Music Festival And Conclave Honor Goethe

 ASPEN, Colo., July 13.—(Special to The Statesman)—High in the Colorado Rockies, three miles from the continental divide, intellectuals, musicians, artists and citizens from all over the world are here attending the Goethe Bicentennial Convocation and Music Festival, June 27 through July 16.

The festival is phenomenal for this little town which has recently been revived from a dead mining town to a world famous ski resort.

Gathered here for this convocation are such well-known intellectuals as Dr. Albert Schweitzer, from French Equatorial Africa, philosopher-doctor-musician-theologian; Stephen Spender, poet, critic, and editor; Ernst Simon, editor, educator, historian, and chairman of the department of education at Hebrew university, Jerusalem.

Jose Ortega y Gasset, Spain's greatest living philosopher; Charles J. Burkhardt, presently Switzerland's minister to France; Thornton Wilder, three Pulitzer-prize winning American novelist and playwright; Gerardus van der Leeuw, professor of theology at the University of Groningen, Netherlands; and Halvdan Koht, Norway's most eminent historian.

Pay Homage to Goethe
 All these and many more great and not-so-greats are here in Aspen to pay homage to Johann Wolfgang von Goethe, the great German poet-philosopher. The celebration honors the 200th anniversary of Goethe's birth in 1749.

The quiet, peaceful and lofty setting of Aspen (7,844 feet in elevation, surrounded by seven peaks over 14,000 feet high) seems especially appropriate for a festival of such magnitude.

In the "good old days" of the mining boom here, Aspen was Colorado's second largest town. At that time, the town was blessed with an opera house where such notables as Mme. Schumann-Heink sang and John L. Sullivan vied orally with John Barleycorn and "Gentleman Jim" Corbett reminded of his great fighting career. But not since those days has Aspen seen anything to compare with the hubbub, the confusion and the significance of the present Goethe celebration.

Aspen Rejuvenated
 Through the forming of the Aspen company last year with Walter Paepcke, energetic board chairman of the Container Corporation of America (American Can), at the helm, Aspen has been refurbished, remodelled and repainted and placed in a position to host this great festival. The town now has an airport, good hotel facilities, plenty of rich mountain water, the longest ski lift in the world, (3 miles to the top of the continental divide) and is forging ahead daily in its quest to be great again.

The celebration itself consists of a series of lectures by the intellectuals and artists gathered here and concerts by the Minneapolis Symphony orchestra, directed by Dimitri Mitropoulos, who is aided by a host of world famous guest artists.

Isolation an Asset
 Many have wondered why Aspen was chosen for this convocation. Certainly Aspen, geographically or physically has nothing to do with Goethe, who spent most of his life in Weimar, Germany. But the very remoteness, isolation and relative inaccessibility of Aspen are regarded by the promoters of the Goethe festival as assets and the fact that Weimar is in the Soviet zone of Germany probably had much to do with the choosing of this cradle in the Rockies as "the place" for world philosophy in 1949.

 (1) To refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe in said permit.

(2) To build no open fires except in places designated as safe in said permit.

(3) To have as a part of his or her equipment when using campfires, except when traveling as a pedestrian and/or camping at improved, designated and posted campgrounds, tools as specified by the forester suitable for extinguishing fires.
