Sauces Over Vanilla Ice Cream Make Something Quite Fancy Easily

Just as a hat often makes the costume, so does the sauce frequently make something unusual from rather simple ingredients.

Ice cream of course is the simplest and delectable most frequently served of all desserts in summertime. Just plain old vanilla ice cream can become something pretty fancy by the addition of a sauce or by using it to top fruit or cake.

A hot chocolate sundae for instance, the sort that puts on pounds and takes quite a bit out of the purse when served downtown, can be made easily and inexpensively at home. It's still going to add pounds though.

HOT CHOCOLATE SAUCE
(Good cold, too)
1 square bitter chocolate
12 marshmallows
1 tablespoon sugar
Heat all together to melt chocolate, adding a bit of water to keep it from sticking. Add half cup table cream and bring to just under the boiling point.

WHIPPED BANANA TOPPING
1 ripe banana
1 egg white
Dash of salt
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Slice banana into bowl, add egg white and sugar and vanilla. Beat until smooth and fluffy. Chill. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

Of course, crushed berries, fruit syrups and chocolate sauce such as comes in a can ready prepared, will make something quite important of vanilla ice cream.

A dessert that will really make them love the cook, is evolved by putting ice cream over a halved banana, sprinkling with crushed nuts and topping with whipped cream.

A tall glass hold a scoop of ice cream, then a spoonful of malted milk (just as it comes from the jar.) a little chocolate sauce, then more ice cream and chocolate.
