County Land Sale Money Apportioned

Apportionment of Marion county funds from sales of county and tax-foreclosed lands during the past three years was announced Tuesday by the county court. Actual distribution of the funds is not expected until about July, however.

The account totals \$89,185, of which \$65,723 will be transferred to the county general fund as its pro-rata share and for receipts from sale of county-owned property sold through the account. Another \$11,437 is reserved for contracts receivable. Period covered is April 1, 1946 to April 21, 1949, when a new method of distribution was effective.

The \$12,023.87 available for distribution to other funds and taxing districts includes the following:

Heavy Emergence Of Cherry Fruit Fly Noted in Area

An unusually heavy cherry fruit fly emergence was recorded from two cages in the Lambert orchard by county extension agent D. L. Rasmussen.

Flies have emerged daily under these cages since May 25. "Since the first flies have now been out of the ground more than 10 days, the egg laying period has begun," says Rasmussen.

"To kill flies before they lay their eggs, growers must maintain their spray or dust cover on cherry and interplanted trees. Brushy fence rows and border rows to the cherry trees must also be sprayed for perfect control," according to Rasmussen, who recommends that since spraying or dusting was necessary after heavy rains last week, the next application should be made this week.

Bogus Checks Flood Salem Area Markets

Another outbreak of fictitious check-writing in Salem has been reported to local city police this week.

Ten checks which police say bear the forged name of Robert Fitts, Brooks route 1 berry grower, have been passed recently at a number of local markets. The checks all range in amounts from \$27 to \$36 each and are endorsed by a Larry Steele, according to police reports. All are dated June 1.

Three other bad checks were reported to police Tuesday. They include one for \$20 at George Cadwell station, 2400 State st.; a \$27 check at the Quality Market, 1701 Center st., and another for \$56 passed at Henry's Market, 697 S. 12th st.

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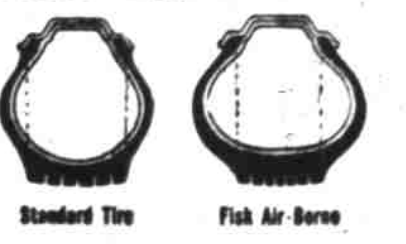
