NEW YORK, July 14 (AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers jumped their National league lead over the St. Louis Cardinals to a game and a half tonight, edging the Cincinnati Reds, 6-5, in ten innings while the Cards dropped a 1-0 thriller to the Philadelphia Phils.

Mary Rackley opened the Dodgers tenth with a single and raced home with the winning run when Bill Cox followed with a double.

De' Ennis followed in the last of the ninth to give Ken Hertzlerman the nod over the Cards' Max Lanier. The tail-end Chicago Cubs upset the Braves, 3-2 in Boston.

Dutch Leonard checked the Braves on four hits and singled home Frankie Gustine with the winning run in the eighth.

Johnny Mize and Larry Jansen teamed up to give the New York Giants a 4-3 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates in the Polo grounds.

Mize slammed his 14th homer and drove home three runs while Jansen limited the Pirates to four hits and fanned seven, including three in the ninth.

Allie Reynolds turned in his best game of the season as he pitched the American league front-running New York Yankees to a 5-0 triumph over the Browns in St. Louis.

Reynolds yielded only three hits and fanned ten in racking up his tenth triumph against one loss. The triumph enabled the Yanks to maintain their five and one half game lead over the Cleveland Indians who fanned the Philadelphia Athletics, 7-1 in Cleveland.

By Don Harzer On Saturday, July 16, the gong will ring on Mill creek for the young anglers and anglerettes. The stream will be their. The fish will belong to the kids. All they have to do is catch 'em.

A long distance phone call from Bob Holloway, chief biologist for the Oregon game commission confirms earlier promises of special trout liberations for the young followers of Ike Walton. Over 2000 legal size hold over rainbow will be liberated on Friday.

Some of the fish will be better than a foot long. They will be scattered about Mill creek and should afford a lot of fun for the youngsters.

It may be well to remind all of the young fishermen that the success of this project lies largely in their own hands. The mere fact that the stream is set aside for does give any rights to trespass. Do not travel on posted land without first obtaining permission from the landowner.

It is good sportsmanship to also obtain permission from owners of unposted land to fish along his property. It will be up to the older boys and girls to see that their younger companions do not leave gates open nor tear down fences in their anxiety to get to the stream.

Before the season progresses much farther there will undoubtedly be stiles erected at convenient access points to Mill creek which will enable the anglers to climb over a fence without harm, Stiles will also do away with any oversight on leaving gates open.

In charge of organizing a junior sports council in this area will be Rex Sanford, well known angler and sportsman of Salem. Rex is already well known for his enthusiastic work in the scouting field and the project will be in good hands.

This column is highly interested in the younger crop of sportsmen. They are the ones who are going to have a hard time of it in the years to come when it comes to taking fish or bagging game. If they are taught at the beginning that fishing and hunting are above all recreational sports instead of meat hunting ventures, they will be in good luck.

Future of Field, Stream Up to Youngsters The west is growing by leaps and bounds. The fishing and hunting pressure is getting heavier. The fishing waters of the state are decreasing rather than increasing in available acreage.

Big game ranges and game bird habitat are becoming more limited with each passing year. With the decrease in potential wildlife resources and the increase in anglers and hunters, the problem poses as a tough one to crack. Will the youngsters of today solve it? We think so and we're willing to stake a bet on the outcome.

The Mill creek project is the first major step in the right direction. It should have the support of everyone. We think it will.

The blueback fishing is still in the minus category. Reports from most of the coastal streams indicate that the fish are late. Very late. There are a few stragglers in some of the tide water areas but not in sufficient numbers to warrant going after them. The lake fishing has fallen off considerably during the past week. East and Paulina have gone rather sour. Crane Prairie is not what it was the first couple of weeks. Diamond lake is fair with some of the best catches being taken on flies.

Stream Fishing Now Showing Improvement Streams fishing on the other hand is showing improvement in most sections. The north Santiam is dropping fast and is in good condition. Some very nice catches have been made on flies in the Mill City area during the past couple of weeks. It should be good now for the remainder of the season providing the work in the Detroit dam does not muddy up the water too often.

The upper Deschutes and Crescent creek along the Little Deschutes are in excellent shape. Some nice catches of brown trout are being made. The Deschutes around Maupin is getting better and some nice catches are coming from that area. Best fishing is in the evening with light caddis flies. Small spinners do well in the middle of the day.

Don't forget — Some of the streams such as the Abiqua, Butte, etc., close on July 15. Better take a thorough check of your angling synopsis before going out this week-end. And — take a boy fishing.
