

Candidates for GOP Chieftain Are Set Forth

WASHINGTON, July 15—(AP)—East and west came forward today with "harmony" candidates for chairman of the Republican National committee. Senator Wherry, of Nebraska, senate GOP floor leader, got formally behind A. T. "Bert" Howard, of Scotts Bluff, Neb. Friends of Gov. Dewey of New York and Senator Taft of Ohio were reported favoring former senator John Danaher of Connecticut, an attorney. Rep. Hugh D. Scott, jr., said yesterday he would quit the chairmanship if a successor could be found who could bring harmony to the faction-split party. He has laid down the condition that such a man must have the support of at least 80 per cent of the 106-member committee.

ALBANY, July 15—With a heavy demand on Albany's water supply, the fire chief warned all residents today to be prepared to turn the faucets off if a fire occurs. The city provides a \$20 fine or 10 days imprisonment for using water unnecessarily.

ASTORIA, July 15—George R. Van Vleet, wealthy coastal logging operator, is suing for a marriage annulment, contending that his wife told him a lie 23 years ago when she said she had never been married before. He asked for \$75,000 in property, including a house in Portland and a residence at Cannon Beach.

HOOD RIVER, July 15—The Hood River valley's outgoing cherry crop, despite loss to rain-caused cracking, reached 130 carloads today, the third largest harvest in 40 years. Prices for fresh cherries, however, were disappointing.

EUGENE, July 15—More than \$100,000 worth of street and sewer improvements have been contracted by the city council this week.

ROSEBURG, April 15—Paul Kiyoshi Sato, 26, was crushed to death by a falling tree yesterday in logging operations east of here.

CORVALLIS, July 15—State police officers filled up the Oregon State campus today, taking the training courses sponsored by police headquarters. Fifty men a week are being sent here for the week-long courses.

ASTORIA, July 15—CIO cereal workers will begin negotiating with the Pillsbury flour mill next week for a 1 1/2 cent an hour increase.

ONTARIO, July 15—A drive to round up Mexican farm hands who came into this country illegally was under way today, with 47 having been arrested in a single day.

PRINEVILLE, July 15—The 24,000 acre cattle ranch owned by Stewart Stapleton has been sold to Mr. and Mrs. Jess Barksdale, Deming, N. M., who said their home state is too dry to raise cattle satisfactorily any more.

ASTORIA, July 15—Packers, awaiting the new catch of albacore tuna, have sold the last of the 1948 pack—and at rather poor prices. Much of it sold at \$17 a case, compared to the \$23 it brought when the season opened last fall.

PORTLAND, July 15—The corps of engineers today set a public hearing for Aug. 17 at The Dalles on a proposed bridge across the Columbia river at Covington point.

Truman Signs Housing Bill, Asks Action

WASHINGTON, July 15—(AP)—With "deep satisfaction," President Truman signed the long-range housing bill into law today. Then he called for quick action to put into effect its three main features, which call for: Construction of 810,000 public-ly-owned low-rental housing units in the next six years. A five-year multi-billion dollar slum clearance program. A \$325,000,000 farm housing program. Mr. Truman announced he will ask congress immediately for funds needed to finance the three-part program this year. Enactment of the housing law was Mr. Truman's first big victory in this session of congress for the domestic program he calls the "fair deal."

R. E. Decamp, Lumberman, Dies in Woods

DALLAS, July 15—(AP)—Stricken with a heart attack while cruising timber, Richard E. Decamp, 32, Salem forester for the Willamette Valley Lumber Co., and affiliates, died today in a deep canyon near Valsetz. An Oregon State college graduate, Decamp had been chief forester of the Willamette Valley Lumber Co. three years. He recently was appointed a member of the O & C lands advisory board, and was Polk county chairman of the Keep Oregon Green association. The widow and three children in Salem survive. The body was brought to the Henkle and Bollman chapel.

Connecticut Town Hit by \$200,000 Fire

DANBURY, Conn., July 15—(AP)—A general alarm fire raged through four buildings in the heart of Danbury's business area today, leaving about 20 families homeless and causing damage officially estimated at \$200,000. Acting Fire Chief John H. Ireland said the blaze was touched off by an exploding oil drum. About a score of firemen and policemen required first aid treatment and three were taken to a hospital. About 1,000 spectators watched 300 firemen battle the flames, which raged out of control for more than two hours.

Strike News Steadies Mart

NEW YORK, July 15—(AP)—Good news on the steel strike steadied the stock market today. Final prices showed a majority of small losses but many early declines were erased and leading steel stocks crossed into plus ground. Trading proceeded at a fairly brisk rate during the morning but slowed to an amble in the last couple of hours. Turnover of 800,000 shares compared with 1,160,000 shares Thursday and 1,050,000 Wednesday.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dipped .1 of one point to 62. The railroad and utility groups were unchanged but the industrial section slipped a notch.

Wheat Lower, Corn Goes Up

CHICAGO, July 15—(AP)—A session of irregular price trends today left wheat, oats and hard lower, corn and soybeans mixed and rye higher at the close on the board of trade.

Wheat ended 3/4 to 2 cents lower, corn was 2 1/2 lower to 1 1/2 higher, oats were 3/4 to 1 cent lower, rye was 2 1/4-2 1/2 higher, soybeans were 1/4 lower to 3/4 higher and hard was 7 to 12 cents a hundred pounds lower. Persistent selling pressure entered the wheat pit all day, reflecting in part an easier trend in cash wheat markets. At one time all wheat except December sold under 2.00.

FORD STRIKE AUTHORIZED DETROIT, July 15—(AP)—Ford workers across the nation have voted strike approval by a 7-1 margin, the CIO United Auto workers reported today. Strike approval does not necessarily mean there will be walk-out. It simply give union officers authority to call one.

STORM FEARED TOKYO, Saturday, July 16—(AP)—A typhoon pushed harmlessly past Okinawa today but curved toward southwestern Japan. Occupation forces and Japanese prepared for another big blow.

Additional Bus Tie-up Talked For New York

NEW YORK, July 15—(AP)—The CIO transport workers union today threatened to shut off bus transportation for 1,800,000 more riders in a strike that already has eliminated service for more than 1,000,000 New Yorkers. The sudden strike has closed down two of the city's largest private companies, the New York Omnibus and the Fifth Avenue Coach Co., which operate 1,080 buses on 30 routes.

New Parking Regulations Go in Effect

New regulations for the parking around the Marion county court house go into effect today, Sheriff Denver Young reminded Friday night. Parking along the curb of the circular driveway will be prohibited at all times, and parking in stalls will be prohibited from 6 p.m. to 7 a.m. Violators will be given parking tickets, Young said. The last session of the state legislature authorized the Marion county court to regulate parking around the courthouse.

SANTA FE, July 11—(AP)— Auburn-haired screen actress Greer Garson, 36, became the bride here today of Col. E. E. (Buddy) Fogelson, wealthy Texas rancher, oil man and sportsman. The wedding ceremony was performed before a shrub-banked fireplace in the home of Fletcher Catron, Santa Fe attorney, by Justice James McGhee of the New Mexico supreme court. About 20 friends of the couple were present. They left shortly after the ceremony for a brief wedding trip. Miss Garson said she plans to return to Hollywood soon to begin work on a sequel to "Mrs. Miniver," the war film which boosted her to screen fame. The wedding was the second for both.

Senate to Vote Thursday on Atlantic Pact

WASHINGTON, July 15—(AP)—The senate will vote at 4 p.m. (EST) next Thursday on ratifying the North Atlantic security treaty. Opponents blocked efforts to obtain a unanimous agreement to vote earlier. They apparently hoped to enlarge their core of resistance to the 12-nation alliance. The pact is designed to confront Russia with a pledge that the United States, Canada, Britain and nine western European nations will take measures to resist an attack on any one of them. A two-thirds majority of those senators voting is required to commit this nation to the treaty, and proponents claim enough votes to ratify it with ease.

Gallant Wins Honolulu Run

HONOLULU, July 15—(AP)—The schooner Gallant breezed past Diamond Head tonight into a beautiful Hawaiian sunset and the lead in the Los Angeles-Honolulu yacht race. H. B. Wyeth, jr.'s 65-foot Newport Harbor, Calif., craft finished the race at 6:18 p.m. (8:18 p.m., PST) after a stretch run down Molokai channel ahead of a 20-boat wind. She made the crossing in 11 days, 8 hours, 18 minutes, 14 seconds. Less its handicap of 36 hours, 18 minutes, 39 seconds, the Gallant's net time was 9 days, 19 hours, 59 minutes, 35 seconds—the best time so far by more than 11 hours. The third yacht to finish, the Gallant grabbed the lead from the cutter Patolita, owned by Charles D. Wiman of Santa Barbara.

In a special notice to the 171 republicans in the house, Rep. Arends of Illinois, the GOP whip whose job it is to get out the party vote, said: "Every republican who is on his feet and breathing, or shows any signs of life and is free from doctor's orders, must be accounted for... and be ready to vote on this all-important and far-reaching legislative proposal. We must defeat the Brannan farm bill."
