If you're an epicure and a woman who likes to make unusual foods as well as eat them, perhaps these two recipes will please. The products are exotic and very "different."

Walnut pickles are an old-time English delicacy and one that's paid for in good money these days and to be found only in shops that carry imported foods.

On Etiquette

Q. Is it permissible to place one's hand on a person's shoulder or arm while talking with him?

A. This is not necessary, and is very annoying to some people. Of course, in a matter of condolence, it is often done, even to the holding of the person's hand while talking.

Q. Is it all right to use the telephone to thank a person for sending flowers?

A. Yes, and telephone immediately. A note of thanks, however, is still better.

Q. Should one always keep the mouth closed while eating?

A. Yes; after the food is in the mouth the lips should be closed while chewing.

The pickled walnuts utilize the nuts when they are green, and a needle or metal skewer can be thrust through the green outside and the immature shell inside. This is usually done about this time of year.

PICKLED WALNUTS

For 100 green walnuts.
1 ounce ground pepper
1 ounce ginger
1/2 ounce cloves
1/2 ounce nutmeg
2 cups brown sugar
2 quarts vinegar

Gather the walnuts late in June or early in July when they are soft enough to be pierced with a needle. Cover with a brine made of 1/2 cup salt to 2 quarts water and let stand for about ten days, changing brine two or three times during that time.

Put spices in a large bag and into a pan. Add nuts and pour in the vinegar and boil all together for a few minutes, then let stand over night. Drain off the vinegar and if not very strong, add new vinegar. Put walnuts back in and boil all together for a few minutes. Drain walnuts, put vinegar into the preserving kettle, add the sugar and boil for five minutes. Pack walnuts into clean, hot jars and strain vinegar solution over them to fill jars. Seal.

The pickled walnuts will be black, and are usually sliced when served.

Here's recipe which we've never gotten around to trying, but have wanted to for many years:

WALNUT SAUCE

Use young, green walnuts that can be pierced with a needle. Grind through meat chopper. Be careful of hands as walnuts will stain them badly.

1 quart ground walnuts
1 tablespoon salt
1 teaspoon ground mustard
1/2 teaspoon cloves
Dash of nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1 1/2 cups water
2 tablespoons sugar

Mix well. Simmer very slowly for 1/2 hour, but do not allow to boil. Cover and let infuse for two hours, strain and bottle, processing 10 minutes. Seal.
