Grass Seed Crop Curbed

LA GRANDE, June 9 (AP)—Dry weather conditions but full may cost Pacific Northwest grass seed growers more than \$1,000,000 in crop losses this year, Union county agent Roland W. Schaad said today.

He explained that the dry spell prevented formation of seed buds in older stands. Willamette valley growers suffered most, he said, with crop losses estimated at one-third.

According to Schaad, seed planted last spring was not affected.

Butter Said Below Grade

PORTLAND, June 9 (AP)—A court test of the state's butter grade labeling law moved a step nearer today.

First tests of butter grades on the market have been completed. Kenneth Carl, assistant chief of the state agriculture department's food and dairies division, said of 64 brands tested, 24 were mislabeled because they failed to measure up to grades listed.

Warning letters were sent to manufacturers. A second violation may result in revocation of creamery licenses, he said.

The method of taking a test case to court still is to be determined, Carl said.

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Glen Creek Road Urged as Firehouse Site

A Glen Creek road site for a new Salem fire station across the river will be recommended to the city council by City Manager J. L. Franzen.

The proposed fire station site is property of George and Gladys Surgeons, for sale at \$1,400, with negotiations underway with the city manager and Mayor Walter Musgrave of West Salem. Musgrave, a realtor, said no commis-

sion for his firm is involved in the transaction.

Located on Glen Creek road at Parkway drive, at the new boundary between Salem and West Salem, the property is 180 feet deep and ranges from 160 to 200 feet wide. It offers a down-grade approach for fire engines in several directions, including the Orchard Heights, Wallace road and West Salem areas. The city of West Salem maintains a fire protection contract with Salem already.

Salem's tentative new budget authorizes a new fire station and additional firemen, which together will meet requirements of recently voted shorter hours for firemen and fire protection for the city's recently annexed Kingwood area in Polk county.
