

World Pressure May Save Peace In Europe, Former Czech Says

Pressure and communist philosophy may be the ingredients for peace in Europe and the world, Dr. Bohus A. Benes, former Czech diplomat, correspondent and lecturer, said here Wednesday.

"Communists, unlike nazis, will yield to world pressure to save the party," said Dr. Benes before a Salem Rotary club noon luncheon audience at the Marion hotel.

But the pressure will have to be strong and uncompromising, indicated Dr. Benes, who is now visiting professor at Willamette university. He was for 30 years in the diplomatic service of his country prior to its present regime. He was a nephew and private secretary to Dr. Edward Benes, former president of Czechoslovakia.

Bohus Benes pointed to his own small nation as an example to his warning, "you can't get along with the reds. Either bolshevism or democracy must, ultimately, die."

Other comments made by Dr. Benes included these: Church and the Reds - In Czechoslovakia, which is 79 per cent Catholic, the church is having difficulty organizing against a well-aided communist machine.

Right now, the church is the backbone of the resistance movement in Czechoslovakia. Czechoslovakia is about 75 per cent opposed to communism, but can do little against the Moscow team.

Marshall Plan - This "fantastic" plan is a complete success, "It made you (Americans) world leaders. It cost you money but it saves you blood."

PROCLAMATION

NOW, THEREFORE, I, DOUGLAS MCKAY, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 197-219, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 252, Oregon Laws, 1949, hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above designated areas to be unlawful and that said areas shall be subject to entry only through permit to be issued by the State Forester, or a fire warden, under which permit entrant shall comply with any and all of the following requirements:

1. To refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe in said permit.
2. To build no open fires except in places designated as safe in said permit.

Grain Market Session Slow

CHICAGO, July 13 (AP)—Most grains were depressed by a steady dribble of selling orders today, although there and there a contract gained enough to give the market a mixed appearance at the close.

Wheat closed 3/4-7/8 lower, corn was 1 cent lower to 1 1/2 higher, oats were 3/4-1 higher, rye was 1 cent lower to 1/4 higher, soybeans were 3/4 lower to 7/8 higher and lard was 15 to 20 cents a hundred pounds higher.

Although it didn't amount to much, hedging pressure against wheat sent the July contract under \$2.00 at one time. Traders also were impressed by information that the local commodity credit corporation office had purchased 100,000 (T) bushels of wheat in Ohio yesterday at prices far under the Chicago July delivery.

PORTLAND, July 13 (AP)—Bank debits at Salem during June registered a 19 per cent gain over the same month a year ago, the Federal Reserve bank branch here reported today. Salem debits totaled \$61,004,000.
