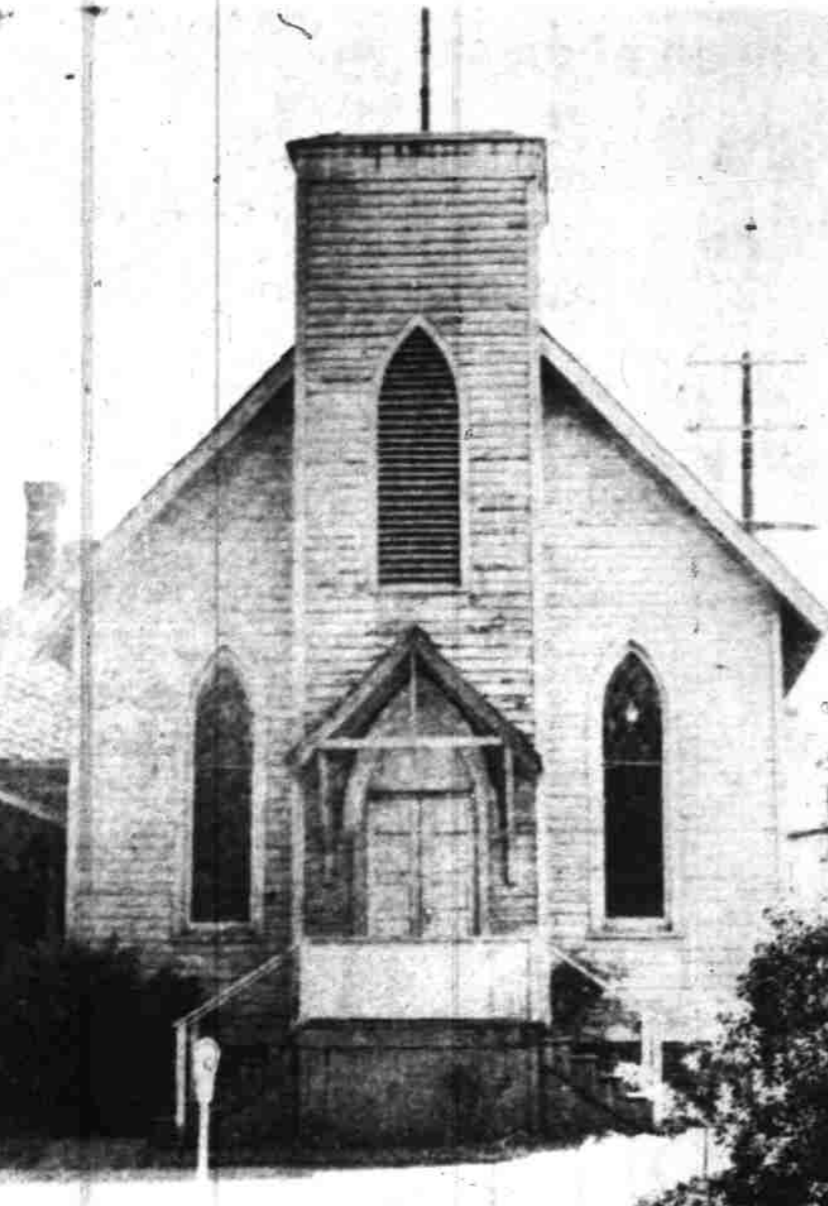

The Air Ministry put it more prosaically but it boiled down to the same thing:

Women may join the R.A.F. as full fledged members of the service, although not as flying fighters, starting Feb. 1.

The ministry said the R.A.F. will

enlist and commission women 18 to 36.

Their sex has made up the Women's Auxiliary Air Force (W.A.A.F.). This now becomes the Women's Royal Air Force. The latter will be merely the name for women in the R.A.F.

ISTANBUL, June 12 (AP)—The police scratched their heads in bewilderment.

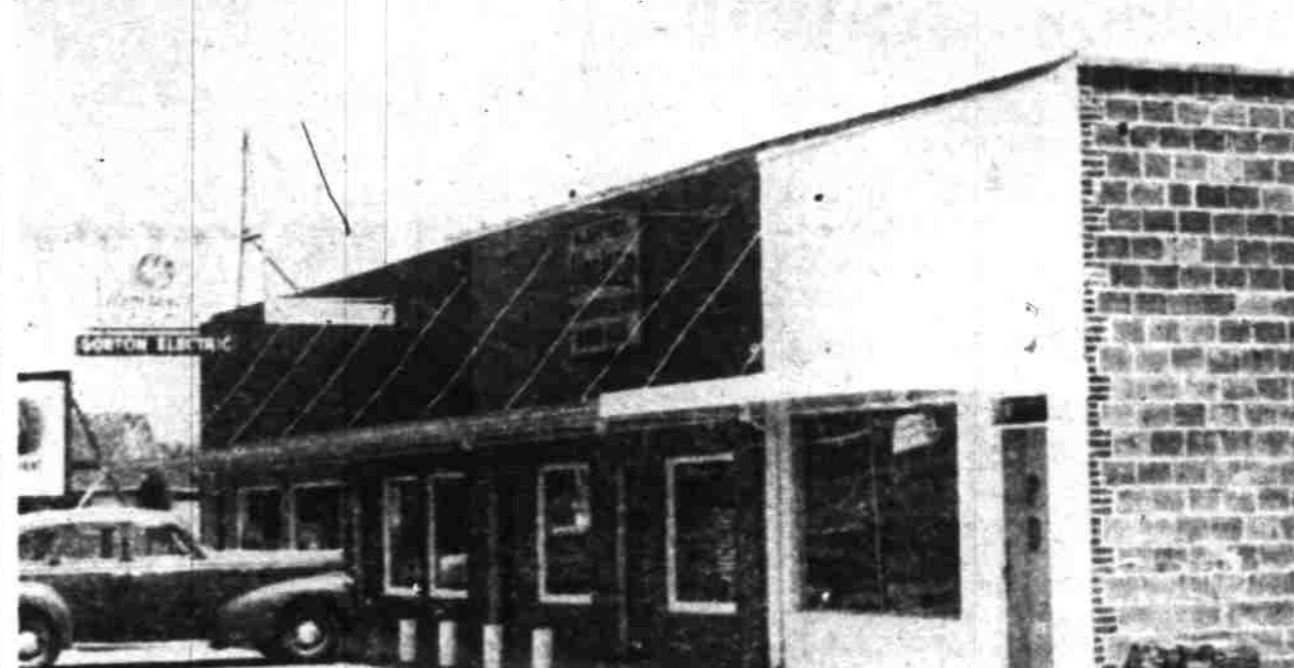
The jewel robbery had all the hallmarks and refinement of a thief well known to the police. But it couldn't be he, because he was in prison for an earlier robbery.

Sellout Welcomes First Allied Books Released in Japan

TOKYO, June 12 (AP)—The first dozen allied books under the occupation translation program have reached bookstores throughout Japan.

Two, Lloyd Douglas' "The Robe", and former Ambassador Joseph C. Grew's "Ten Years in Japan", were sold out before they reached the shelves.

Advance orders for the Grew book have exceeded 92,000, and for Douglas' novel 10,000.

In all, 40 translations of allied books have been cleared by the translation committee of the Japan publishers association. All are to reach the shops in a few weeks.

Several hundred others have been cleared either on a non-royalty or blocked yen basis.

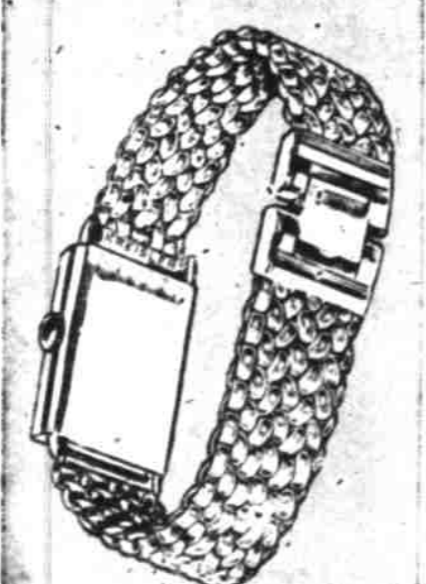
