

AAU Cinder Tourney Set Today

America's Top Stars Entered

FRESNO, Calif., June 24 (AP)—World and national records will be in jeopardy tomorrow night when America's greatest track and field athletes assault times and distances in the 61st annual AAU senior championships.

Stars on the ground today included Lloyd Labache of Panama, world's co-holder for the 100 and 200-meter dashes; Herb McKenzie of Jamaica, who holds the fastest marks in the 400-meter and quarter-mile run; and Harrison Dillard, greatest hurdler in history.

Dillard, a Baldwin-Wallace graduate, established the world's record time of 13.6 for the 120-yard high hurdles. His duels tomorrow night with Craig Dixon are expected to provide some of the highlights of the evening. Dixon, of the University of California at Los Angeles, heads all college timber toppers this season and has a 13.9 time to his credit.

Louise Suggs Upsets Patty

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 24 (AP)—A sensational finish carried professional Louise Suggs to a 1-up semifinal victory today over defending champion Patty Berg of Minneapolis in the women's western open golf tournament.

The triumph sent the Little Georgian into tomorrow's 36-hole championship match against another veteran professional, Betty Jameson of San Antonio. Miss Jameson held off a late challenge by amateur Polly Riley of Fort Worth to win 2-1.

The two finalists are both former western titleholders. Miss Suggs won the event in 1946 and 1947. Miss Jameson triumphed in 1942, and won the western amateur in the same year.

Tomorrow's match will be the first meeting between the two women although they have been in competition for 10 years.

Budge, Kovacs Capture Wins

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., June 24 (AP)—Don Budge of Los Angeles and Frank Kovacs of Oakland, Calif., complete an all-favorites semi-final with easy, straight-set victories today in the national professional tennis championships.

The second-seeded Budge conquered Elwood Cooke of New York, seventh-ranked, 6-3, 6-2, 6-2. Kovacs, No. 3, expelled eighth-seeded John Nogrady of New York 6-2, 6-4, 6-4.

They joined the top-ranked Bobby Riggs of Altadena, Calif., and fourth-seeded Welby Van Horn of Philadelphia who attained the round of four yesterday.

Harrison Still Canuck Leader

TORONTO, June 24 (AP)—E. J. (Dutch) Harrison cooled a bit today but managed to maintain a three-stroke lead at the three-quarters point of the Canadian open golf championship.

The big, leisurely-playing pro from Little Rock, Ark., fired a 71 on his third round of the par 72 St. George's course to wind up with a score of 204 for 54 holes. Dick Metz of Virginia Beach, Va., turned in his third straight round of 89 to trail by three strokes at 207. Tied at 208 were Jerry Barber of Los Angeles and Fred Hawkins of Antioch, Ill. Bill Kerr of Montreal had 210. Another stroke away at 211 was Charles (Chuck) Gongdon of Tacoma, Wash.

Martin Signs With Cardinals

ST. LOUIS, June 24 (AP)—Pitcher Fred Martin today became the second league-jumper to rejoin the St. Louis Cardinals.

Owner Fred M. Saigh signed up Martin this afternoon, reportedly at \$7,500—which is what he was making when he skipped to the Mexican league in 1946. Martin had been with Sherbrooke, in the Quebec Provincial league. He said he had a record of four wins and four losses, adding quickly that the team was in last place.

Gussie Moran Upset; Yale Oarsmen Press Hits Falkenburg Shock Harvard

LONDON, June 24 (AP)—Gertrude "Gorgeous Gussie" Moran of Santa Monica, Calif., the darling of the Wimbledon tennis championships, bowed out of the women's singles event today in the first week's greatest upset.

Her red-ribboned pigtail bobbing, the fourth seeded Miss Moran went down to Gem Hoahing, a tiny Chinese ballet dancer from Hong Kong, 6-2, 5-7, 6-3, in the third round.

She will be missed from the singles. With her beauty and lace-trimmed parties she brought a spice to Wimbledon that had been lacking in the postwar years of dominance by other American women, who just came and conquered with routine perfection.

The Little Gem, well under five feet tall and short to play the net, never left the baseline. But there she swung back Gussie's attack with the dependability of a grandfather clock.

Gussie smiled bravely as she walked out of the famous center court, cheered by 14,000 fans. But she left some sad faces among the newsmen and fans, who gawped for her the greatest personality since Suzanne Lenglen of France 25 years ago.

Behind the scenes the Wimbledon championship committee expressed concern at British press treatment of Bob Falkenburg of Beverly Hills, Calif., the defending men's singles champion. Some of the newsmen have bounced Bob because he withdrew from mixed doubles, refused interviews and ousted through two sets Thursday in beating Josef Asboth of Hungary.

Falkenburg teamed with Jaroslav Drobny of Czechoslovakia Friday to beat Pierre Geelhand and Jacques Peten of Belgium, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4 in the second round of men's doubles. Top-seeded Geo Schroeder and Gardner Mulloy ousted Britabers A. J. Della Porta and H. Watkins, 6-1, 6-0, 6-4.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 24 (AP)—Yale's varsity crew scored the rowing upset of the year today by beating Harvard in a four-mile upstream race on the Thames river.

Yale had not beaten Harvard since 1935, and the lighter, less experienced Elis, who won by a margin unofficially estimated at half a length, were deemed underdogs today.
