

# Irishman Leader as Qualifying Action Starts in British Open

## Bradshaw Hits Blistering 67

Locke, Bulla Next In Line with 69's

SANDWICH, England, July 4.—(AP)—Harry Bradshaw, former Irish open titleholder, blustered the Royal St. Georges course with a 67 today to lead the field through the first qualifying round of the British open golf championship.

The 35-year-old Irishman from Kiltree, County Wicklow, completed his par-shattering round at the close of a long, hot day. The galleries had dispersed when he came in, with everyone confident that a trio of 69s were good for the lead.

Bobby Locke, the favorite from South Africa, led off with a 69 and stayed around long enough to see it equalled twice. But he had gone to dinner by the time Bradshaw blazed home with the day's best score.

The men who tied Locke and shared second place were wisecracking Johnny Bulla, Phoenix, Ariz., professional playing out of Pittsburgh, Pa., and Ken Bousfield, young British pro who picked up some pointers on the U. S. winter circuit.

Locke and Bulla, playing an hour and a half apart, shot their subpar rounds on the Royal Cinque Ports course, near the English channel, at Deal. Like Bradshaw, Bousfield played Royal St. Georges here, where the 72-hole tournament proper will open Wednesday.

Unofficial par for both courses is 72. The field of more than 200 will switch courses tomorrow, with the low 100 qualifying to continue medal play for the title surrendered by Henry Cotton without a defense.

The man who came next was Bob Kenyon, 44-year-old English veteran who never has won a big tournament in England but twice captured the Irish open before the war. He toured the St. Georges layout in 70.

One stroke behind came a sampling of international talent, including Frank Stranahan, Toledo, Ohio, amateur; Antonio Cerda of Argentina and Alec Murray of New Zealand. Stranahan and Cerda played the 6,740-yard Canque Ports course, Murray the 6,728-yard St. Georges.

## Two Shooting Records Fall

SUN VALLEY, Idaho, July 4.—(AP)—Two world records were shattered today in the finals of the Sun Valley trapshoot tournament.

Arnold Rieger of Seattle broke a record 593 out of 600 targets to win the high score—all championship of the tournament. The other record was set by 17-year-old Bill Inlow of Ponsaket, Wash. He broke 199 out of 200 to win the Sun Valley junior championship, hitting a record .984 average for juniors over the last 1,000 targets.

Mrs. Ruth Ray, Eugene, Ore., won the women's championship with 197 out of 200 and 25 straight in a shoot-off to beat Mrs. Muriel Harold of San Francisco.

## Silverton '9' Slates Stars

SILVERTON, July 4.—(Special)—The Silverton Red Sox, out in front of the State league baseball race, Tuesday night take on the visiting Kansas City Monarchs colored stars in an eight o'clock exhibition game at McClinic field. ## Hot Ring Show, Field Events Mark Prison's '4th' Program

It was the big day for inmates of the state prison Monday as the annual Fourth Festival was reeled off with the customary supply of laughs and hot rivalry inside the walls.

Feature of the annual event was the boxing show and there were enough bloody noses, right hooks and left jabs to satisfy the most hungry ring fan.

Top bout on the card—and it had the big gathering of prisoners plus a sizeable section of outsiders roaring from start to finish—was the six-round main event. In that one, Del Fuston, 150 pounds, and Ted Ward, 148, tossed leather with machine gun rapidity and pile-driver effect through the full route with the verdict being a popular draw. The pair stood toe-to-toe and bloodily slugged it out from the first bell to the last. For the outsiders it was the best bout they'd seen, pro or amateur, in a long while.

In addition there were the usual field events, ranging from the tug-of-war to the lifers' race—and, yes, this year Warden George Alexander permitted pole vault competition. Unhappily, the winning vault mark was 10 feet, two inches. That wouldn't clear the walls.
