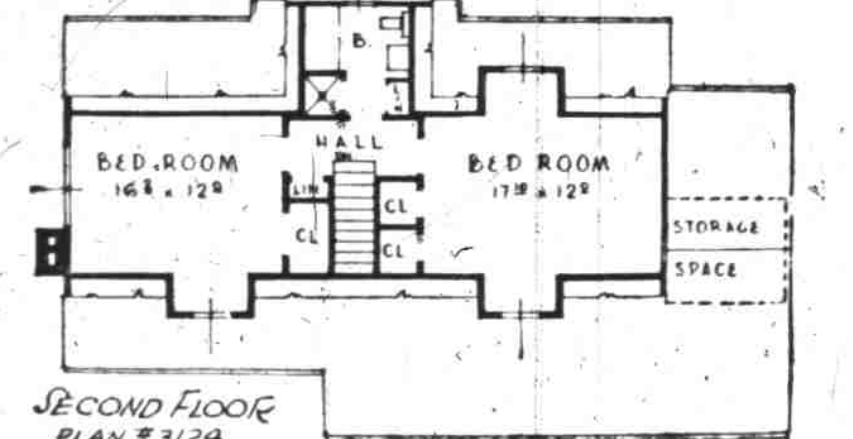
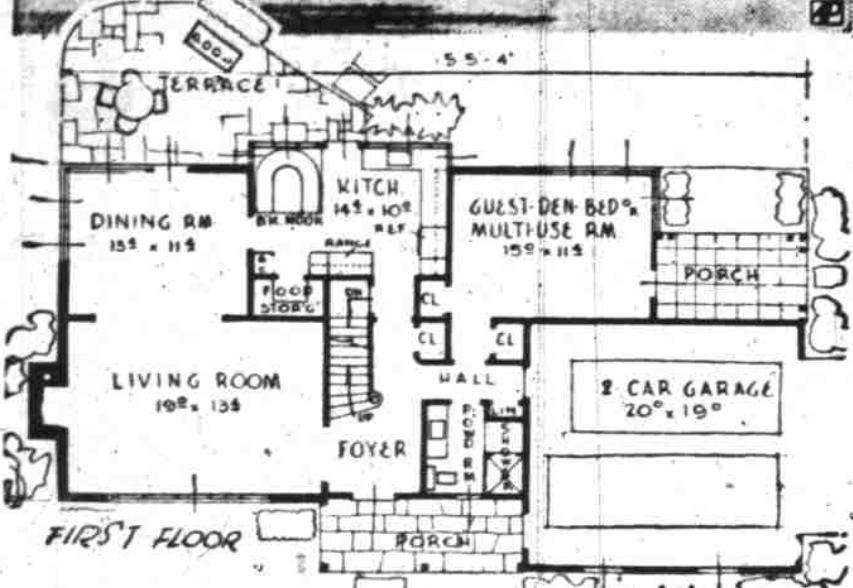

Portland Civic Auditorium Repairs Asked

PORTLAND, June 30—(AP)—The civic auditorium here was called "the laughing stock of the nation" today. The phrase came from Manager William Duggan, who complained that top-flight stars have refused to use the dressing rooms and back stage facilities. They are too terrible, he said. Commissioner Kenneth L. Cooper proposed to relieve the situation by selling \$75,000 in bonds for reforming the place. He began drafting an ordinance to that effect. Moreover, said Cooper, if the city council votes that down, he will recommend the auditorium be shut down completely. He spoke at a tax supervising and conservation commission hearing. The city planning commission, appearing at the same meeting, declared that the location of the proposed new high school is "gambling with \$3,600,000 of taxpayers' money."

Youth Dynamited Parents To Help 'Solve Problems'

TACOMA, June 30—(AP)—Lawrence Jean Sharp, 20-year-old University of Washington student accused of dynamiting his parents' Vancouver, Wash., home last April 1, said in an interview today: "I did it to solve all my problems." He declined to detail his "problems," but said "they were mental, physical and financial, I guess. That's all I can say." Earlier, jailers told of three suicide attempts by the youth, but they and hospital attendants did not take them seriously. One attendant said "they usually happen when somebody's around." Today he slashed a wrist with a razor, and later tried to pull out the stitches. Attendants described it as "a scratch."

Dulles Contradicts Hiss' Story In Testimony at Perjury Trial

NEW YORK, June 30—(AP)—John Foster Dulles testified today that he wanted Alger Hiss to resign as president of the Carnegie endowment for international peace after communist charges against Hiss were aired last summer. The testimony of Dulles contradicted Hiss' own story earlier this week. Dulles, board chairman of the endowment, took the witness stand after Hiss' defense on perjury charges ended with a final effort to question the mental background of his chief accuser, Whittaker Chambers. Last Tuesday Hiss acknowledged talking to Dulles during a congressional inquiry into Hiss' alleged communist leanings. "And did he (Dulles) ask you out of consideration for the endowment to voluntarily resign as president?" Hiss was asked Tuesday. He replied: "He did not." Asked Hiss to resign Dulles, as a government rebut-

calling Dr. Carl Binger, a psychiatrist, to the stand. However, Federal Judge Samuel H. Kaufman refused to let Dr. Binger offer an opinion on Chambers' mental condition. Dr. Binger was blocked after the defense had offered a lengthy review of Chambers' purported boyhood eccentricities and furtive adult life before he left the communist party. Failing to get a psychiatric opinion in the record, Defense Attorney Lloyd Paul Stryker rested his case at 1:15 p.m. on the 22nd day of the trial. The government at once began its rebuttal.

WELFARE CHECKS DUE
PORTLAND, June 30—(AP)—Welfare recipients won't have to wait for their July 1 checks this year, as they did for the last two years. The legislature authorized the state to advance money to counties this time; and welfare checks will go into the mail tomorrow morning.

'WAR BOOTY' TOTALLED
VIENNA, Austria, June 30—(AP)—The Russians have confiscated Austrian goods valued at \$13,000,000 as "war booty" since the end of the war, official government figures showed today. The goods include machine tools, raw materials and finished products.

Mikesell Reports Water Right Rulings

Water right applications for 30 acres or more now must be surveyed by and be accompanied by a map prepared by a licensed engineer or land surveyor, O. E. Mikesell, Linn county extension agent stated this week. Applications under 30 acres must also be accompanied by a map which may be prepared by anyone. The map must show a permanent reference monument in the form of an iron pipe, at least one inch in diameter ad 36 inches long, set 30 inches in the ground at a point close to the proposed diversion point. Water right applications are sent to Charles E. Stricklin, state engineer, Salem. The ruling applies to all applications, not only Linn county.
