Summer Change

Taste for Tropical Fruits Comes in Summertime When Fresh Fruit Lags

About this time of year, when the home canned foods are pretty well picked over and the fresh things are only beginning to come in, we have an appetite for tropical fruits.

Pineapple always tastes good "for a change".

The other day we turned the label over and found several pretty good ideas for utilizing pineapple.

One idea was to bake with rolls of sweet potato on top.

Another suggestion was to combine with salmon or tuna as a salad.

Glazed pineapple was to be served on pineapple slices as a third way to serve the fruit.

But there are more unusual ways to serve pineapple than the canners recommend on their labels.

For instance, combine avocado and pineapple for an attractive fruit mixture, or pineapple chunks with cucumber slices and French dressing for a vegetable-fruit mixture. Other salads using pineapple are made by garnishing the slices with green pepper rings and decorating with cream cheese; by putting half a peach slice on the pineapple ring and topping with tea room dressing mixed with a generous number of nuts by alternating grapefruit and orange sections with the pineapple slices which have been quartered and sliced in half.
