

Frisch Holds Strategy Meet

No Immediate Changes Due on Chicago Nine

CHICAGO, June 13-(AP)—Frankie Frisch held a strategy meeting today aboard the train which whisked him to his home debut as new manager of the Chicago Cubs against the Philadelphia Phils tomorrow.

Frisch, accompanying the Cubs on the long overnight rail ride from Boston, was closed in a drawing room much of the way with the man he succeeded as field boss, Charley Grimm, and Richard (Red) Smith, scout and trading ambassador.

It appeared unlikely there would be any immediate lineup changes for the club whose reins Grimm surrendered in a surprising Bruin reorganization which kicked Grimm upstairs to vice-president. In the huddle, it was believed Grimm and Smith briefed Frisch on the talent, or lack of it, he inherited from Grimm.

If the triumvirate came up with any ideas of landing a new long-ball hitter, or two—a want Frisch already has expressed—the Cubs must act quickly. The major league trading deadline expires at midnight Wednesday.

Frisch today nominated Bob Muncief, recently acquired from the Pittsburgh Pirates, as his starting pitcher against the Phils. "I'm not planning any lineup changes for a game or two, until I've had a chance to meet the boys," he said.

Frisch said he hopes he has the makings of a five-man starting mound staff among Emil (Dutch) Leonard (with whom he toured Europe in battlefields with U.S.O. baseball troupe); Johnny Schmitz, Walt Dubiel, Bob Rush, Bob Chipman, Bob Muncief and Warren Hacker.

NEW YORK, June 13-(AP)—The professional football "war" sizzled like the weather today with the announcement that the Chicago Bears were sending Bobby Layne, T-formation quarterback, to their national league brothers, the New York Bulldogs, for a bundle of cash and two players.

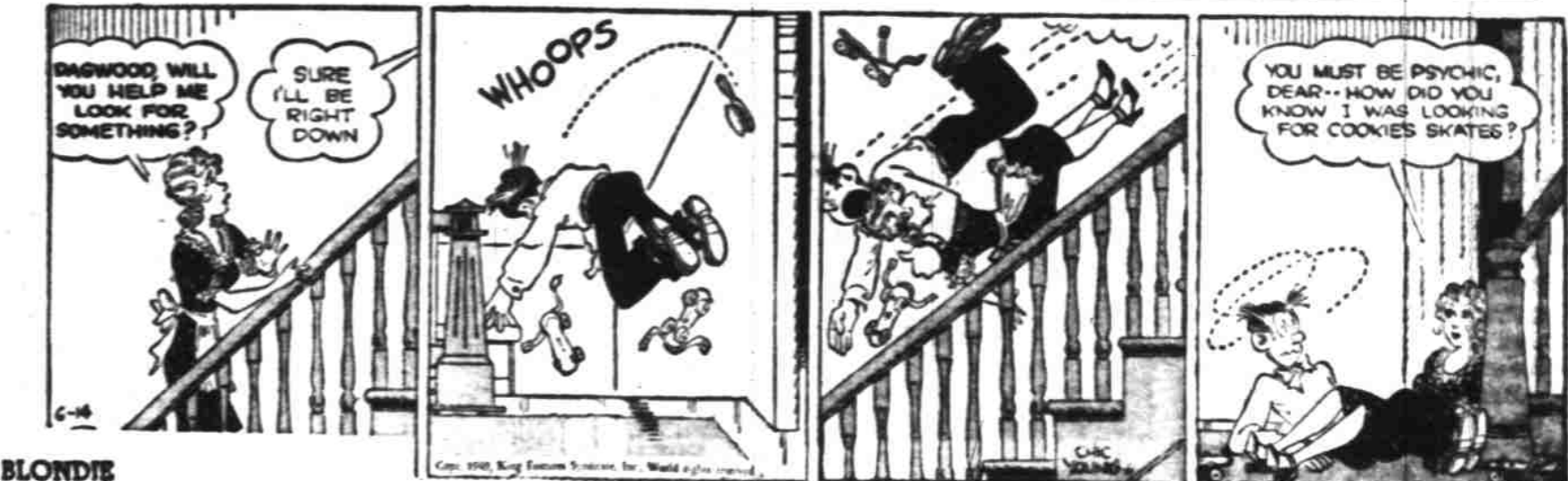
Ted Collins, owner of the Bulldogs, who are moving into the polo grounds next fall from Boston to seek a share of the metropolitan football gravy, fearlessly pronounced the deal "the biggest in the history of the national league."

Layne, who led the University of Texas Longhorns to two southwest conference titles and was an all-conference selection for four years from '44 through '47, joined the Chicago club last season but was used sparingly because of injuries.

His transfer to the Bulldogs means that Collins has landed the outstanding passer he has been seeking with which to battle the combined Brooklyn-New York club of the all-America conference for the favor of local fans next autumn. The two leagues from the rival leagues will be in direct and bitter competition for patronage on several Sundays.
