Mrs. Condit was born Clara C. Robbins, of pioneer parents, on the old Dexter Robbins donation land claim, three miles west of West Stayton. She rode horseback to school which stood on what is now the Leonard Walker farm. She has seen two new schoolhouses there since then.

In 1894 she married Silas Junius Condit in the old "haunted house" on what is now the Bowman place. Mr. Condit died in 1932.

Except between 1902 and 1905 when the family lived near Tualatin, she has always lived in the Willamette valley. She now resides with her daughter, Augusta Denham, a teacher on the old home place, and her other daughter, Mrs. Carl Gibson lives on the farm adjoining. She has one grandchild, Carvel Gibson, Thomas and Jerry Thomas.

Mrs. Condit's hobbies are gold-fish and gardening. She crochets, knits and pieces quilts. A straw-berry patch takes much of her time, and she does housekeeping with dishwashing, laundering and housework, despite her age.

In our family almost every outdoor meal in summer begins with a tossed salad.

The "tossed" affair begins with head of lettuce, preferably fresh from the garden, and may include and that's A to Z. The latter is one of many things from a garden that is designed to cut down the summer vegetable bill.

Green onions of course must go into almost every salad, radishes are included when they're useable successive plantings aim to provide radishes all summer, but sometimes there's an intermission between crops) Tomatoes, peppers and cucumbers come along in mid-summer, various greens such as spinach, chard, cabbage and corn salad bolster up the green end of the mixture and provide a bit of tang.

The avocados, though a variety, sometimes appear just to add variety to the mixture.

Cooked vegetables too, make good salad ingredients in summer. Beans, corn, cooked squash and beets will help with the flavor interest. Carrots of course can be used either raw or uncooked.

Our family menu often continues with a casserole dish of some sort that can be served not too hot. Here are two good examples of covered dish for such meals.

**ITALIAN SPAGHETTI**  
1 package spaghetti  
1 cup butter  
1/2 cup each, diced onion, celery, green pepper  
1 quart solid pack tomatoes  
1 can bouillon or consommé  
1 small can tomato paste  
1 teaspoon each salt, sugar, paprika

1 pound ground beef  
1/2 pound salt pork  
1 tablespoon butter  
1 small onion minced  
1 1/2 cups rice or spaghetti  
1 large can tomatoes  
1 small can peas  
1 small can ripe olives  
1/2 pound grated American cheese

Grind meat, cook pork in pan until crisp. Add onion and cook 3 minutes. Add beef and cook 20 minutes. Stir, drain and add cooked rice and rest of ingredients (retaining half for top). Put in casserole and add rest of olives, pimientos and cheese on top. Cover with tinned cornflakes, dot with butter. Bake in hot oven till brown (400 degrees for 30 to 40 min.)
