

Spokes Edge Solons From 3rd

BREMERTON, June 12—(AP)—Spokane swept both ends of a double header with Bremerton here tonight by taking the nightcap 1-1. The Spokes won the opener 2 to 1. The win moved the Indians into third place and shoved the Salem Senators into fourth, a half game behind.

Wenatchee erased a six-run deficit to win the opening game, 12-8, and copped the seven-inning nightcap behind Leroy Stevens' four-hit pitching, 1-0, to sweep a Western International baseball league double-header with the Tacoma Tigers here today.

Dick Greco, the league's leading

home run hitter, clouted his 14th and 15th round-trippers of the season, both with the bases empty, and contributed an inning of shutout relief pitching to the losing Tiger cause.

The nightcap saw Bob Johnson's perfect pitching record shattered as the 41-year-old Tacoma manager yielded a first-inning run on singles by Jim Warner, Hal Rhyme and Neil Bryant.

A sore arm caused Johnson's retirement with two out and no aboard in the fourth.

Haly Rhyme Jr., Wenatchee first-baseman and the league's leading hitter, collected two triples and a single in five trips and batted in three runs to lead the Chiefs

in the opener, then singled in two times at bat in the nightcap before being forced to the sidelines with a sprained thumb.

'Scala Night' Canceled as Sox Suspend

BAYONNE, N. J., June 12—(AP)—How does it feel to be dropped from major league baseball, just when the mayor of your home town was going to present you with an automobile in Yankee Stadium?

"It really hurts," says Jerry Scala.

The Chicago White Sox optioned Scala to the Oakland Oaks of the West Coast league last week. Tonight they suspended him indefinitely when he refused to report.

"Three thousand miles is a long way away when you have a sick mother. Besides, I know I can play major league baseball. I've proved it and I want to stay up there."

Jerry batted his way up from the Bayonne sandlots, and started his major league career in the Chicago White Sox outfield this year. He is 22.

A home-town committee had arranged a "Jerry Scala night" in connection with the Chicago-New York game in Yankee stadium this Tuesday, and Bayonne residents who remembered him on the sandlots paid nearly \$8,000 in ticket purchases and contributions.

Mayor Charles Heiser was going to present Jerry with a new car.

"It felt great to be up there," said Jerry.

But last Wednesday word came that Scala would be optioned.

So there went Jerry Scala night and the automobile. The committee had to refund the money and cancel the car purchase.

Saturday the Sox cancelled the option on Scala and sent Outfielder Earl Rapp to Oakland. Scala now will stay with the Sox, and is to report Tuesday in New York.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12—(AP)—Two double-run homers tied and won, 5 to 4, for Portland in a 13-inning opener today over San Francisco and a final inning score added the seven-inning nightcap, 3 to 2, in their Pacific Coast baseball league series.

The doubleheader wins stretched Portland's winning streak to five games and nailed down the series six games to one for the Beavers.

Second Baseman Eddie Basinski's two-run homer in the 13th inning gave Portland the first game. The Beavers were trailing, 3-1, going into the last half of the ninth when Outfielder Joe Brovia poked out his homer with a teammate aboard.

In that first game, San Francisco had scored in the first inning when Brooks Holder walked, Walt Judnich doubled, moving Holder to third. He then came in on Mickey Rocco's ground out. The Seals added two more in the third when Frank Shofner and Lodigiani singled. Roy Partee doubled to score Shofner and Lodigiani came in after Roy Nicely's fly out was caught.

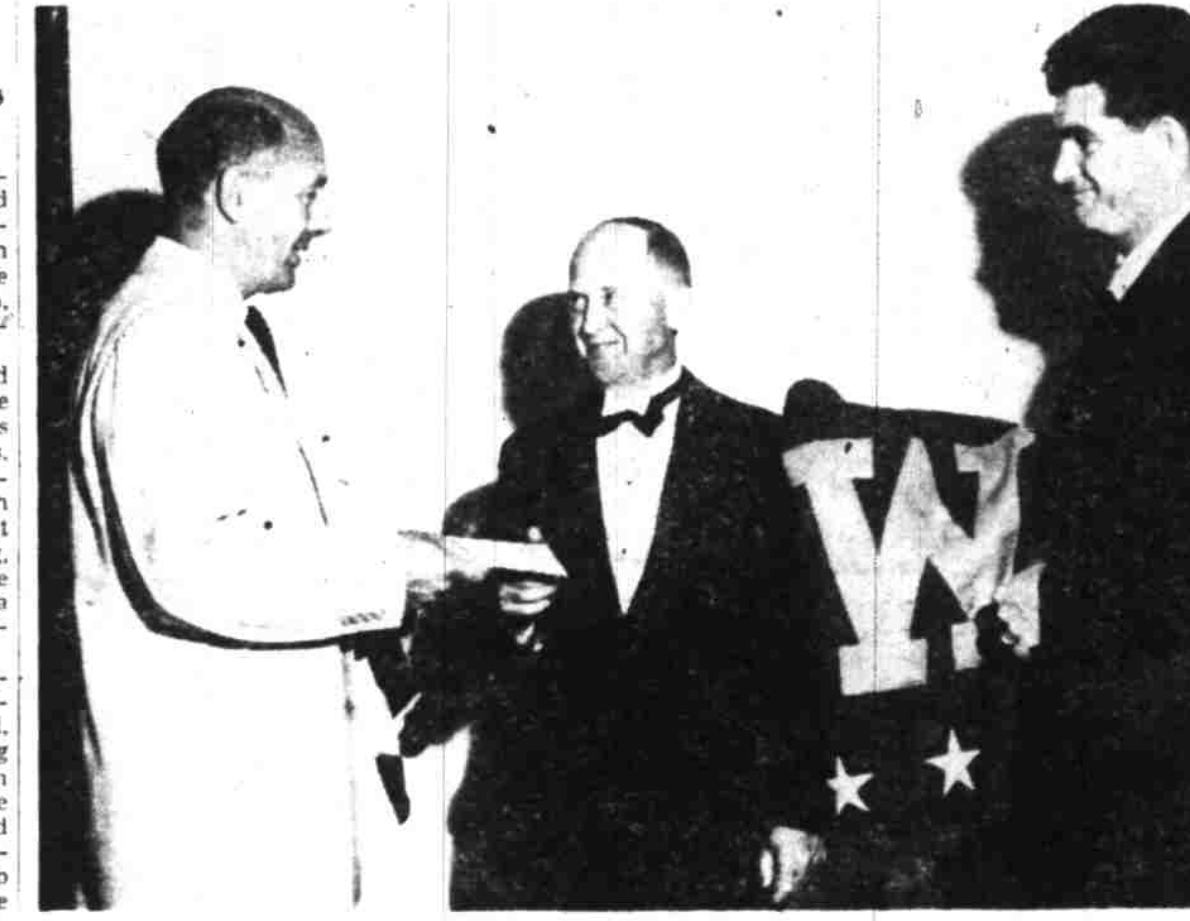

Dodgers Stage Scoring Spree

Lead Stretched to Two Games over St. Louis

NEW YORK, June 12—(AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers staged the biggest scoring spree of the season's major league campaign today, romping to a 20-7 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds.

Gil Hodges and Billy Cox featured the bombardment of seven Red pitchers by belting two homers apiece and driving home eight and six runs respectively. One of Hodges' homers came with the bases loaded.

The Dodgers, who now have won seven straight, whacked out 13 hits and a hit batsman. The rout enabled the Dodgers to stretch their lead to two games over the runner-up St. Louis Cardinals.

St. Louis divided with Philadelphia 7-3 and 8-3. The Braves split with Chicago 2-0 and 6-2.

Ralph Kiner exploded his 14th home run of the season in the seventh to give Pittsburgh a 6-5 triumph over New York.

The Cleveland Indians took a twin bill from the Yankees, 6-0 and 3-1, before 77,343 fans, largest major league crowd of the season. The setback staved the Yankees' American league lead over Detroit to three games. The Tigers dropped Washington twice, 9-0 and 6-5.

Bob Lemon blanked the Bombers on six hits and slugged a two-run homer in beating Ed Lopat in the opener. The whitewashing was the Yanks' first in 113 games.

Hal Newhouser held the Senators to four hits in posting his first shutout and seventh victory of the season in the opener at Detroit.

Boston captured two games from the White Sox, 15-3 and 7-5. The A's divided with the Browns, 13-10 and 6-4.
