

Wheat Rises To New Highs

CHICAGO, July 7 (AP)—Wheat knocked out some more new highs in its current advance on the board of trade today. But at the close prices were slipping and traders said the market looked a bit tired after its bullish exertions of the past three days.

Final prices for wheat were 3 1/4-1/4 higher, corn 1/4-1/4 lower, oats 1/4-1/4 higher, rye 1/2-2/4 lower, soybeans 4 to 6 1/4 lower and lard 7 to 25 cents a hundred pounds lower.

Mills again took a good quantity of wheat, reflecting the surge in demand for flour buying on the part of bakers. The trade placed flour buying so far this week at between 3,500,000 and 5,000,000 sacks. It has been about a year since flour buying has been so heavy.

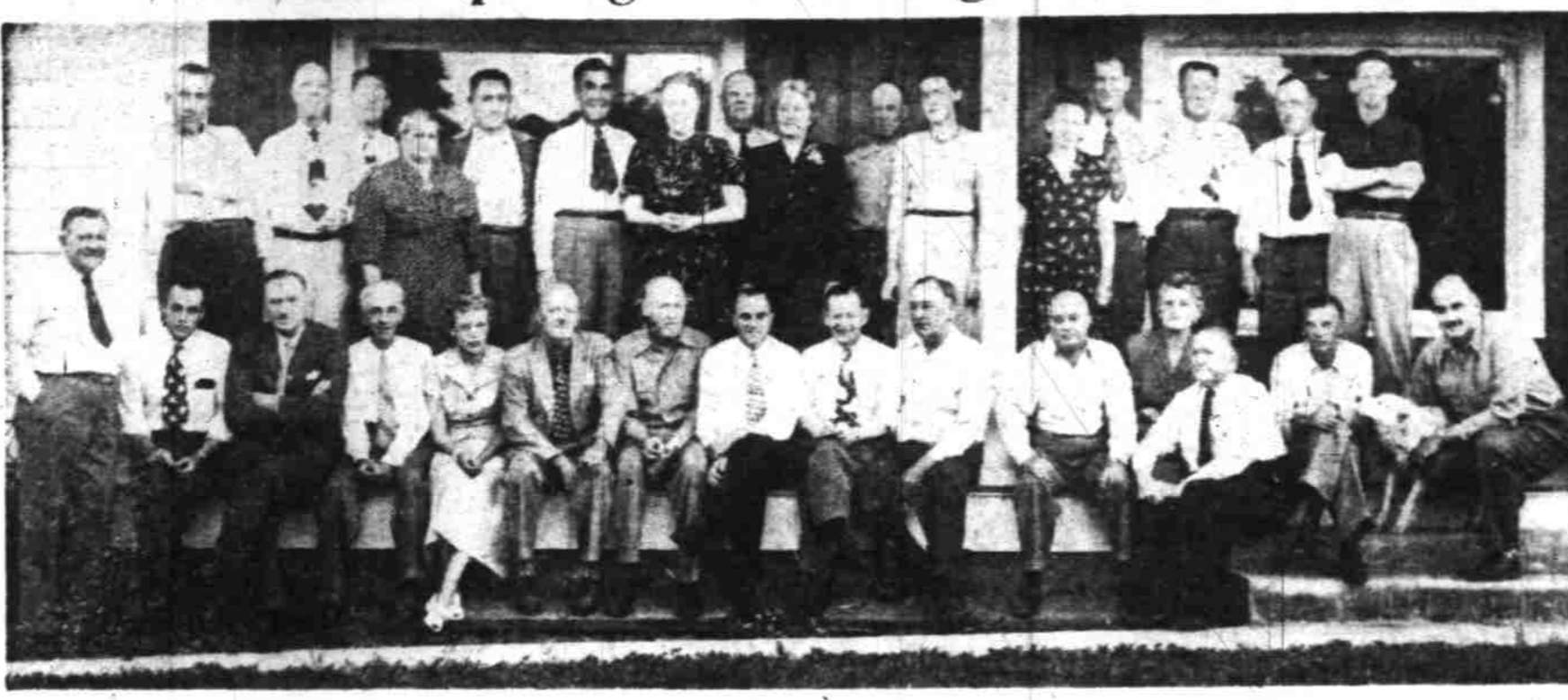

Stocks Follow Zig-Zag Course

NEW YORK, July 7 (AP)—The stock market took off on a zig-zag course today and finished just about where it started.

Final prices showed a close mixture of gains and losses running from fractions to around a point. Most changes were fractional.

The market's action broke a five-day winning streak. On Wednesday prices, on average, climbed to a six-week high. A rally started in mid-June after the market had dipped to a 4 1/2-year low on June 13.

Just before 11 o'clock President Truman announced that he was bullish about the economic situation and suggested to newsmen that they read up or marveled developments of the last few

days. In a matter of seconds prices started to slip. Early gains were trimmed or wiped out as the price level gently sagged. The closing score was: 988 issues traded, 363 up, 340 down, 60 stocks dipped 1 of one point to 61.1. Turnover was 890,000 shares.
