

Mill Creek Dammed for New Prison Wall



Construction of a new 25-foot wall at the Oregon state penitentiary has necessitated building two cofferdams across Mill creek, cutting the flow of water. While the creek is low, gravel is being scooped from the bed for a road along the prison wall. When the new section of wall is completed this winter it will double the prison area and will cost about \$ 100,000. At places the wall will be 14 feet below ground level, and varies from 18 to eight inches thick. A similar northern wall is already completed. (Statesman photo.)
