'Stran', Bulla US's Entries

Annual Meet Covers Five Days, 108 Holes

SANDWICH, England, July 3.—The British Open golf championship will begin its five-day, 108-hole grind tomorrow with the benighted precisionist from South Africa, Bobby Locke, in the favorite's role.

Locke, whose short pants bulge with the money of the expense of America's top professionals the last two years, is a 6-1 choice in the bookmakers' latest calver.

Two Englishmen—Fred Daly, the 1947 winner, and Ryder Cupper Charlie Ward—are next in vavor at 12-1 and America's small but classy delegation is strong out from there.

Frank Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio, the 1948 British amateur titlist, and Johnny Bulla, the long-hitting pro from Verona, Pa., are best-liked of the U. S. invaders at 16-1.

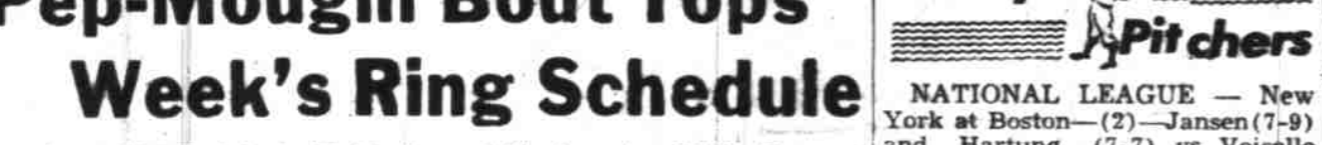
