The Cardinals blanked the Boston Braves, 2-0, behind the brilliant four-hit nitching of Red Munger. Munger also helped his own cause with a fifth inning homer off loser Clonn Filiott.

The Yanks divided a doubleheader with the Detroit Tigers before 67.382 fans at the stadium, winning the opener, 6-2, but losing the nightcap, 12-4. Tiger Outfielder Pat Mullin clouted three homers and a single in the finale and drove home five runs

Second-place Philadelphia also divided a twin-bill. The A's beat the Chicago White Sox, 4-2, on pinch-hitter Wally Moses' threerun eighth inning double but lost the second game, 3-0.
