Times are tough! That was the sigh of judges in the third week's contest of The Oregon Statesman's summer photo competition. They could agree unanimously on only one of the three winners, but they did agree that their job wasn't getting any easier.

Finally, however, they came up with these for the week's best pictures:
Children-animals: A. G. Lewis route 5, Salem.
Portrait-character study: Dr. Henry E. Morris, 1520 N. 5th, Salem.
Pictorial-scenery: Paul D. Almqvist, 232 Coolidge st., Silverton.
None of the three winners had taken previous honors this year, although Dr. Morris had figured in the honorable mention column.

Except for the dozen top photos, there was a slight (very slight) lessening in the quality of most of the others last week. Chief handicap continued to be a fuzziness, and several otherwise fine pictures were reluctantly scratched because of it. But in the main, quality still remained higher than in the 1948 Statesman competition.

Deadline Wednesdays
Deadlines for the final three weeks of the contest are midnight of Wednesdays, July 6, 13 and 20. As previously set forth in the rules of the contest, three \$7.50 cash awards are made weekly — one for the best photo in each classification: (1) Children-animals; (2) Portrait-character study; (3) Pictorial-scenery. Grand prize winners in each classification will get \$20 each (to be announced Sunday, July 21).

Any amateur may enter (entrants last week came from Portland, Grand Ronde, Silverton, Woodburn and several valley must be on glossy paper, at least towns, as well as Salem). Prints 5x7, and pictures must have been taken this year.

Data on Photo Needed
On the back of each entry must be pasted a sheet of paper giving the name and address of photographer; identifying subject matter either by name or location or both; specifying classification, and giving data on the camera and film used, shutter speed, lens, filters, etc.

The 1949 contest now is just half over. So there's still plenty of time to get in those good pictures. The next deadline is midnight, Wednesday.
