

Pros Respect Par as Open Looms

Locke, Barron Stock Boosted

Tough Medinah Gives Shotmakers Jitters

CHICAGO, June 7-(P)—The big shot pros, in the habit of snubbing par golf in winning tournaments, now have great respect for that figure as the National Open Championship approaches, on Thursday.

They think they've found their match on Medinah No. 3, which snakes 7,040 yards through a forest.

Medinah's par of 36-35-71 has never been with such open-mouth awe before. There isn't a player who will not settle for a 72-hole 284 (even par) to win gold's most cherished title.

Yep, par has finally come into its own as the boys lumber up for the 49th renewal of the big show. Lowest practice round reported thus far was a 66 by South African Bobby Locke. He needed only 22 putts.

"This course is by far the toughest I've ever played," said Bobby. "I needed plenty of luck for that 66. The course is awfully tight—narrow fairways. The trees right on the border. I think about a 285 will take it. No one will escape at least two double bogeys (two over par) during the 72 holes."

Locke, one of the favorites, lists Herman Barron who finished next to him in the Goodall Round Robin last month as his personal favorite. "Barron hits a terrific fairway shot, is straight off the tee and is a good putter—that's a fine combination for this tournament," Locke explained.

Barron himself was willing to give 5-3 odds that a 286 would take the prize.

The average winning score in the last ten national opens is 285.2, including Ben Hogan's record 276 last year.

WINNER, S. D., June 7-(P)—This prosperous cattle-raising community is ready to compete with Brooklyn for Mickey Owen. "We'll watch any offer that the Dodgers give Mickey," said "Peewee" Rutherford, secretary of the semi-pro, winner baseball club today.

Winner has been "in a dither," Rutherford said, since Owen's reinstatement in major league baseball Sunday.

Rutherford said no terms have been discussed. "But until we announce definitely that Mickey is leaving, he will play every

scheduled game with us," the secretary added.

Owen said, when informed of Commissioner A. B. Chandler's lifting of the ban against major leaguers who jumped to the Mexican league, that he had "a lot of work to clean up at Winner before I clear out." He has, however, applied for re-instatement with the Dodgers.

Mickey has been player-manager of the Winner Phenix since early in May. Winner, in south central South Dakota has a population of approximately 3,000.

Star Shooters At STC Today

The man-and-wife shooting team of L. W. (Bill) Johnson and Frances Johnson, representing the Remington Arms Co., will present their all-free exhibition today, starting at 7 a.m., on the Salem Trapshooters club range on Turner road.

Known throughout the country as the outstanding husband-wife team among the Remington company's staff of exhibitionists, Mr. and Mrs. Johnson will present an entire category of exceedingly difficult and seemingly impossible shots with rifle, shotgun and revolver. They also lecture on the art of shooting, illustrating their points with actual demonstrations. A former professional football player, Johnson includes among his tricks the throwing of five clay targets into the air at once and shattering the five, one at a time, with a 20-gauge pumpgun. He also "draws" pictures with a rapid-firing 22 rifle. Mrs. Johnson fires with revolver at a knife blade 24 feet distant, shattering the bullet so that parts break small balloons on each side of the knife.

SEATTLE, June 7-(P)—Pres. G. A. "Al" Leader said today the Pacific Coast Hockey league has renewed its agreements with the other three professional leagues. Leader said the Coast league, at a meeting in New York yesterday, had its reserve list increased from 20 to 25 players and "under terms mutually agreed upon by itself and the National Hockey league, was granted exclusive territorial rights" in all coast cities.

Salary Squabbles, Contract Obligations May Stop 'Jumpers'

NEW YORK, June 7-(P)—Pitcher Max Lanier has been offered a contract with the St. Louis Cardinals calling for \$11,000 and has turned it down, his attorney said tonight.

John M. Flynn, Lanier's New York lawyer, said the offer was made by telephone earlier today by Fred Saigh, president of the Cardinals, to Lanier who is now pitching for Drummondsville, Quebec.

In St. Louis, Cardinal President Fred M. Saigh promptly denied Flynn's statement. Saigh said he made no offer whatsoever to Lanier and that paying him \$11,000 was out of the question.

Flynn said the contract called for the same salary Lanier was

getting when he jumped to the Mexican league in 1946. "He's making more than that in Canada," Flynn said. "Furthermore, the offer was made on a 'make-good' basis. If the Cardinals didn't keep him he would be out of a job all around. Flynn said he was proceeding in Lanier's damage suit against organized baseball and hoped for a trial within six weeks.

NEW YORK, June 7-(P)—The National League's Mexican jumpers seeking reinstatement to organized baseball were advised today to get clearance first from any existing contracts.

Taking steps to be sure that no players would be jumping other contracts to return to clubs

In his league. President Ford Frick of the National League telegraphed warnings to all those applying for reinstatement.

These instructions were sent to the six players who already have filed applications in the National League. They are Pitchers Harry Feldman, Adrian Zabala and Sal Maglie of the New York Giants, Catcher Mickey Owen of Brooklyn and Pitchers Fred Martin and Max Lanier of St. Louis. In all there are 15 National Leaguers eligible for reinstatement.

As most of them are busy, either in a Canadian semi-pro league, Venezuela or Mexico, the question of getting a release from their present contracts may bar their way.

CHICAGO, June 7-(P)—First application for reinstatement received by President Will Hargrave of the American League for erstwhile jumpers to the Mexican league was that of Roberto Ortiz, former Washington Senator outfielder. Ortiz telegraphed his request today from Maracaibo, Venezuela, where he now is playing baseball.

Still unheard from by Hargrave were Pitcher Alex Carrasquel of the Chicago White Sox; Outfielder Roberto Estallilla of the Philadelphia Athletics; and Infielder Murray Franklin of the Detroit Tigers, all previously suspended. Carrasquel, however, has contacted the White Sox.

Trout Liberations Under Way; Odell Lake Yielding Biggies

The early releases of year-old legal-sized trout are now well under way. To date there have been 464,923 of these big rainbow trout liberated. Along with these, there have been 126,840 legal cutthroat, 7,752 eastern brook, and 25,000 silverides liberated in Oregon's streams.

Four big tank trucks are now hauling these trout from the Oregon State Game commission's hatcheries. At the present time, two of these trucks are working out of the Oak Springs hatchery near Maupin. One is liberating from the Klamath hatchery near Ft. Klamath and the fourth is working out of the Rock Creek hatchery near Roseburg.

Robert Holloway, in charge of trout liberation for the Game Commission, stated that slightly over half of the yearling winter hold over trout are now out. He pointed out that other legal-sized trout will be liberated all during the summer along with the liberation of smaller sized trout.

Frank Smith, fisheries field agent for the Oregon State Game commission in the Gilchrist area, reports that anglers have been having unusually good luck this spring in taking large Mackinaw and Dolly Varden trout from Odell lake. The Mackinaw trout were first stocked in Odell, Crescent and Big lakes in the Cascade mountains many years ago, but

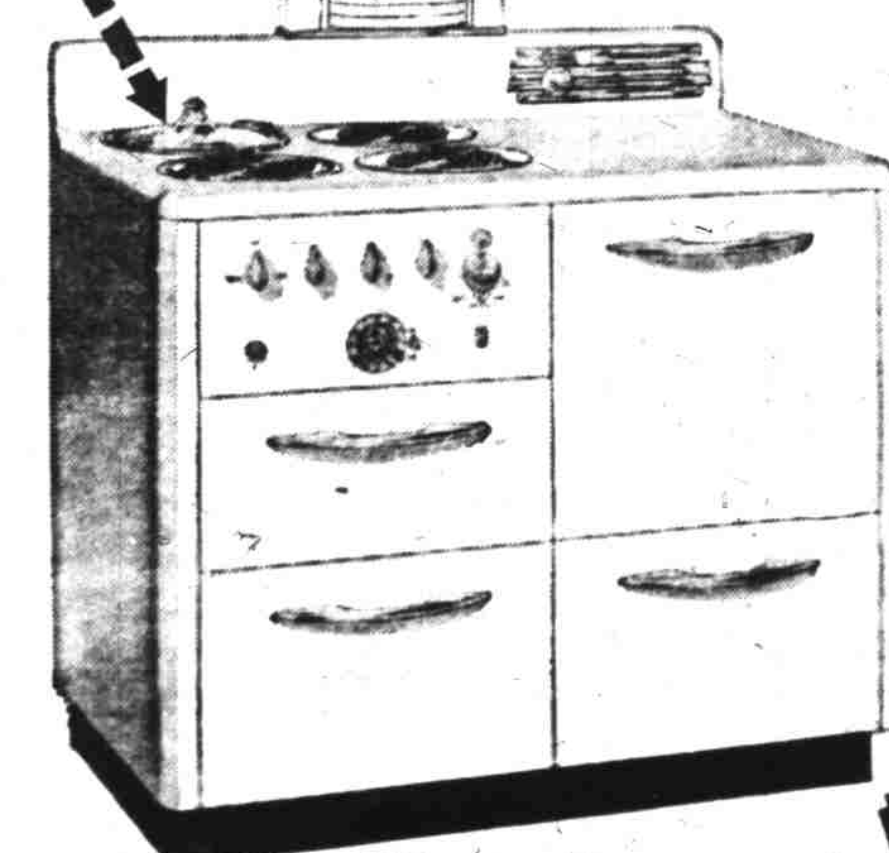
Apprentice Jockey Lee Harris suffered a skull injury in the Meloe which took place near the finish in full view of the 18,160 spectators.
