

St. Paul's Episcopal Church Has Anniversary Ceremony

More than 400 members of St. Paul's Episcopal church, friends and local townspeople, attended a double anniversary ceremony at the church Tuesday night.

Occasion was the 100th anniversary of acquisition of land for the Salem church and the 20th anniversary of arrival here of the Rev. George H. Swift, rector.

The church was overflowing during the special services and confirmation service. Many more persons attended the reception following.

A new Buick sedan awaited the Rev. and Mrs. Swift when they came out of the church after the service. It was a gift from members of the parish. Mr. Swift received a set of China from the eight women's guilds of the church.

The Rt. Rev. Benjamin D. Dagwell, bishop of the Oregon diocese, was the main speaker at the church service. Fifteen persons were confirmed and the full choir sang during the confirmation with Ruth Bedford as organist.

The observance centered around the parish house, constructed in 1854 as the first Episcopal church here and now the oldest public building still in use in Salem. The present church was built 25 years ago. St. Paul's now has plans underway for eventual building of a new church.

Sing resided in Salem since 1922. He operated the Shanghai cafe from 1923 to 1935 and the Canton Tavern from 1935 to 1940. Later he built and operated a restaurant at Delake.

He had been in ill health prior and had been retired from active participation in the restaurant business.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Dora Jung Sing of Salem; sons, Ernest Jung Sing of Delake and Harry Mun Gate of Portland; daughters, Mrs. Alice Chan of Portland and M. Sgt. Helen Ng Mun Tayne with the WACS at Fort McPherson, Ga.

Fire Destroys Mill at Eugene

EUGENE, June 14.—(P)—Fanned by a stiff north wind, fire this afternoon destroyed the Arkley Lumber co. on the west side of town, and partially damaged the neighboring Spicer Lumber co.

Cause of the fire has not been determined. The Arkley mill had been closed down for a month.

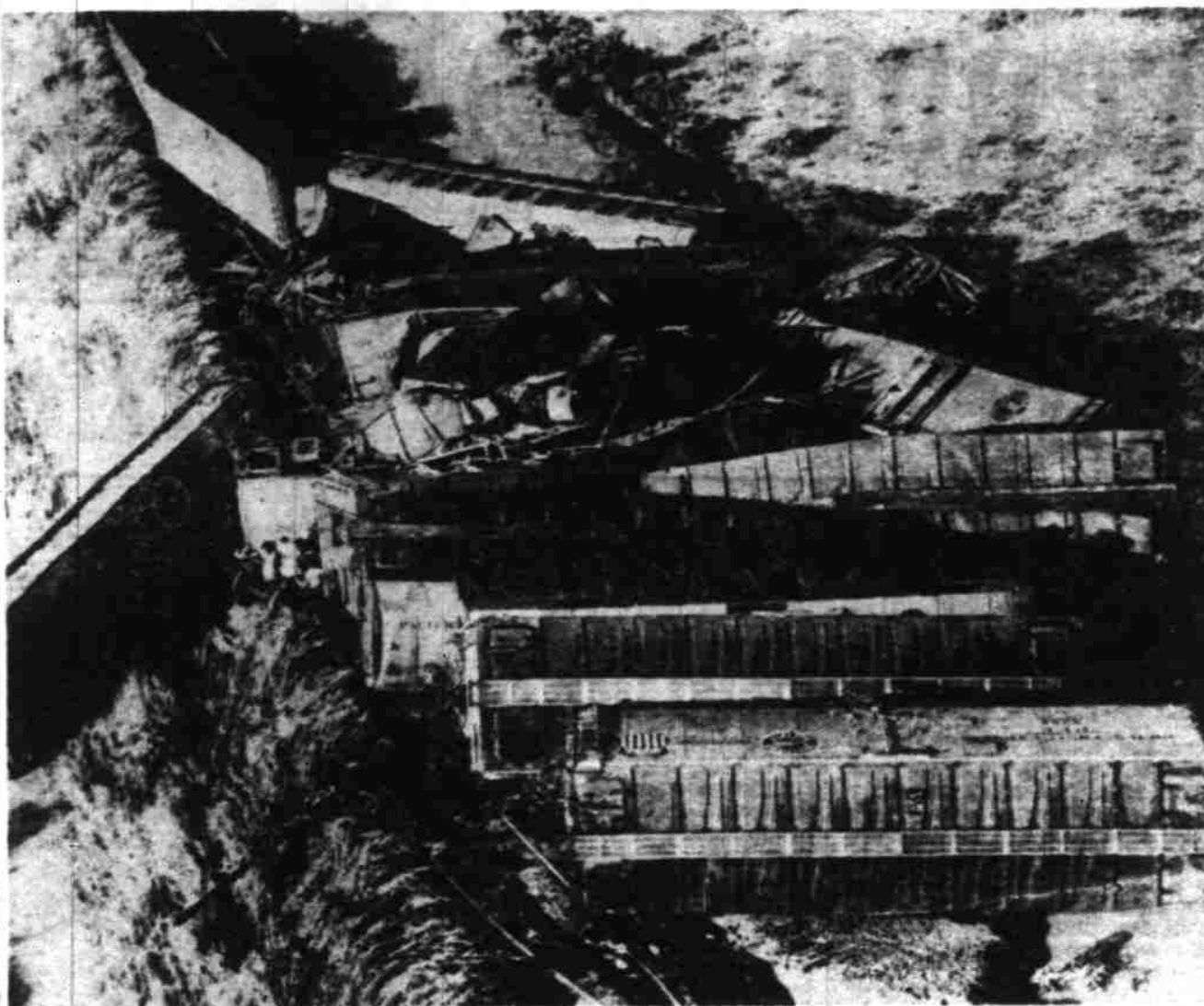
Unofficial estimates place the value of the burned mill at \$25,000 to \$50,000.

Judge Kelly Once Lawyer In Linn County

Justice Percy R. Kelly, who died Tuesday, was born in Arlington, Iowa, July 13, 1870, the son of C. C. and Mary Jane Whipple Kelly. He was educated in the public schools of Iowa and Oregon, and received a B. S. degree from Albany college in 1887.

He was admitted to the Oregon bar in 1892, after reading law in the office of the late Charles E. Wolverton, and practiced law in Albany until 1911. He was married to Margaret Dawson Gillette in Portland in 1910.

In his earlier years, he was state senator from Linn county (1898), deputy district attorney of Linn county (1899-1903), city attorney of Albany (1909), and was circuit judge for the third judicial district of Oregon from 1911 to 1930.

Judge Kelly was named to the state supreme court by ex-Gov. A. W. Norblad in 1930 and had served since that time. He was chief justice in 1941-42. He was a member of the Elks, Pythians, a Shriner and past grand master of the Masons.

On March 23, 1946, the Marion county bar association was host at program in Salem honoring Judge Kelly on his 35th anniversary as a judge. Joint sponsors were attorneys and judges from Linn, Polk, Tillamook and Marion counties— which comprised the third district when he was circuit judge.

Quick Action Of Boy Scout Boon to Girl

MIDDLE GROVE, June 14.—As a result of quick thinking by her Boy Scout brother, a 10-year-old Middle Grove girl was improving today, after suffering severe cuts on both wrists Saturday.

The brother is Leonard Hammer, Jr., 14, a student at Parrish junior high school. When the container in which Marie Ann was making a cool drink broke, it cut both her wrists. Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Hammer, Sr., were both away working, so Leonard used one hand to slow the blood flow in the worst cut wrist and with the other arm picked up their 1½-year-old brother.

They ran to the nearest phone about three blocks, where Leonard called a doctor and arranged to meet him at the hospital. Then he applied tourniquets to halt bleeding, and a neighbor drove them all to the hospital.

With Marie Ann getting treatment, Leonard called his parents and let them in on the happenings. Several stitches were required in the girl's wrists.
