

Snow Crushed Buildings at Camp Pioneer

Winter snows crushed most of the buildings at Camp Pioneer, the Boy Scout campsite at the foot of Mt. Jefferson, but the camping season will start on schedule July 10.

This was the word Thursday from Clark A. Lethin, camping and activities chairman for Cascade area Boy Scout council, after a personal inspection of the damages estimated at \$30,000.

Only the pump-house, generator building and kitchen escaped major damage during what was one of the mountain area's worst winters in many years. Lethin expressed the belief that the recent earthquake, felt in the canyon area as well as throughout the northwest, may have provided just the shock necessary to shift the tons of snow and ice atop camp buildings.

Not Cortal Camp
Lethin emphasized last night that the heavy loss will not curtail the camping activities planned for this summer, but that much work remains to be done to recondition the camp. He asked that any men wishing to volunteer their services in week-end work parties at the camp this month register their names at the Boy Scout office here.

The accumulated snow of the winter reached a height of 20 feet at the scout camp during the winter. When Lethin went into the camp with Assistant Scout Executive Howard Higby and Ranger S. A. Moore of Detroit this week, there were still six-foot snow drifts and a solid crust of snow on the approaches to Camp Pioneer.

Flattened by Snow
The two-story mess hall and lodge was flattened by the snow, shower and toilet buildings collapsed and the trading post was caved in. The kitchen at one end of the mess hall was still standing and its equipment, though scattered, was safe.

Some of the equipment stored for the winter in the mess hall was destroyed, including camp boats, but much of it is expected to be salvaged by cleanup crews. Scout Executive Gordon Gilmore, Higby and camp carpenter Herman Wright of Jefferson left for the camp Thursday to determine the needs for getting it ready for the camping season.

CVA Hearing Starts Today

WASHINGTON, June 9—(AP)—The house public lands committee announced today it will start an investigation tomorrow into how the creation of a Columbia Valley administration would affect reclamation projects in the Columbia river basin of the Pacific northwest.

Chairman Peterson (D-Fla.) said a subcommittee headed by Rep. Murdock (D-Ariz.) will take the testimony. Reclamation bureau officials will testify. "We want to see how the CVA proposal is going to affect irrigation and reclamation in the Pacific northwest," Peterson told a reporter. "We want to know how it will aid reclamation in the area."

Lew H. Wentz, Oilman, Dies

PONCA CITY, Okla., June 9—(AP)—Lew H. Wentz, who made millions in Oklahoma oil and pumped millions back into philanthropy, died today.

He was 68 years old although the secret of his age had always been guarded zealously. Death followed an attack of coronary thrombosis. Wentz was a bachelor.

As republican national committeemen from Oklahoma for 12 years, he had been active in party politics both on a national state level. Several years ago he was listed as one of the seven men in United States whose annual income exceeded \$5,000,000.

Bevin Hopes for Truce With Reds

BLACKPOOL, Eng., June 9—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin raised a hope today that Russia and the west can reach an unwritten pact to live and let live. He told the British labor party's annual rally that Russia is a vexing problem and the veto barrier to a formal peace settlement "seems insurmountable." But he did not lack hope for a working arrangement.

Ex-Federal Worker Linked With Eisler

WASHINGTON, June 9—(AP)—A former government worker, Mrs. Mary Jane Keeney, said today she had entertained Gerhart Eisler, fugitive red leader at dinner, but added she is no communist.

But she told the house un-American activities committee that she didn't "know" Eisler.

Mrs. Keeney, now an editor in the United Nations bureau of documents, also testified that:

Nathan Gregory Silvermaster, accused by former red courier Elisabeth T. Bentley of heading a wartime communist spy ring in this country, "has once or twice been a guest at my home."

Her husband, Philip O. Keeney, who also appeared before the committee refused to say whether he is a communist or knows Eisler or Silvermaster. He said the answers might tend to incriminate or degrade him.

But the balding, lanky, 58-year-old librarian did say that he had access to wartime secrets in the government, was fired by the army in Japan and tried to leave this country last December without a passport.

The ship on which he tried but failed to sail was the Polish liner, Batory—the same vessel Eisler used to jump the country May 6. Furthermore, Keeney said, it was Mrs. Carol King, Eisler's lawyer in several cases, who advised him there was no law that said he couldn't leave without a passport. But an American official stopped him on the dock.

Just before the committee hearing broke up, Counsel Frank Tavenner suggested it consider in executive session "a further investigation of the Batory situation" or whether the matter should be "referred to the justice department for prosecutive action" on the basis of information already available.

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Graduation Week End to Start at WU

A three-day period of Willamette university alumni meetings and commencement exercises begins tonight when the Law school alumni association holds its annual banquet at the Marion hotel, starting at 6:30.

Also meeting tonight will be the class of 1912 members who are planning a get-together at the A. A. Schramm residence.

Meetings of various classes, including those of 1899, 1912, 1919, 1923, 1924 and 1929, and a general meeting of all alumni will take place Saturday. The annual alumni banquet will be held in Baxter hall Saturday evening. Following the banquet a faculty reception for all graduating seniors at University house will round out Saturday's affairs.

The week end will be climaxed Sunday with commencement exercises at 3 p.m. in the campus gymnasium where 237 degrees will be presented.

Various events to take place during Saturday's Alumni day include the various reunion luncheons and the alumni meeting at Waller hall starting at 2 p.m. The meeting calls for introduction of new officers, annual roll-call of classes, presentation of Matthew's Medallions (in honor of the late mathematics professor James T. Matthews) to the classes of 1899 and 1924, and movies taken by Leslie Sparks, physical education director.

Berlin Talk Deadline Set

PARIS, June 9—(AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky agreed tonight to a speed up of the east-west trade talks in Berlin, under which the experts there will report to the Big Four foreign ministers by Monday.

The western powers told Russia they were tired of jockeying in the foreign ministers' council and wanted to get results or quit.

"If we don't cause this futile discussion," Secretary of State Dean Acheson said, "we will never get anywhere."

Acheson's remark followed a long discussion by Vishinsky on the Berlin currency question.

It was the longest session of the conference. Now in its third week, and probably the bitterest. The meeting lasted nearly five hours.

Personal Income Falls Below March Level

WASHINGTON, June 9—(AP)—Americans' personal income fell for the fourth straight month in April, dropping \$900,000,000 below the March levels.

The commerce department reported today that this decline brought the national total—figured on an annual rate basis—down to \$213,700,000,000. But it said this still was \$5,100,000,000, or 2.5 per cent, above the figure for April of last year.

Carter Faces Third Charge

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2,000 Pickers Needed for Cherry Crop

Harvest of a bumper crop of cherries will start Monday in the Salem area and at least 2,000 pickers will be needed, William Baillie, manager of the Salem office of the state employment service, said Thursday.

"Those wishing to pick should contact their growers for instructions," said Baillie. "Those who have made no prior arrangements will be provided transportation at the office daily at 6 a.m., beginning Monday."

Information for drive-outs also is available by phone from the employment office. Baillie said that about 20 cherry growers would have trucks at his office Monday morning.

Picking price is 2 1/2 cents per pound with adjustments made in orchards where the harvest varies. The crop is two weeks earlier than last year.

Strawberry picking is nearly ended on the valley floor, said Baillie. But picking is still going on in the Silverton hills area.
