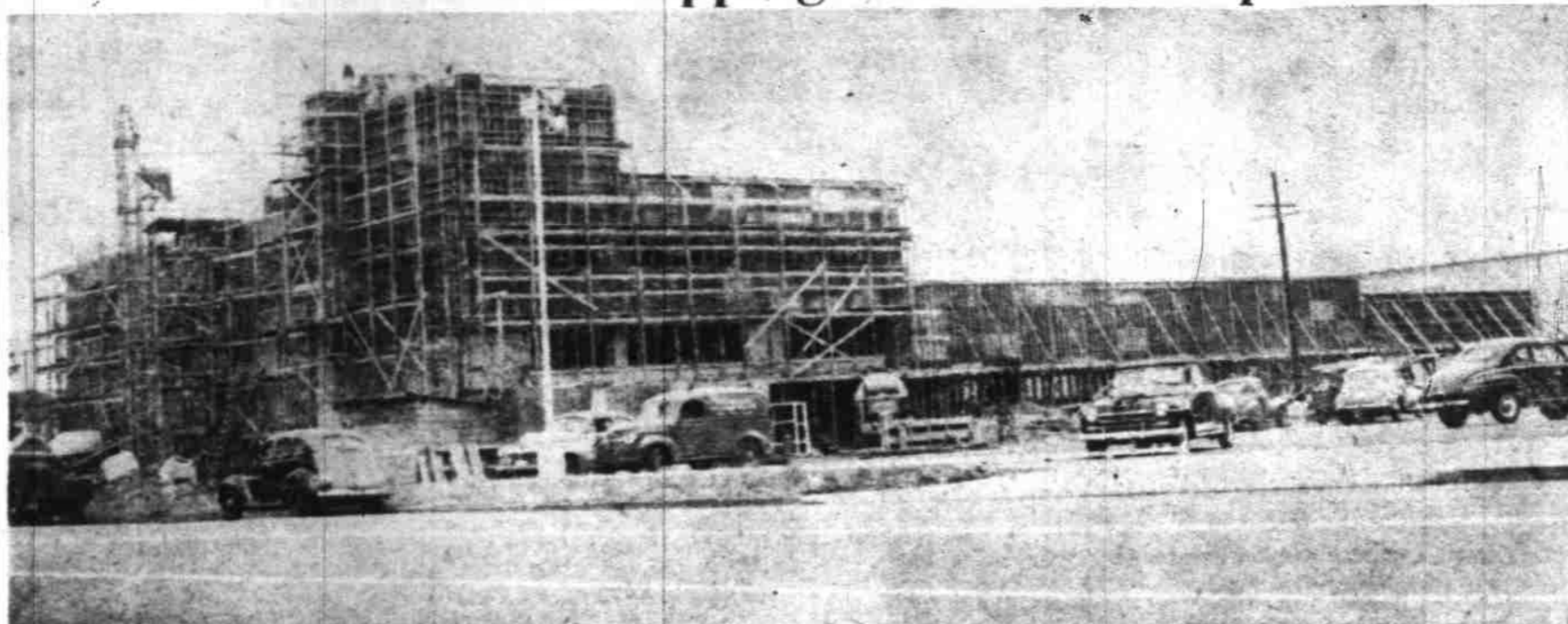

Eighteen men completed civil service examinations for jobs on the Salem fire department.

A few of them will be on the pay-roll in less than a week. Fire Chief W. P. Roble said Friday night, twenty-one additional firemen start to work July 1 when shorter working hours go into effect from department members. Most of these men will be drawn from an older waiting list, however.

All of the new men will receive five days of intensive drill before they are assigned to permanent duties, said Roble.

Men who took Friday's examination and are not employed July 1 will comprise a new waiting list effective for two years.

Cherry Picker Supply Short In McMinnville

McMinnville with a call for 250 additional cherry pickers was the only local office in the state reporting a shortage of farm labor, the state employment service announced Friday.

In other areas, including Salem, seasonal agricultural workers will continue to be needed, but at present all calls are being filled, the employment officials said.

A total of 10,848 farm placements were made last month, a gain of 40 per cent over a year ago. Caneberry picking has started in the upper Willamette valley, but so far the labor supply has been adequate, picking in higher areas, strawberry picking is completed and most of the cherry crop has been gathered, employment officials said.

6 Indicted by Marion County Grand Jury

Six persons were indicted Friday by Marion county grand jury, which also issued one secret indictment and returned two indictments as "not true."

Indicted were the following, all but one of whom are in the county jail:

Richard Carter, 1275 S. 12th st., on a charge of unlawful management of a watercraft, alleging that he caused another boat to overturn May 30. Carter, who is free on \$500 bail on this charge, is facing trial next month on a charge of receiving and concealing stolen property and is to be sentenced in July after pleading guilty on a charge of larceny.

Selma Frances Fones, 303 S. Winter st., on a charge of larceny of about \$1,100 from Willamette university, where she has been employed. She was to plead Friday in district court but waived preliminary examination and was bound over to the grand jury.
