

Elliott Raps 'Elder Statesmen' at Young Republicans Conclave

SALT LAKE CITY, June 24—(P)—Robert Elliott of Portland, Ore., Multnomah county chairman, threw the National Young Republican convention into an uproar today with a strong attack on the organization's "elder statesmen."

Elliott, a 32-year-old veteran, asserted that "these elder statesmen are enemies" of the young republican movement.

"Young people will not come in to the party unless they know they will get a part in its program," he said in the convention hall.

"Too many times we travel across the nation to listen, listen, listen to what these persons have to say to be herded into a room and told what to do."

"I say it is time that we begin to talk, talk, talk instead."

"Is there a grass roots movement in this convention? If so, I want to hear about it from this convention floor because if these so-called elder statesmen are upstairs cooking up something they think they can put over tomorrow, I believe they will find they are very much mistaken."

Reference to Election

Elliott's sharp comments were obviously in reference to behind-the-scenes tugging over officers to be elected tomorrow and policies of the federation.

Members of the Oregon delegation have voiced support for Laughlin E. Waters, California state legislator, in his bid to become federation chairman. Waters has supported the state tax program of Gov. Earl Warren of California.

Elliott's remarks were followed an hour later by the withdrawal of Alex Akerman of Florida as a candidate for the federation chairmanship.

Aks Waters' Election

Akerman, describing himself as "almost an elder statesman" said he hoped his supporters would transfer their allegiance to Waters.

Akerman, who is 39, said "Mr. Elliott's remarks were of much interest to me as a discussion of what this convention needs and for that reason I am withdrawing from my campaign for the chairmanship."

His announcement caused another brief but noisy flurry of cheers on the convention floor.

Police Raid Hobo Camp

Twelve men left town Friday after pleading guilty to vagrancy charges in municipal court. Their arrest followed a city police raid on a hobo camp in the city's southwest freight yards. Five day jail sentences on each were waived on their promise to "move along."

Three others arrested at the same time were committed on failure to pay \$15 fines on charges of intoxication.

Police said they tried to break up the transients' encampment without the mass arrests, but the group returned an hour after being warned.

13 State Jobs To Be Raised To \$7,200 Pay

Salaries of 66 state officials and administrators will be raised effective July 1 when increases for all state employees go into effect.

Thirteen of the officials will be raised to \$7,200 a year, most from \$6,600. These are the state superintendent of public instruction,

state agricultural director, liquor control commission administrator, state budget director, public welfare administrator, each of the three members of the state industrial accident commission.

Members of the state accident commission also are members of the state unemployment commission.

The deputy superintendent of Fairview home will receive \$6900 while the state engineer, deputy attorney general and adjutant general will receive \$6600.

Salary of the state penitentiary warden is upped to \$6420 while 22 officials will be raised from \$5500 to \$6000.

The latter group includes the state game supervisor, master fish warden, secretary of the state retirement board, deputy state treasurer, superintendent of banks, unemployment commission administrator, director of veterans affairs, deputy public utilities commissioner, insurance commissioner, director of geology and mineral research, deputy superintendent of state police, state printer, secretary state board of control, parole and probation supervisor, state librarian, clerk of the state land board, secretary to the governor, real estate commissioner and assistant adjutant general.

The new salary scale has been filed with the secretary of state who issues most of the warrants.

Child-Slayer Search Starts In Michigan

LANSING, Mich., June 24—(P)—A statewide manhunt was set off today for a sex slayer who last night slashed a little blue-eyed boy to death near the state capitol.

Several suspects were questioned in the brutal crime, unnamed in Lansing police records, but all were released.

The victim was four-year-old Walter Eaton. His friends called him "Peewee."

Two men found the partly clad, mutilated body in a dark vacant lot about midnight. It lay among a group of 50-gallon drums.

Doctors said Peewee had been sexually assaulted "while he was either dead or dying." His throat had been ripped open, apparently the cause of death.

The boy disappeared as he was walking home from a show, trailing behind an 11-year-old foster sister.

Salvation Army Buys House For Officers

Local Salvation Army officers soon will be living in quarters at 1115 N. 13th st., which the organization recently purchased.

Announcement came Friday night from Capt. R. B. Lesher who said quarters had been rented here for 54 years. Legacies and receipts from a booth at the state fair made the purchase possible.

The group's budget for 1950 was approved by the advisory board at a Friday night meeting at the Spirit restaurant. Arrangements were made for members of the board and their wives to visit Treble Glenn camp near Oregon City in July while the camp for spastic patients is in session.

The Rev. Walter J. Knutson, a Lutheran pastor, moved that the "committee go back to the laws of God." His motion was defeated.

WAGE BILL ADVANCES

WASHINGTON, June 24—(P)—The senator labor committee today unanimously approved a bill to increase the present minimum wage of 40 cents an hour to 75 cents.

The report, drafted by a city club committee after six months' research, proposed a waiting period of 30 days between filing of intent to divorce and filing of a divorce complaint.

It also suggested a family counseling service, and recommended further study of a "family court" which would handle marriage and divorce questions.

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Smith Warns Solons Against 'Health' Laws

WASHINGTON, June 24—(P)—Francis W. Smith of Salem, Ore., told Oregon and Idaho congressmen today that an estimated 6,000 persons in their states had signed a petition opposing what he called "socialized medicine" legislation.

He presented the petition to Reps. Norblad, Stockman and Ellsworth, Oregon republicans, and Rep. Sandborn (R-Idaho).

Smith, whose home is Salem, Ore., is general manager of credit bureaus, Inc., which operates in the Boise Valley of Idaho and throughout Oregon, except in Portland.

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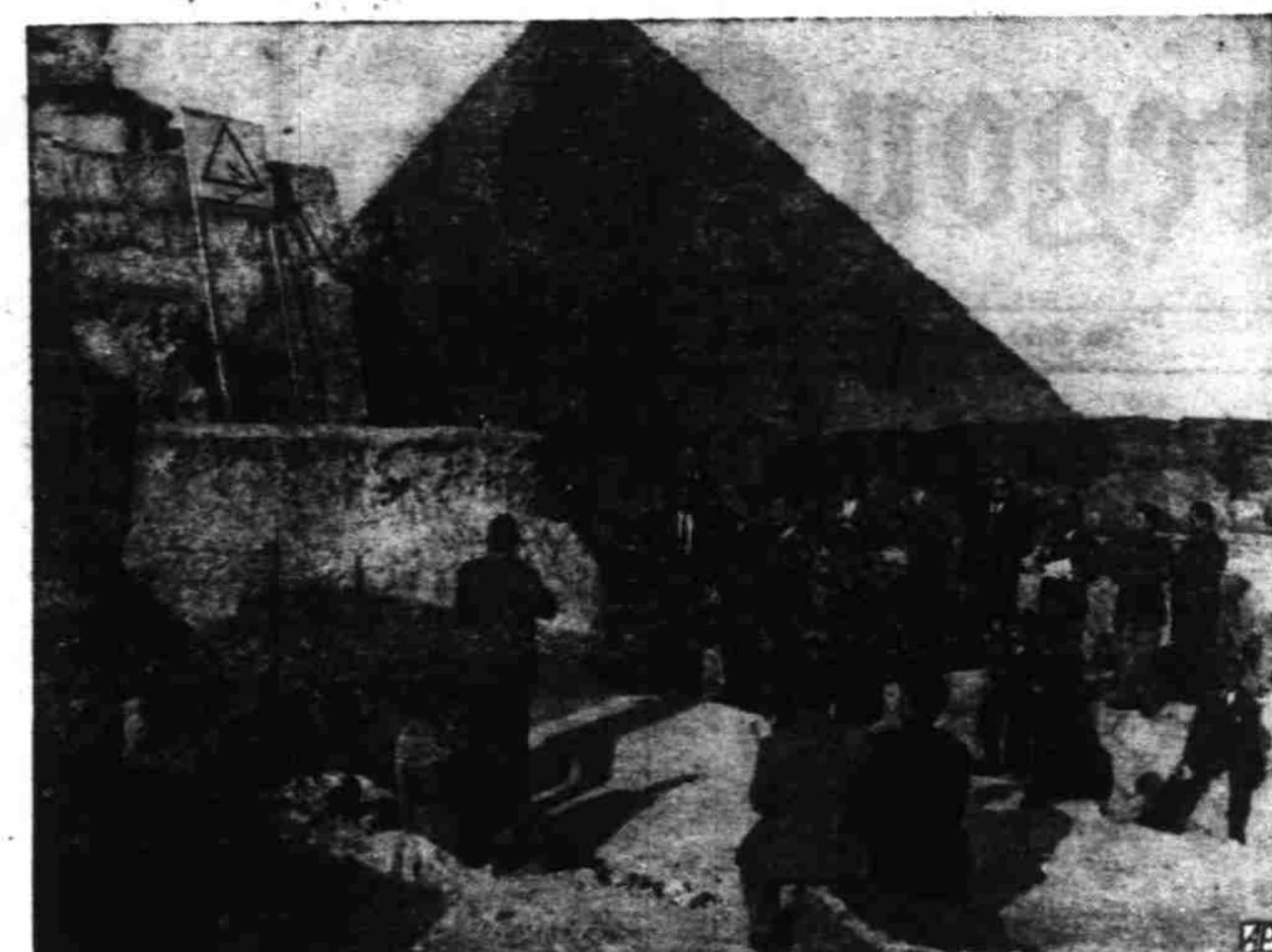

Filibuster in Housing Bill Debate Denied

WASHINGTON, June 24—(P)—Housing debate exploded in charges and denials today that the opposition is filibustering to kill President Truman's big bill for slum clearance, publicly-owned housing and farm housing aids.

Meanwhile, 10 house republicans offered a substitute bill, embracing most of the administration proposals, but adding loan features for building 350,000 privately owned housing units.

The 10 rebelled against the house GOP policy committee, which has taken a firm stand against public housing legislation.

When Rep. Francis P. Bolton (R-Ohio) offered the 10-republican bill, Rep. Shafer (R-Mich) insisted that every word of the long and detailed document be read.

Rep. Marcantonio (Ann Labor-NY) jumped up and suggested that the opposition is opening a filibuster. Shafer denied this, saying the house should know what is in the substitute. Unusually proponents are given opportunity to explain their proposals instead of taking the time of the house for detailed reading.

Although filibustering intent was denied, there were signs that the opposition wanted time to consolidate its forces, and therefore maneuvered to delay important voting until next week.

Some of the opponents are trying to whip up a substitute bill that will eliminate any provisions for publicly-owned houses.

He is Warren A. DeLauney, 33, of Oceanside. The driver of the car, Jack Charles Eberth, 20, Salem, was cited by State Patrolman Wallace Ummel on a charge of driving on the left side of the center line on a blind curve.

AFL Political Drive Mapped At Convention

EUGENE, June 24—(P)—The Oregon Federation of Labor closed its annual convention today after mapping plans for a widespread political education program in the state.

The 400 odd delegation nominated President J. D. McDonald, Portland, and all other officer for reelection to another two-year term.

In its closing session, the labor group unanimously adopted a resolution declaring that the 1950 election campaign began today in Eugene. The resolution called for the immediate organization of congressional district leagues for political education, local county leagues, and other education groups at precinct level.

Phil J. Brady of Portland will head an Oregon league to be organized for the 1950 campaign. It will coordinate the work of the local leagues with the national group.

Officers of the four congressional districts will be elected.

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
