Fed by waters booming down from the Cascades, two dams under construction on the North Santiam River will feed new power into lines of the Northwest Power Pool in 1953. Located about 45 miles east of Salem, Detroit and Big Cliff dams are scheduled to have their first units in operation in 1953, provided necessary funds are appropriated. Detroit will produce power early in that year and Big Cliff by the end of the year.

CRUMB CAKE
2 cups flour
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup butter
2 eggs, well beaten
1/2 cup milk
Cinnamon
Nut meats, chopped
Sift dry ingredients together, cut or work in butter. Reserve 1 cup of mixture. To remaining mixture add combined eggs and milk, beat well. Pour into buttered coffee cake pan (9-inch). Cover top with reserved mixture. Sprinkle with cinnamon and nut meats. Bake in a moderate oven (350 to 375 degrees F.) 30 to 45 minutes.

JERSEY GINGER BREAD
1 cup butter
3 tablespoons sugar
1 egg, beaten
1/2 cup molasses
2 1/2 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon ginger
1 cup boiling water
Cream butter and sugar. Add egg and molasses. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with water. Bake in buttered pan in a moderate oven (350 to 375 degrees F.) 30 to 45 minutes.

CHEESE BISCUIT ROLLS
(Serves 12)
2 cups flour
3/4 cup butter
1/2 cup milk
2 tablespoons butter, melted
1 cup American cheese, grated
Sift dry ingredients together, work in butter. Add milk. Roll to 1/2 inch thickness. Spread with butter and cheese. Roll like a jelly roll, slice. Bake on a buttered baking sheet in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) 15 minutes.

Even these and other major power sources proposed for development in the Pacific Northwest (a total of 10 million kilowatts) do not mean an immediate end to our need for more electricity. Big plans take time, and the next several winters—like the last one—may call for sparing use of electric power. However, as the great dams are built, adding new power little by little, the demand will be met.

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
