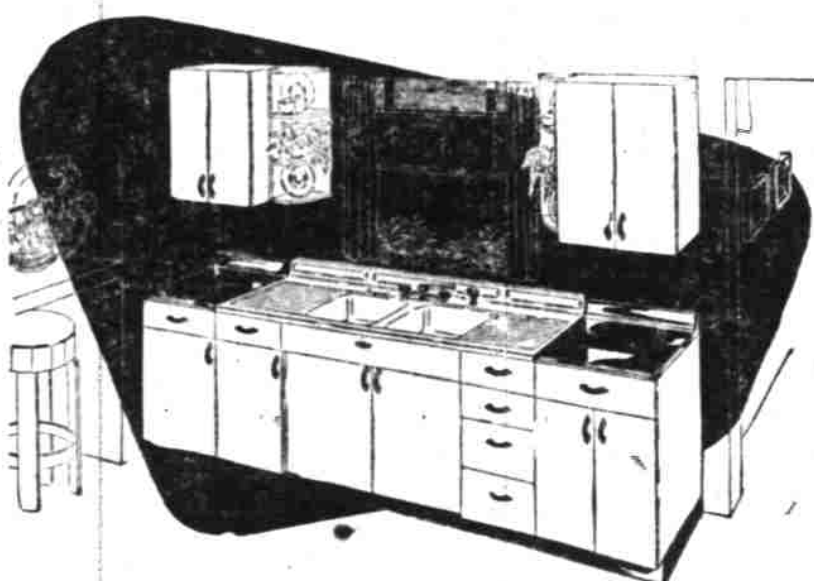

Petitions Ask Contractor Fee Hike Abolished

Petitions preliminary to a referendum attack on a 1949 legislative act to increase fees paid by electrical contractors were filed Monday by three Cottage Grove residents.

The 1949 bill would boost fees for contractors from \$20 to \$50 a year and for journeymen from \$3 to \$5 a year.

State Labor Commissioner W.

E. Kimsey requested the measure to "provide better regulation of electric wiring installations." It would require permits for home owners doing their own wiring.

Sponsors of the referendum must get 15,926 signatures of registered voters by July 15 to place the bill on the election ballot in November, 1950.

George D. Drury, Marvin J. Drury and Vinal T. Randall, Jr., all of Cottage Grove, filed their preliminary petition for the referendum with the state department Monday.

Three other referendum petitions have been launched against 1949 legislative acts. These would permit the Rogue river irrigation, power and flood control project; prohibit daylight saving time in Oregon except by proclamation of

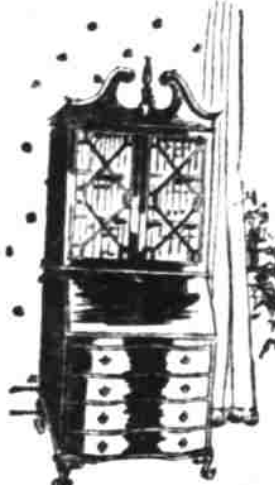
