Inman, and a granddaughter, Lucinda, both of Los Angeles.

Services will be Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. at Clough-Barrick chapel with Dr. Chester W. Hamblin officiating. Interment will be at City View cemetery.
