Doctor Claims 'Deterioration' At Institution

Dr. Horace G. Miller, in filing a civil service appeal from his recent discharge from the staff of Oregon State hospital, Friday criticized sharply William Ryan, coordinator of state institutions, and termed his discharge, by Dr. Charles Bates, a "hasty action."

Dr. Miller's statement in part said:
"For quite a few months I have been extremely unhappy over the developing and progressively deteriorating situation at the Oregon state hospital, Hillcrest school for girls and Oregon Fairview home. These institutions have done a lot for me and I feel for each of them deep feelings of obligation. At times during the past 14 years I have served each of them more or less effectively but at least with pleasure and profit to myself.

"It has recently become increasingly difficult for me to serve with self-respect under Ryan's regime of out-spoken hostility to psychiatry and to sound psychiatric principals. It would be gross ingratitude for me to now quietly step out and leave these institutions to suffer a needless load of self-seeking, over-all supervision without doing what I could to bring some of the present situation to public attention.

"The elective officers of the board of control have been given at least distorted and misleading information by Ryan in his divide-and-rule methods. He has acted by the installation of fear to keep those who could properly inform the board of control, afraid to consult with their elective officers for fear of losing their jobs.

"I am requesting a review by the civil service commission of the hasty action of Dr. Bates regarding the outcome of this hearing my family and I intend to stay in Salem and I will always take a deep and abiding interest in the state institutions which have done so much for me.

"It is important to those who are less able to defend themselves than I that arbitrary, autocratic, poorly considered use of power shall not go unchallenged. It has been reported in the press that Ryan is not afraid of any charges I might bring. He should remember that it is not I who is bringing the charges. I am endeavoring to defend myself against charges, the exact nature of which I have not been informed."

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Jail Sentence Given in Theft
Richard Roy Carter, 1275 S. 12th st., received a 90-day jail sentence in Marion county district court Friday on his plea of guilty last month to larceny of an oil stove Sept. 30, 1948, from the Associated Oil company.

Also in district court, Gerald William Bowen, 1165 Chemekeeta, was ordered to plead today to a charge of larceny of an electric drill, a bolt cutter, an iron and a pair of shoes from Jack Chapman, Salem route 3.

Richard Williams, Turner, changed his plea to a charge of permitting livestock to run at large unlawfully, from innocent to guilty. He received a 10-day suspended jail sentence, was placed on probation one year and fined \$10 and costs.

In Stayton justice court Friday, Everett Ward, Stayton, charged with operating punchboards was continued for pleading and was released without bail.
