

# Wheat Takes Brief Rest after Bullish Trend

CHICAGO, July 8 (AP)—Wheat took a brief rest today after its bullish trend of the past three sessions. But losses weren't large and trading activity slackened.

Brokers said the mill buying which has spurred advancing wheat prices this week was much less conspicuous today. Some big bakery chains are believed to still need flour, but it was considered possible they would hold out in anticipation of a price reduction. Wheat closed 1/2 to 2 cents lower, corn was unchanged to 1/2 lower, oats were unchanged to 1/2 lower, rye was 1 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher, soybeans were 1/4 higher and lard was 8 to 13 cents a hundred pounds lower.

Some selling developed in wheat, particularly deferred deliveries, following news that moisture had been received in parts of the Canadian prairie provinces and the American northwest.

Wheat prices eased slightly in the southwest, the cash grain at Kansas City moving at a 2 cent lower basis, in relation to the July future there, than yesterday. Some comment was heard that this week's advance may have brought prices close to the government loan level in Texas.

Mexico purchased 1,300,000 bushels of American wheat for July shipment. This appeared to have little influence on the market, and the same could be said for the revelation that Britain and Russia had concluded a secret deal which would supply Britain with nearly 1,000,000 tons of coarse grain.

# Stock Prices Barely Move

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Stock traders played it safe today and prices for most issues barely moved.

The market showed signs of wanting to get ahead at the opening but there was no drive behind the buying and the widest gains—few more than a point—were soon trimmed.

Final prices showed a fairly even mixture of small advances and declines. Numerous stocks ended with no change after swinging lazily between higher and lower prices ground during the day.

There were 945 individual stocks traded, 384 increased in price and 317 declined.

Trading volume contracted after the two comparatively busy preceding sessions. Turnover of \$40,000 shares contrasted with \$90,000 Thursday and \$141,000 Wednesday.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dipped .1 of one point to 61.
