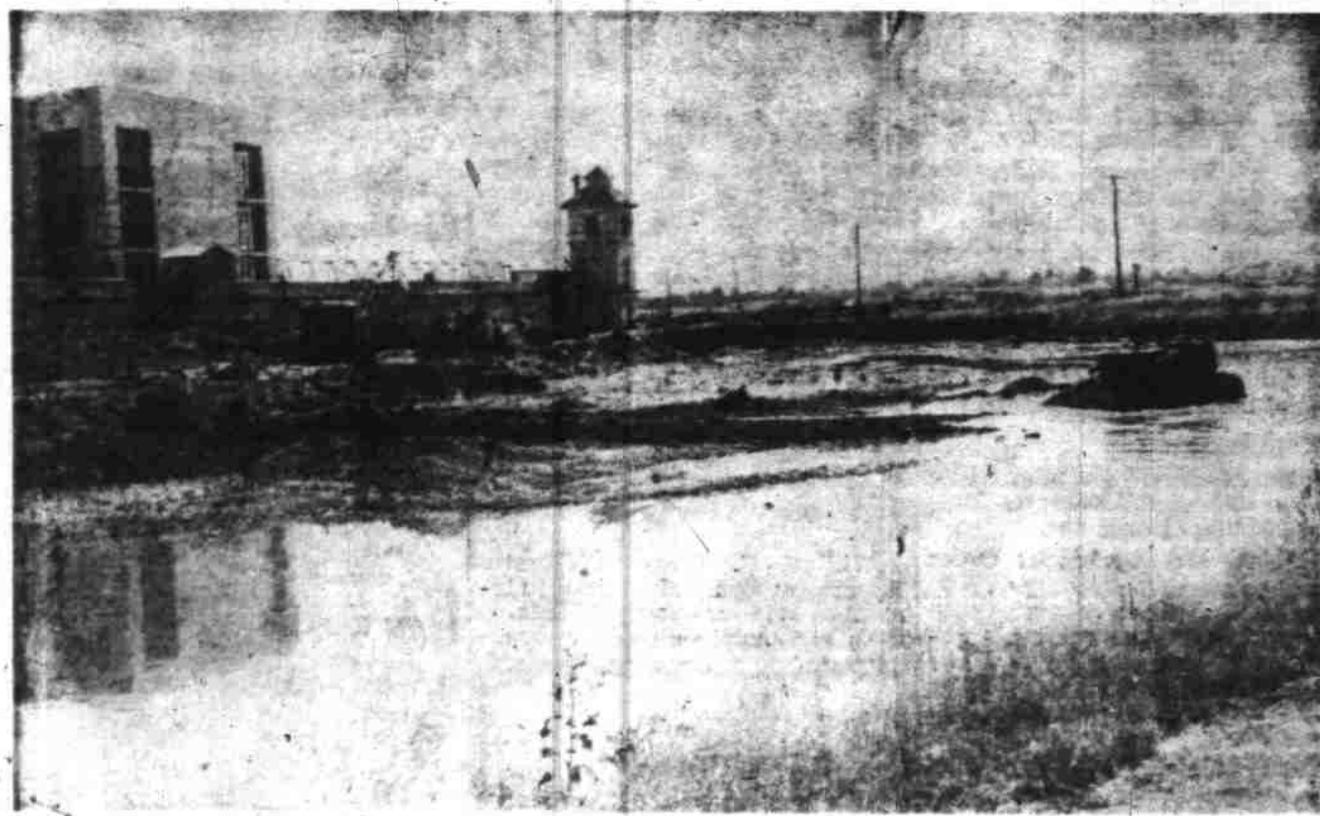


Mill Creek Dammed for New Prison Wall



Construction of a new 25-foot wall at the Oregon state penitentiary has necessitated building two cofferdams across Mill creek, cutting the flow of water. While the creek is low, gravel is being scooped from the bed for a road along the prison wall. When the new section of wall is completed this winter it will double the prison area and will cost about \$100,000. At places the wall will be 14 feet below ground level, and varies from 18 to eight inches thick. A similar northern wall is already completed. (Statesman photo.)

Final Services Saturday for Mrs. Oliver

Funeral services for Mrs. Estelle Ann Oliver, 83, who died shortly before midnight Wednesday at the Clough-Barrick chapel with the Rev. Dudley Strain officiating, will be in City View cemetery.

She was a resident of Salem since 1, box 369, where she had lived since coming here with her family in 1910. Despite her advanced age she remained active until a few days ago when she suffered a heart attack.

She was born in Bloomington, Ill. on May 12, 1866, the daughter of Christopher and Sophia Jane Hanna, and was the last of seven children born to them.

She married John L. Oliver at Vancouver, Wash., Oct. 12, 1890, and they lived at Jefferson and Government Island, Ore. before coming to Salem. He died in 1930.

She was a longtime member of the Oregon Grange, Brush College Helpers and American War Mothers.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Marjorie Wood of Salem and Mrs. Bertha Mae Allerton of Portland; a son, Burl R. Oliver of Salem; and a granddaughter, Margie Darlene Wood of Salem.

Broken-Hearted Man Kills Wife, Takes Own Life

PORTLAND, July 7—(AP)—A broken-hearted husband today killed the wife who was going to divorce him, police said, and then turned the gun on himself.

The tragedy occurred at a small Portland restaurant. Traffic Patrolman Ralph Grey heard shots issued from there. He ran inside to find Ethel Vincent Hall, 44, and Mrs. Hall fatally injured beyond. She died in a hospital later.

In Hall's pocket was a note saying "I can't take it any more. This is the only way I see out. I married her because I love her and I will always love her."

The wife was a waitress in the restaurant.

Oregon, Nebraska Argument Ends With 4 Arrests

An argument over Oregon and Nebraska led to the arrest of four Salem juveniles early Thursday. They were charged with disorderly conduct, and each posted \$25 bail.

had to do some cackling to get you and me to eat 78 more eggs per year in 10 years time," Gross said, as he referred to the recent Oregon Baby Chick association meeting in Corvallis.

Harry Huntington, executive secretary of the poultry and egg national board was the principal chick association speaker, and Mr. Gross insisted that the talk should be applied to all agricultural products.

Mr. Huntington told the group that in 1940 the national egg consumption per person was 310. In 1948 there were 388 eggs consumed for every person in the United States.

From the production standpoint the eggs per hen have increased from 120 in 1934 to 160 in 1948. It was assumed that this figure would gradually increase because the production in Oregon at the present time is 180 per hen.

"The poultrymen have continued to advertise, reminding consumers that poultry meat and eggs are available," Mr. Huntington explained, adding that "the American appetite is a changing

New Grading For Onions To Be Set Up

Oregon growers and packers of Yellow Globe Danvers type onions, after today, may market their onions under a new grade to be known as Oregon Fancy, the state agricultural department has announced.

The new grade is in addition to grades already existing. Officials said the new grade conforms to the requirements of U. S. No. 1 grade for northern grown onions with additional requirements on size, appearance and condition.

Frank McKenop, chief of the plant industry division, said the new grade would apply chiefly to the commercial production of onions in the Willamette valley.

Filbert Spray Notice Posted

The spray or dust notice for filbert moth control has been released by Dr. B. G. Thompson, entomologist at Oregon state college. The recommended sprays or dusts by the college (the formula was given in The Statesman's Thursday Farm Page) should be used, Dr. Thompson adds.

Since the filbert moths have had two peak emergence periods during past years, another application will be necessary in few weeks, Dr. L. Rasmussen, Marion county extension agent, said Thursday. The second spray or dust notice will probably come during the middle part of August, he added.

Burglar Breaks Into 90 Offices in Portland Building

PORTLAND, July 7—(AP)—A downtown building with 90 offices in it was robbed last night by a burglar who crashed through doors and windows and left a trail of blood along part of his route.

Several hundred dollars was taken from the different offices. The prowler got into the Pagnana building by breaking a window in a cafeteria, mounting a skylight to the roof, and breaking through another window.

Then he went up and down the halls systematically breaking glass doors and hunting for cash.

The trail of blood indicated he cut himself getting into the cafeteria. "Not badly, though; he drank a pint of cream from the cafeteria, made himself a bandage, and went on with his looting."

Oregon prune growers might well do some of the "cackling" which Oregon egg producers have done in recent years, Louie H. Gross, county extension agent in Yamhill county, said in his Thursday press release.
