

Senators Divide Pair With Bremerton, Play Spokane's Tonight; Dodgers, Yanks Hold League Lead Margins; Cards Win, A's Split

Tiger's Mullin Hits 3 Homers

Furillo Leads In 22-Hit Triumph

BROOKLYN, June 26.—(P)—The Brooklyn Dodgers maintained their half-game National League lead over the St. Louis Cardinals and the New York Yankees protected their healthy four-and-one-half game American league edge today.

Brooklyn shot up the Pirates in Pittsburgh 15-3, in the first game of a doubleheader. The second was called after three innings with the Dodgers ahead, 5-4, because of Pennsylvania's Sunday curfew. The Cardinals blanked the Boston Braves 2-0, behind the brilliant four-hit pitching of Red Munger. Munger also belted his own cause with a fifth inning homer off loser Glenn Elliott.

The Yanks divided a doubleheader with the Detroit Tigers before 69,392 fans at the stadium, winning the opener, 6-2, but losing the nightcap, 12-4. Tiger outfielder Pat Mullin clouted three homers and a single in the finale and drove home five runs.

Second-place Philadelphia also divided a twin-bill. The A's beat the Chicago White Sox, 4-2, on pinch-hitter Wally Moses' three-run eighth inning double but lost the second game, 3-0.

The Boston Red Sox took over third place from the Tigers by two percentage points, downing the last place St. Louis Browns, 5-3, behind the steady seven-hit pitching of Chuck Stobbs. Whitey Platt and Sherm Lollar accounted for all of St. Louis' runs with homers.

Steve Gromek pitched the Cleveland Indians to a five hit 3-1 triumph over the Senators in Washington. The Cincinnati Reds damped the pennant hopes of the third place Philadelphia Phils, winning twice, 4-3 in ten innings and 5-2. Dixie Howell broke up the first game with nine-hit double. Herm Wehmer scattered eight Phil hits in besting Hank Borow in the finale.

Lefty Dave Koslo halted New York's four-game losing streak by pitching the Giants to a 6-2 triumph over the Chicago Cubs. Koslo yielded seven hits.


Carl Furillo was the big gun in the Dodgers' 22-hit triumph before 39,548 fans, largest crowd of the season, at Pittsburgh. Furillo cracked out five hits in as many trips, including a homer and a triple. He drove in four runs and scored four.

McNulty Cops 6-2 Victory

Lose 17-1 in 'Cap, Remain in 5th Place

ROOSEVELT FIELD, Bremerton, June 26.—(Special)—Bremerton and Salem divided their Western International league doubleheader tonight, the Salems winning the opener 6-2 on Ray McNulty's three-hitter and seventh victory of the year, and the Bremertons coming back for a lopsided 17-1 conquest in the nightcap. The split ended the series with each team winning two games.

Salem now returns home to open a long home stand, starting with Spokane Monday night.

The split also kept Salem from climbing out of the fifth place spot in the standings.

Bud Spuser was the lesser in the nightcap, being knocked out in the second inning when Bremerton tallied seven runs. Bill Taylor's bases-loaded triple was the big wallop in the rally. Salem was held to five hits by Keith Simon, two by catcher Roy Carlson. Another was by Mel Wasley, a single that broke Wasley's slump at 32 times at bat. He had failed to hit in 31 consecutive trips to the plate.

In the opener a five-run blast in the second inning off Johnny Marshall was enough for victory, and Marshall himself tossed in a couple of errors during the inning to help his own downfall. Wasley walked to begin with and Bob Cherry lined a single to left. Larry Orty bounced to Marshall who erred, allowing one run to class. Bob Hedington grounded to Marshall also, and he immediately threw wildly to first base, allowing Cherry to score. Wayne Peterson singled to center.

McNulty allowed only three hits in posting his seventh win of the season. He was wild, walking seven, but only in the fifth when the Brems able to score off him. Salem picked up another unearned counter in the seventh off Reliefer Dave Dahl. McNulty whiffed six.

For Marshall, it was his fourth loss of the season, as against 14 wins. High in the league. Both Bob Cherry and Wayne Peterson batted four of the six hits the Salems got. Only four hits were cleared off Marshall in six heats, three in the final second.
