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Liberalizing Social Security Aim of Union

Salem union leaders will present a resolution calling for liberalizing the federal social security act at the 46th annual state federation of labor convention next week in Eugene. About 50 representatives from Salem unions are to attend the sessions which open Monday.

The Salem resolution will request that the federal social security act be modified so that worker and employer contributions be raised to 5 per cent instead of the current 1 per cent, said Barker.

F. D. VanSwearingen, business agent of the Salem Building Trades council, and others will be on hand this week end in Eugene to attend the state meetings of painters, culinary alliances, retail clerks, and state building trades council.

The bulk of the local delegates will leave Monday headed by Herbert Barker, executive secretary of the central labor council and F. J. Boehringer, executive board district representative. Barker is vice-president of the convention committee on laws and legislation.

Topics which will probably come up for considerable discussion, Barker said, include the Taft-Hartley act, Columbia River Valley authority and socialized medicine.

Seth Thompson Silent on Plans To Quit Post

Gov. Douglas McKay announced here Wednesday he had not yet been advised by Seth Thompson, state insurance commissioner, whether he would accept reappointment for another four-year term. His current term expires June 30.

Thompson recently expressed a desire to retire from the office but Governor McKay urged that he continue. Marion county firemen, in recent convention, also asked Thompson to continue in office. By virtue of being state insurance commissioner, Thompson also is state fire marshal.

Several other appointments are scheduled by the governor within the next few weeks.

A successor to the late Justice Percy R. Kelly of the state supreme court will be selected by Governor McKay. Justice Kelly died here Tuesday.

The term of A. C. Cammack, Portland, a member of the state civil service commission, expires late in June along with the terms of Dr. Louis P. Gambee and Mrs. Thomas Honeyman, both of Portland, as members of the state public welfare commission.

William F. Toomey, Portland, has resigned as a member of the advisory committee to the state veterans affairs commission because of poor health.

Boyd, formerly district sales manager at The Dalles, replaces T. G. Wise who was promoted to the position of northwest sales manager at Seattle.

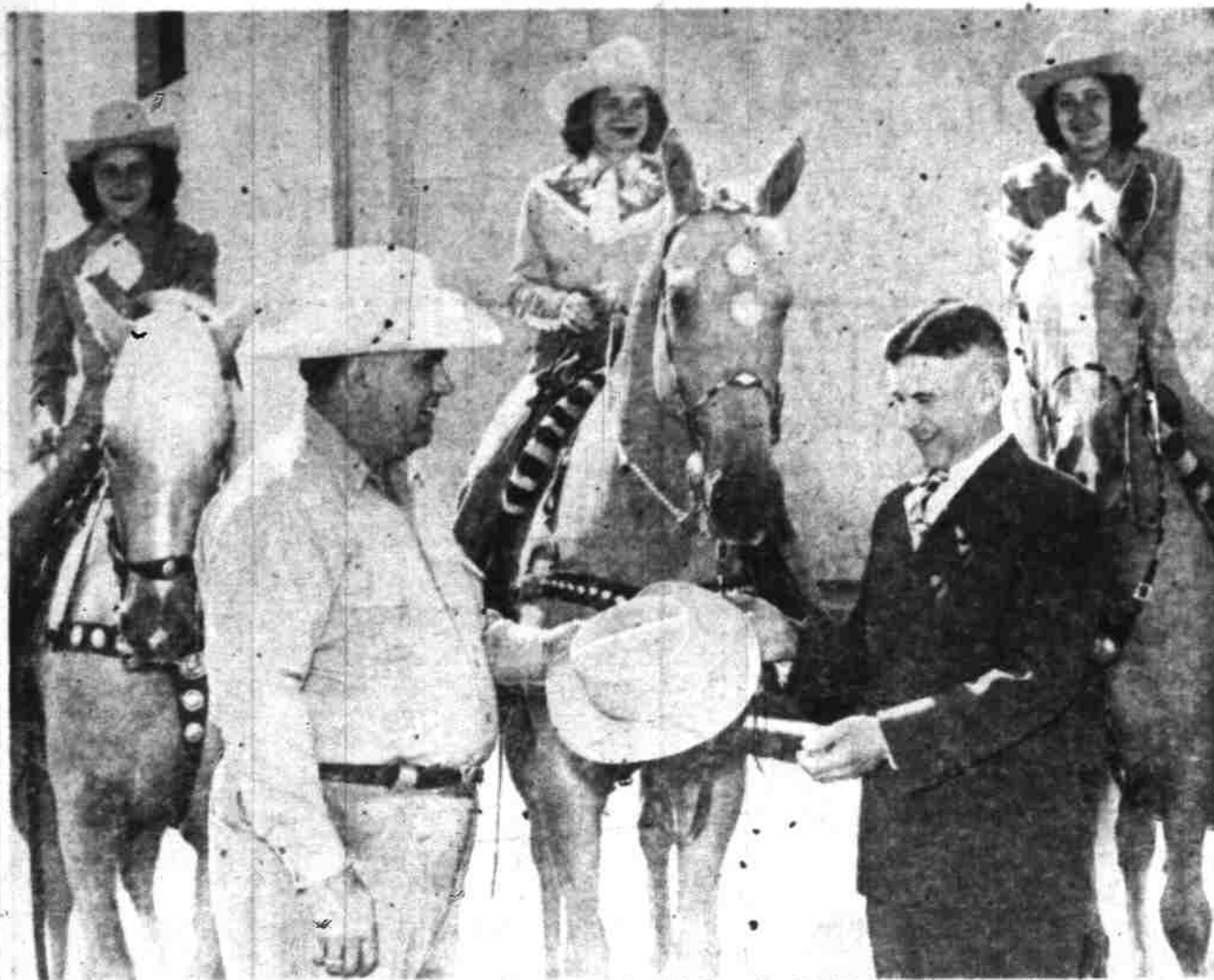
Mr. and Mrs. Boyd have three children and have purchased a home at 2070 S. High st. The new manager has been associated with Union Oil nearly 20 years.
