NEW YORK, July 8-(AP)-Smoky Joe Page came up with another gilt edge relief chore tonight and batted home the winning run to feature the American league's first place Yankees' 4-3, 12-inning triumph over the Washington Senators.

Page, making his 27th appearance of the season, held the Senators to one hit over the last four rounds to pick up his seventh victory. He singled home Billy Johnson from third with the payoff run off Mickey Harris who went all the way for Washington, Joe DiMaggio sent the game into overtime when he singled home Phil Rizzuto from second in the ninth inning to keep the 35,845 fans in the stadium in their seats. The triumph increased the Yanks' margin over the runner-up Philadelphia Athletics to six games. The A's took a 7-1 trouncing from the Red Sox in Boston before 34 .-276 fans.

Joe Dobson limited the A's to six hits while his mates collected eight including Vern Stephen's 20th homer of the season.

The third place Cleveland Indians moved to within a half game of the Athletics, nipping the Browns, 6-5, before 4,571 in St. Louis.
