

Senate Votes Non-Red Oaths For Labor Bill

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—The Truman labor bill took on more of the look of the Taft-Hartley law today as the senate voted to require non-communist oaths of union and company leaders.

The amendment was added to the bill by a voice vote, and then the senate turned to the red hot issue of how to handle strikes which threaten the national welfare.

The first big test of the labor law debate will come on that matter. It touched off an explosive argument.

There are now six plans before the senators for dealing with national emergency strikes, in-

cluding a modified version of the Taft-Hartley provision for court injunctions against them.

Separate Deals
A plan sponsored by Senator Ives (R-NY) was made the pending business, which means it probably will be voted on first. Under it, congress would deal separately with each critical strike—for example, a prolonged work stoppage in the coal industry.

The amendment has no injunction provision and, just before he offered it, Ives struck out a section which would have let the government seize struck plants under certain circumstances.

Senate approval of the non-communist oath provision brought to four the number of Taft-Hartley features which have been written into the administration bill. Three other provisions related to the present law were adopted yesterday.

Repeat T-H Bill
The administration bill would repeal Taft-Hartley and replace it with a slightly altered version of the old Wagner act. That is

the bill President Truman wants passed, but it is clear now that the senate is not going to meet his request. The house didn't either in its first go at labor legislation.

The amendment the senate adopted today would require both union and company leaders to swear that they are not communists, fascists or members of any subversive organization. Unless they did, the union or company could not take cases before the national labor relations board.

Rites Held In California for Henry Kurtz

Army Divulges Security Leak In Germany

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—The army announced tonight it is investigating to determine who is leaking "confidential" information from Germany.

The announcement followed a published report from Frankfurt that others besides Gordon Clapp had been labeled "unemployable" by the army.

When it was divulged recently that Clapp, chairman of the Tennessee Valley authority, had been called unemployable for a lecture assignment in Germany there was a furor and a senate investigation.

The army acknowledged an error, apologized to Clapp, and explained it had meant only that he was unavailable. There was no intention to reflect on his loyalty, it stressed.

A New York Herald Tribune dispatch from Frankfurt yesterday said the following also were classed as "unemployable."

Dr. George S. Counts, a Columbia university professor prominent in the New York liberal party; Roger Baldwin, director of the American Civil Liberties union; Dr. Theresa Wolfson, professor of economics at Brooklyn university; Professor Kimball Young of Northwestern university; and Professor John H. McConnell of Cornell university.

The new report that others had been also tagged "unemployable," brought a statement from the army that "the use of this term was never intended as connoting a 'blacklisting' of individuals by the army."

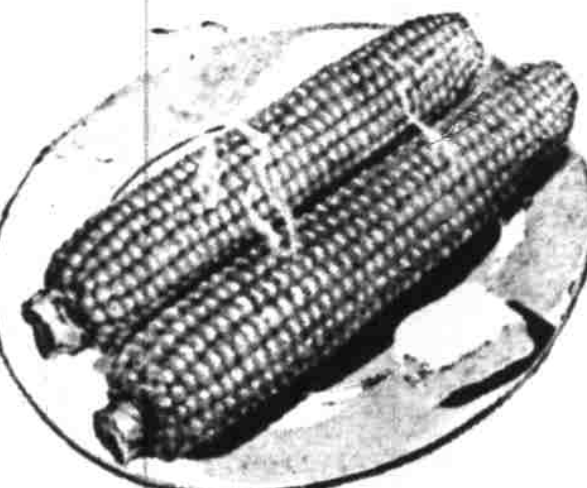
