Prof's Hold Reds Entitled to Jobs Unless Disloyal

WASHINGTON, July 12.—(AP)—Teachers have the same right as anyone else to be communists so long as that party is legal, the American Association of University professors said today.

It added, however, that if a teacher uses the classroom as a forum for communism, or advocates forcible overthrow of the government he should be fired for professional unfitness or disloyalty, and not because he is a communist.

The association in the annual report of its committee on academic freedom and tenure reaffirmed a stand on the issue taken in 1947 and 1948. This was in contrast with a National Education association recommendation that communists be barred from the teaching profession.

Red Cross Board Reports Activity

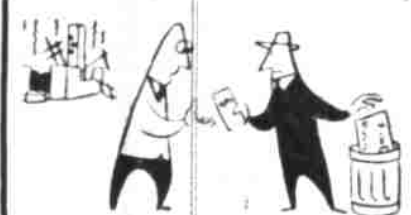
A Red Cross first aid booth in downtown Salem during the state American Legion convention August 3-6 has been requested, it was reported at the July meeting of the Marion county board of directors.

QUESTION: Recently we suffered a fire loss which was paid by our insurance company. Now a friend tells me that my insurance policy expired with the settlement and I must take out a new policy. Is this true?

ANSWER: Not entirely unless the insurance company paid you the full amount of the policy. When an insurance company pays you for a fire loss, it deducts the amount paid you from the amount of the policy. Thus, if you had a ten thousand dollar policy and the company paid you five thousand dollars, you would still have five thousand dollars in insurance. However, you should see your insurance agent about having your policy changed to give you adequate protection again.

Learn-to-Swim Classes Split To Meet Heavy Youth Response

Response to the Red Cross-sponsored public Learn-to-Swim campaign was so strong by Tuesday that several of the free classes were split into two sections.

Playgrounds Director Vernon Gilmore said enrollment jumped to 572 from opening day's 490, with 361 of the prospective swimmers learning at Olinger pool and 211 at Leslie. He said the warm weather has helped get the program off to a good start.

Largest class Tuesday was at Olinger where 120 boys 8 or 9 years old turned out for one class. An even 100 ten-year-olds were on hand at Olinger, where classes were generally larger than at Leslie. As a result, Leslie class schedules remain the same as originally started and Olinger afternoon class periods have been split into two sections.

New Olinger half-hour class periods: For ages 6 and 7 at 1:15 and 1:45 p.m.; ages 8 and 9 at 2:15 and 2:45 p.m.; age 10 at 3:15 and 3:45 p.m. Youngsters joining classes for the first time today are to report at the later periods. Only one intermediate class is training at Olinger, daily at 4:15 p.m.

Grain Mart Optimistic

CHICAGO, July 12.—(AP)—Grains reflected a more optimistic than expected crop report in today's board of trade session. The session was marked by nervousness in all grain pits, with prices moving quickly in either direction.

Wheat and corn started lower, and then recovered, only to dip again.

At the close wheat was 1 1/2 to 2 cents lower, corn was 1/2 higher to 1 1/2 lower, oats were 3/4 higher to 3/4 lower, rye was 1 cent to 3/4 higher, soybeans were 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher and lard was 10 to 20 cents a hundred weight higher.

The government estimated this year's wheat crop at 1,188,000,000 bushels, which depressed that grain at the start, but there was fair support on the declines. The support came from reports of damage to the Canadian crop. However, toward the close considerable profit cashing developed.

Kiwanis Meet Report Given

T. Harold Tomlinson, lieutenant governor of division 14 of Kiwanis clubs, described to the Salem club Tuesday his experiences while attending the Kiwanis International convention at Atlantic City, N.J. He returned from the east Monday night.

Tomlinson said some of the convention speakers were outstanding. He referred repeatedly to the "oppressive heat" all along the Atlantic seaboard and in the mid-west; told of a tour through "Brownstown," the negro section of Chicago, and also described a tour of Washington, D.C., arranged by Rep. Walter Norblad.

Insanity Plaintiff Ordered to Appear

Circuit Judge Rex Kimmell has ruled that complaining witnesses in insanity hearings must appear in person to be called upon for testimony if desired by the court.

Kimmell's decision was issued at the first hearing in his circuit court Monday. The case was continued until Saturday.

The new judge also said he will notify responsible relatives of all alleged insane persons in future cases to see that financial responsibility is not being avoided without cause.

Streamlining, Other Interim Groups Chosen

Appointment of three interim committees of the 1949 Oregon legislature, including the so-called "little Hoover" group to study streamlining of the state government, was announced Tuesday.

One group will investigate state institutions and another post-high school facilities. Members of the "little Hoover committee" include Sens. Philip Hitchcock, Klamath Falls, and Angus Gibson, Junction City, and Peps Rudy Wilhelm, Portland; Charles K. McCulloch, Baker, and Paul Geddes, Roseburg. First meeting of this committee was expected to be held within a few weeks. Purpose of the group is to conduct an exhaustive study of the state government with a view of improving present procedure.

On the committee to investigate state institutions are Sens. Vernon Bull, LaGrande; Russell Gardner, Newport; Frank Hilton, Portland; Carl Engdahl, Pendleton, and Stewart Hardy, Condon. This committee's investigations will deal with many phases of state institution management, including educational facilities, housing, medical facilities, finance and employment.

The post-high school committee is composed of Dr. H. Morgan Odell, president of Lewis & Clark university, Portland; James W. Bushong, Bend; Oscar I. Paulson, Salem, state vocational education director; Edgar W. Smith,

Portland, member of the state board of higher education, along with Sen. Thomas Parkinson, Roseburg, and Rep. Sprague Carter, Pendleton, and J. F. Short, Redmond. This committee will study college and university facilities for high school graduates.
