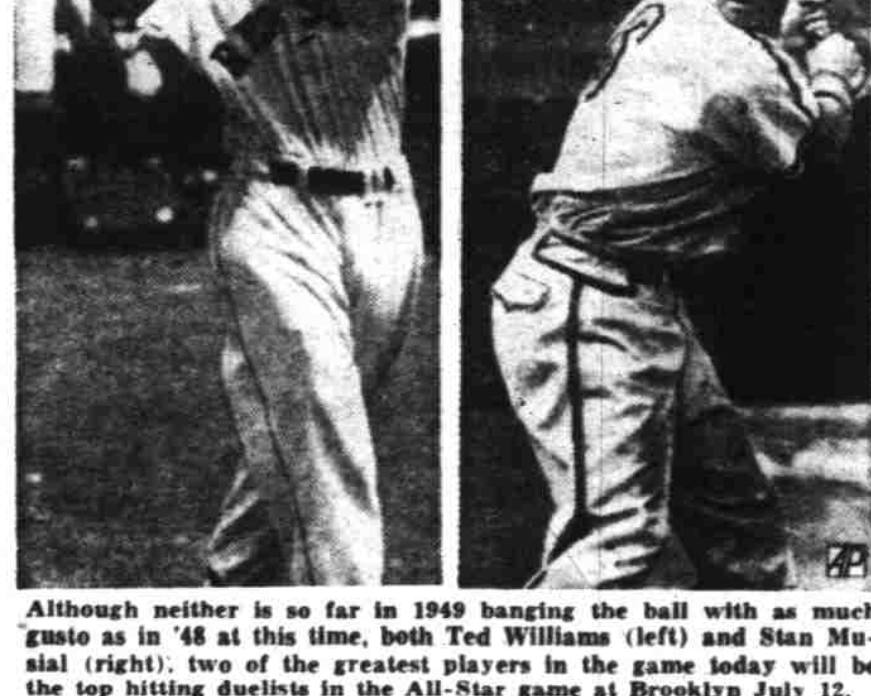

Cardinals Whack Brooks Lead To 1 Game; Indians Win Again

NEW YORK, July 5—(AP)—The Boston Red Sox finally beat the New York Yankees. And it took a DiMaggio to do it—Dom DiMaggio. After losing five straight to the American league leaders, the Red Sox, led by the younger of the DiMaggio brothers, edged out the New Yorkers 4-2 tonight to snap an eight-game losing streak. . . . Stealing a page from his older brother Joe's book, Dom slammed a triple and home run, scored two runs, and made a brilliant catch of Phil Rizzuto's bid for a three-bagger to earn the hero's role. The defeat cut the Yankees' first place margin over the idle Philadelphia Athletics to four games. . . . The third place Cleveland Indians advanced to within six games of the Yankees, defeating the Detroit Tigers, 8-1. Frank Papias limited the Bengals to seven hits for his first victory of the year. Joe Gordon cracked two singles and his 13th home run to pace a 14-hit attack against three pitchers. . . . Paul Lehner's single with the bases loaded and Catcher Joe Tipton's error helped the St. Louis Browns to a six-run seventh inning which gave them a 9-5 victory over the Chicago White Sox. . . . The St. Louis Cardinals moved to within one game of the National league leading Brooklyn Dodgers, winning a 10-inning 2-1 decision from the Chicago Cubs while the Philadelphia Phils whipped the Brooks, 7-2.
