

Census-Takers to Visit Salem - Businesses Starting Monday

A few questions about Salem businesses, many of them the type of information sought by businessmen, will be asked here beginning Monday by five enumerators for the federal bureau of the census. In charge is Carl J. Gilson, Portland, district supervisor.

Gilson said the average form is only one page long and will take about 10 minutes to complete for businesses grossing under \$100,000 annually.

The survey, which has connection with the federal population census due next April, will ask five major questions — payroll, number of employees, lines of merchandise sold, gross receipts and type of legal ownership.

Recent estimates indicate that the census results will show amazing growth since the latest such census, in 1939, when total national income was \$72,532,000,000 and total wages and salaries in private industry \$37,519,000,000.

When the figures are tabulated, they will show conditions and comparisons for business over the nation, as well as for establishments in each city and county.

Approximately 3,000,000 firms over the country are due to report their 1948 activities for the census. It will be the first in the new five-year series, since such reports were formerly taken every decade.

Following the local survey, Gilson, who is in charge of 11 north-west Oregon counties, will make Salem his headquarters for checks on surrounding towns.

Scripps Buys Into The Dalles Paper

THE DALLES, June 23—(AP)—The publisher of The Dalles Chronicle, Robert S. Howard, reported today that Scripps Newspapers, Inc., Seattle, has purchased an interest in the Chronicle.

Howard will remain as publisher and president of a new corporation, Western Publishing company, E. W. Scripps will be chairman of the board.

The Scripps organization publishes papers in Utah and Idaho and operates radio stations KNEW at Spokane and KVN at Coeur d'Alene, Ida.

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Wheat Suffers Frost Damage

ENTERPRISE, Ore., June 23—(AP)—A survey showed today that heavy frost damage was suffered by the Walla Walla county wheat crop last Friday.

County Agent Garney Best said the over-all damage might reach \$60,000, about 5 per cent of the county's expected \$1,200,000 wheat crop. He reported that damage ran as high as 10 or 20 per cent in a few areas.

West Salem Playground In Operation

WEST SALEM—A daily summer playground program has been organized here by the city and school district 24, at Rosemont avenue and Plaza street. Rainy day programs will be held in the junior high school.

The schedule, in effect now Monday through Friday, will operate from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Morning activities include play, games and story hour. Handicraft and group games will feature the afternoons. Joan Ann Walsh is playground director.

Rainwater Plus Osmotic Pressure Splits Cherries

If cherry trees had been given a good shaking after the week-end showers almost no cracked or split fruit would have resulted, says John R. Roberts, professor of biology at Pacific University.

Dr. Roberts explained that sweet cherries split apart rain because osmotic pressure draws water through the skin of the fruit, which is permeable membrane. A permeable membrane, he says, is one through which liquids pass under pressure. Rainwater clinging to the cherry will go through the cherry skin to thin the juice and the skin breaks under the pressure.

Federal Employees To Get Late Pay Checks

PORTLAND, June 23—(AP)—President Truman signed an \$862,563,000 deficiency appropriation bill today—and that meant good news for hundreds of federal employees in Oregon.

The bill was signed on what would have been pay day for many forest service employees, but—since funds had run out—wasn't. Checks will be available by the end of the week.

Pharmacists Withdraw from National Group

PORTLAND, June 23—(AP)—The Oregon State Pharmaceutical association withdrew today from the National Association of Retail Druggists and then discussed possible affiliation with the American Pharmaceutical association. No formal action was taken, however, on joining the American association.

The 400-member Oregon group pulled out of the national association after Oregon Association president L. L. Riggs, lambasted the national secretary, John W. Dargavel of Chicago.

Riggs charged that the secretary had established a virtual oligarchy under which "members of his executive committee yield to his dictates." Riggs also contended that Dargavel had refused to release audit reports, had attempted at times to purge state secretaries, and had instituted "gag rule" against delegates from New York, Iowa and Oregon, at the 1947 national convention.

Burglars Enter Office Building

Salem police are investigating the prowling of 19 professional offices in the Lively building which occurred Wednesday night or early Thursday.

The offices entered and ransacked were those of doctors, dentists and other professional persons. They were located from the third to eighth floors. Filing and record cabinets and drawers were smashed.

Police reported that only about \$26 was missing from various offices. Office door locks had been forced, police found Thursday morning while investigating, and several unsuccessful attempts to crack safes were noted.

The building is closed at 5:30 p.m., police said, and a night-watchman is on duty from midnight until morning. No means of entry was uncovered by police but it was indicated that the prowlers might have been in the building before closing hours and remained after the doors were locked.

Mutilated Body Of Boy Found

LANSING, Mich., June 24—(Friday)—(AP)—The "sexually mutilated" body of a four-year-old boy was found in a downtown alley early today.

Police headquarters identified the boy as Walter Eaton, son of construction worker Leslie Eaton. Walter's cut and slashed body was found after his parents had reported him missing from home. Desk Officer Jack Keller said at headquarters that a "tall, slim man" was being sought.

Bradley Opposes Pay Rise System

WASHINGTON, June 23—(AP)—General Omar Bradley argued today that nearly two-thirds of the proposed \$302,000,000 in pay increases for the armed services will go back to the federal treasury in income taxes.

The army chief of staff spoke of the present pay system, which dates back to 1908, as a relic of the "horse trolley" and "gas light" age.

He told the senate armed services committee that the army, navy and air force must have career incentives to attract future leaders.

Farmer's Daughter Had Good Time, But 'Salesman' In Jail

ASTORIA, June 23—(AP)—The farmer's daughter had a wonderful time but the guy she left with is in jail at Houston, Tex.

Glib, young Leroy Allcorn, charged with writing worthless checks here, has the same charge against him at Houston, Sheriff's Deputy Don Larfield said today. The farmer's daughter, Mrs. Marguerite Marshall—who wired her father yesterday, "Having wonderful time,"—was with Allcorn but was not held when Houston police made the arrest, Larfield said.

Sheriff Paul Kearney started looking for the 20-year-old Allcorn when farmer E. M. Butts complained that his daughter disappeared the same time that Allcorn left in a 1949 car bought with a \$2,550 check which also bounced. So did the \$125 check given Butts son for a radio.

Houston police reported that the car was recovered. So was a shotgun taken from the Butts home.

Earlier, Larfield said, Butts reported that his daughter sent from Houston the telegram saying she was having a wonderful time.

Houston plans to prosecute Allcorn rather than release him to Clatsop county.

Poliomyelitis Preparedness Drive Forms

Organization of personnel and facilities prepared should poliomyelitis break out in the Salem area has been accomplished, and is being perfected, the Marion county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis announced Thursday.

A committee from the chapter would act in an advisory capacity for local physicians in treatment of cases and in an informational role for the public. The group would also arrange, in extreme need, for securing of extra doctors from the foundational polio equipment center at Portland.

Salem Memorial hospital medical staff has authorized Dr. Harold O. Schneider, its chief, to name a group of doctors to work as a team in a polio emergency, with the aid of Dr. Lewis D. Clark and Dr. Robert F. Anderson, who recently attended a special polio conference in Denver.

The hospital, equipped this year with a physiotherapy department for polio victims and others, is also sending Mrs. Adam Lefor, superintendent of nurses, to Ohio for a conference on nursing in polio treatment.

Eugene Area Milk Price Hearing Held

EUGENE, June 23—(AP)—Proposed milk price changes in the Eugene area now rest in the hands of the state milk control board.

Producers, distributors and consumers testified at a public milk price hearing for the Eugene milkshed yesterday.

Distributors argued there should be no downward price revision because operating and labor costs are still high. Retailers demanded that there be no cut in their two-cent-a-quart margin.

The big Eugene milkshed extends from immediately south of Portland to the California line.

A number of producers from Mt. Angel who entered the Eugene market a year ago testified they were having difficulty getting along on the present milk price.

Liquor Board Ends Distillery Trusteeship

PORTLAND, June 23—(AP)—The Oregon state liquor control commission today formally terminated the trusteeships over the distilleries bought by Oregon and Washington during the war.

That ended the last of the wartime deal which enabled the two

states to provide whiskey during the shortage.

The commission decided not to cut prices on light wines below the regular market. The policy will be to avoid competing with private firms in wine sales.

A proposed salary boost for agents in 111 state liquor outlets also was considered, but there was no definite action. The matter will be taken up again later.

The commission decided to close its liquor agency at Maupin because the operation has been unsatisfactory.

Dr. Benes Says Diplomacy 'Just Hard Work'

A diplomat has his exciting moments, but most of his experience is just hard work, according to Dr. Bohus A. Benes, who arrived Sunday in Salem as a visiting professor in political science for the Willamette university summer session.

Benes had served in Czechoslovakian diplomatic service for 30 years up to 1948 and has been a newspaperman covering various diplomatic conventions for several European newspapers since 1931.

Following the Czech government's exile in 1938 he set up and edited the official newspaper organ in England, "The Czechoslovak," in 1939 and had that post until 1945. Besides his news writing he has written a full-length novel "God's Village."

After he resigned in 1948 from the Czech consular service in San Francisco, Dr. Benes has taught at University of California at Berkeley the past school year. He will return there this fall.

Dr. Benes' interest lies not only in international affairs. He is a strong family man and has a lively interest in sculpturing.

He speaks with pride of the accomplishment of his handsome 17-year-old daughter, Muska, who won one of 19 national scholarships to Wellesley college while a student at Berkeley high school this year.
