

200,000 See 2-Hour Parade In Portland

PORTLAND, June 10 (AP)—A five-mile "parade," watched by an estimated 200,000 persons, paid tribute in flowers to this city of roses today.

More than 50 floats, bands and marching units thronged from the city's west side across the Burnside bridge to the east side along a route jammed with young and old, sitting on chairs, apple boxes, curbs and even in the streets.

Heading the annual Rose Festival parade which formed at Multnomah stadium were 30,000 gathered was the colorful Butte, Mont., high school band. It was followed by the Honorary Grand Marshal, Gov. John W. Bonner of Montana.

Next was the rose festival queen, Joyce Sommerlade, and her court on a 30-foot float of roses and other flowers.

Fourteen other bands were in the line of march which took two hours to pass a given point.

Sweepstakes Award

The Portland Hollywood district booster club float took the sweepstakes award in the commercial division. It was a 35-foot blue and white float.

A huge pink and white rose entered by the Portland Kiwanis club took the non-commercial sweepstakes.

The Beaverton junior chamber of commerce won first for Oregon cities outside of Portland. The Multnomah booster club was second, Oregon City junior chamber of commerce, third; Salem Chamber of Commerce, fourth; the Dalles, fifth; Newberg Berrians, sixth; Albany Timber Carnival, seventh.

Towed in Parade

For cities outside of Oregon, the Vancouver, Wash., fire department won first place. The Pasadena Tournament of Roses entry was second. It broke down just before leaving the stadium, but was towed in the parade.

Klamath Falls won \$50 as the best band outside of Portland. Benson high received a cup as the best Portland band. Best majorette was Helen Dunn, Jefferson of Portland, \$25; best community band, Cruiser Ontario, \$50; best drum corps outside Portland, The Dalles Boosters, \$25; best Portland drum corps, Portland police, \$25.

Ingrid to Climb Live Volcano, after It Calms Down

ROME, June 10 (AP)—Ingrid Bergman left the luxuries of Rome today to return to barren Stromboli, where she will climb a 3,040-foot live volcano.

The volcano climbing act is part of a dramatic scene in the Swedish actress' newest picture, "God's Earth," now being filmed on the tiny island near Sicily.

But Miss Bergman may have to delay her ascent. Stromboli is belching lava and cinders far more than usual. Reports call it an eruption, but a mild one compared to the blow up that caused six deaths in 1930.

"Miss Bergman is far too valuable a property to risk," said Michael Wilson, RKO publicist.

School Board Candidate Files

H. H. Harris, 2455 Trade St., has filed a petition as candidate for the Salem school board, bringing the total to three who seek the office with the deadline now past.

Harris instructed briefly at the Salem high school machine shop after the war, and has been looking after private interests since. During the war years he was with Multnomah Iron in Portland as production manager and estimating engineer. Before that he was instructor of metal trades at the Eugene vocational school. He once operated a machine shop in Salem and Toledo.

Security Leak Tale Unfolds

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—Extracts from an FBI report said today that two war department aides employed on a "secret Russian desk" were suspected of leaking confidential data to NKVD, the Russian secret police.

Summaries of the full 128-page FBI document, read aloud at the Judith Coplon espionage trial, told a lurid story of alleged Soviet intrigue, shadowy meetings involving U.S. army officers, and death.

The extracts, or so-called "date slips," were found in Miss Coplon's purse when she was arrested with her Russian sweetheart, Valentine A. Gubitchev, 32, a former United Nations employee, in New York last March 4.

Solons Debate Right to Talk About CVA Bill

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—Members of the house public lands committee disputed today over whether it has the right to consider legislation to set up a Columbia Valley Administration.

The group, headed by Rep. Peterson (D-Fla.), was slated to take up reclamation features of President Truman's CVA proposal. It wound up, after considerable wrangling over what it should or should not discuss, hearing a review of the reclamation bureau's Pacific Northwest program.

Reps. Welch (R-Calif.) and Engle (D-Calif.) argued that the CVA bill is before the house public lands committee and the public lands group has no authority to take it up.

Engle said the hearing was designed to promote the coordinated army engineers-reclamation bureau program for Columbia Basin development and at producing opposition to the proposed CVA.

They both consented, however, to let bureau officials describe the program.

An hour later, Murdock adjourned the hearing saying the subcommittee would take "further steps" when the reclamation bureau's report is received officially from the president and the budget bureau.

MARINE DROWNS

TIGARD, June 10 (AP)—Melvin R. Paden, 18, Newport marine, was drowned in the Tualatin river south of here today after a canoe overturned.

Colorado University Student's Body Found Beaten in Stream

BOULDER, Colo., June 10 (AP)—For the second time in seven months a slaying with a Colorado university student as the victim had this community buzzing today.

The body of a star engineering sophomore, Roy G. Spore Jr., 19, of Denver was found, horribly beaten, in the swollen waters of Boulder creek shortly before noon.

It was 75 yards downstream from the spot where he went walking last night with a girl student, Doris Ann Weaver, 18, of Twin Falls, Idaho, near the campus.

The girl suffered several head cuts.

She told authorities she was struck on the head from behind, then saw a man, carrying a weapon in one hand, and with a "terrific look on his face," turn on Spore as he called to her to run to safety.

The weapon the man carried appeared to be a piece of pipe about 18 inches long, the girl said.

The attack occurred seven months to the day—almost to the hour—after the killing of Coed Theresa Foster, 18, of Greeley, Colo. Her beaten and raped body was found two days later, on Nov. 11.

Last month a district court jury convicted Joe Sam Walker, 32, of second degree murder for the Foster killing. Walker, not yet sentenced, is a prisoner in the county jail at Boulder.

Wheat Controls Due to Return

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—An official forecast today of a near-record wheat crop this year virtually assured a return to production controls in 1950.

Controls, which were in effect before World War II but were lifted during the war, would be designed to keep grain supplies from becoming a burden on the market.

Controls could be acreage planting allotments, or a combination of allotments and marketing quotas. Quotas are more restrictive in their effect than allotments alone, because they carry greater financial penalties on those not complying.

A decision will be made by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan, possibly next week.

Demos Agree On Patronage Division Plan

PORTLAND, June 10 (AP)—The democratic party in Oregon has agreed on a new patronage plan for appointive jobs.

Executive Secretary Jim Goodsey explained the plan this way: All federal patronage on the county level or lower will be handled by the national committee-man and committee woman in consultation with officers in the county affected.

On patronage involving more than one county, state officers will be consulted.

Goodsey added that if democrats are successful in the race for governor in 1950, state patronage will be handled by state central committee officers. They will consult county officers where a county job is involved, he said.

Boy Burned, Cable Hits Power Line

OREGON CITY, June 10 (AP)—Jerry Jeskey, 15, Aurora, escaped with a minor burn when a cable on a tractor he was operating broke and came in contact with a 7500-volt power line.

The cable snapped and flipped into the power line while the boy was working on his father's farm.

NORWEGIAN NOVELIST DIES

OSLO, Norway, June 10 (AP)—Sigrid Undset, winner of the 1928 Nobel prize for literature and an ardent crusader against nazism, died today at Lillehammer. She was 67.

Russia Said Stalling Meet

PARIS, June 10 (AP)—Russia put a warmed over German peace proposal before the council of foreign ministers today and was accused of delaying the conference.

At the same time the United States insisted that the meetings adjourn at the end of next week.

The Soviet proposal was the same as that presented at previous conferences in Moscow and London. Informants said it brought from western delegates a demand that the conference quit dancing a "diplomatic minuet" and get down to practical work.

Petition Seeks South River Road Project

Marion county court has under consideration a petition seeking improvement of the South River road, with federal aid funds, presented to it Friday.

Three miles of the road, from Salem's south city limits to Roberts station, has already been approved as a federal aid road, said Marion County Judge Grant Murphy. Work was actually begun on it just prior to the outbreak of the war but was soon halted.

The rights-of-way for the improved road and surveys for it are completed, the judge said, but the project was never revived after the war. A three-mile portion of the road south from Roberts station was reconstructed as a federal project in the 1930's, the judge said.

Federal aid has been concentrated in this area on the completion of the Silverton-Salem highway. First half of this road was rebuilt last summer. Right-of-way troubles, however, will probably eliminate any work this year on the last half, Judge Murphy noted.

The petition presented Friday bears the names of 233 residents of Salem and Marion county, not all of whom live along the south river road.
