

### Czech Netmen Choose Exile

Drobny, Cernik to Seek U. S. Haven

 Gstaad, Switzerland, July 15.—Jaroslav Drobny and Vladimir Cernik, two of the world's best known tennis players, turned their backs on their native Czechoslovakia today and prepared to seek admission to the United States as political refugees.  
 Here for the Swiss national championships, the two defied an order by the communist-dominated Czech government to return to Prague immediately because of the presence of two Germans and a Spaniard in the tournament.  
 They said they would continue to play here, then enlist the aid of the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association and friends abroad in gaining a haven as exiles in the United States.  
 In Washington, D. C., state department officials said any request by Drobny and Cernik to enter the United States would be received "sympathetically." They pointed out that other foreign athletes had been permitted to come here after renouncing their governments.  
 In New York, however, President Russell B. Kingman of the International Lawn Tennis Federation told the Associated Press that an application by Drobny and Cernik to remain in the United States "will be a matter strictly for the state department."

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, July 15.—(AP) The official Prague radio tonight accused the nation's two top tennis stars, Jaroslav Drobny and Vladimir Cernik, of "treachery" because they announced in Switzerland that they were going into exile.  
 The radio thus first broke the news to Czechs that Drobny and Cernik were not coming back from Switzerland.  
 "By this treacherous step, the Czech statement said, 'Drobny and Cernik have parted ways with their country and have gone to become professionals in the pay of the capitalist entrepreneurs.'

 Because of his ailing arm, it is doubtful that the famous pitcher will pitch the entire game. He likely will play elsewhere in the field for Newberg most of the game.

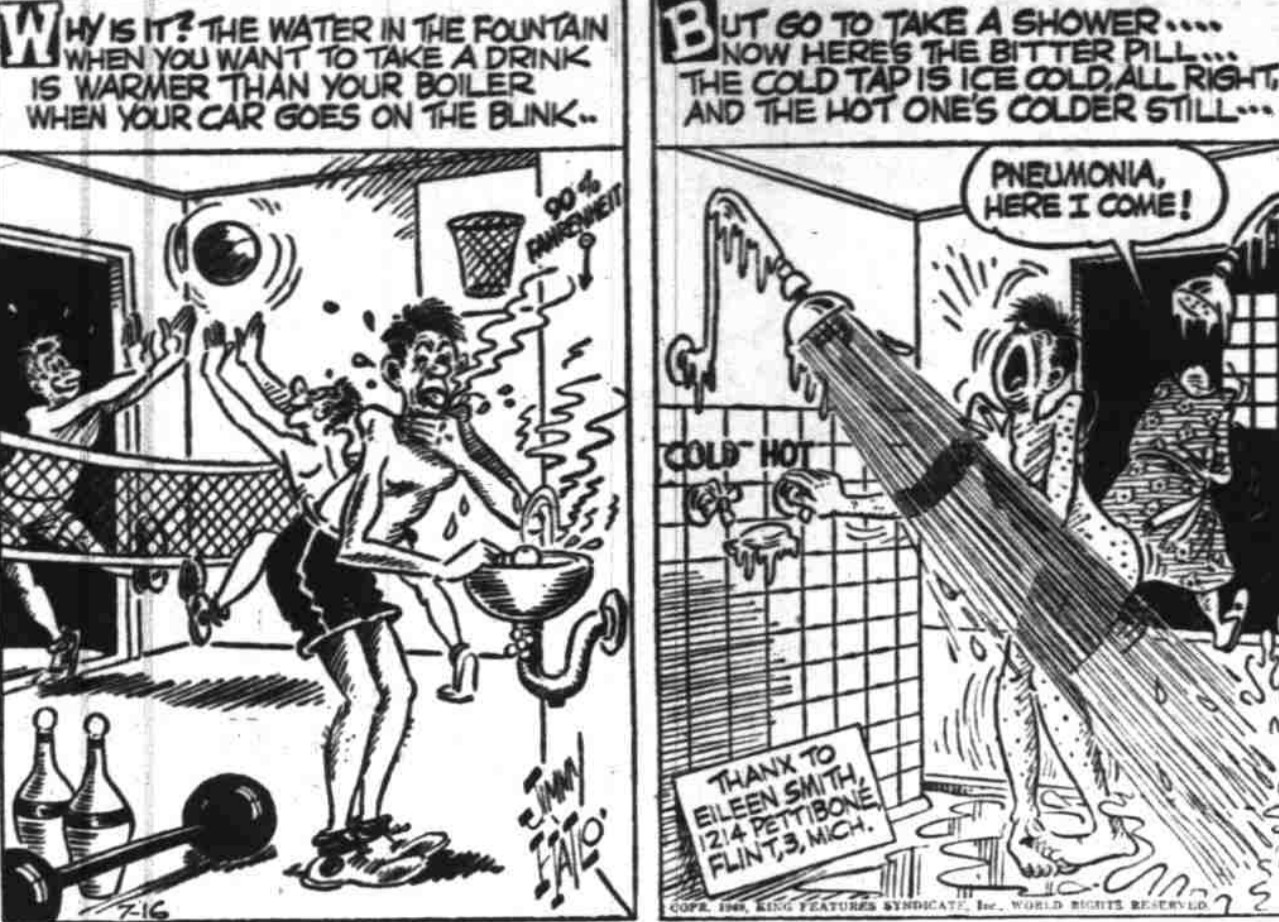
### Parker in Finals Of Clay Court Mix

CHICAGO, July 15.—(AP) The expected Pancho Gonzalez-Frankie Parker showdown for the National Clay Courts tennis title today was half in the making as Parker bounced into the finals with his hardest-earned victory of the tournament.  
 Parker, five times winner of this meet and second seeded, had to get down to real business for a 4-3, 7-5, 6-3 semi-final round triumph over Herbert Flam, former National Junior champion from Beverly Hills, Calif.  
 The other semi-final match—between top-seeded and defending champion Gonzalez and third-seeded Vic Seixas of Philadelphia—will be played tomorrow. The championship battle will be Sunday.

### Palistinian Tries Butler Handicap

NEW YORK, July 15.—(AP) Isidore Bieber's Palestinian, one of the nation's leading three-year-olds, tackles 10 older horses tomorrow in the \$50,000-added Butler handicap, at a mile and three-sixteenths.  
 In 14 previous Butlers, only one three-year-old—Lovely Night in 1939—ever took first money.  
 One of the rough customers Palestinian will face is Mrs. Deering Howe's Donor, winner of last year's Butler. Donor made his in-its start of 1949 last week, and won easily. He will pack 120 pounds including Jockey Job Jesson, while Palestinian has 114.

### Sam Snead's Double 67 Paces Dapper Dan Open

PITTSBURGH, July 15.—(AP) Sammy Snead shrugged off a storm and a bad hole today to shoot his second straight 67 and take the lead in the \$16,500 Dapper Dan Open golf tournament.  
 Snead's total of 134 for 36 holes put him three strokes ahead of Dick Metz of Virginia Beach, Va., who also had a 67 today.  
 That 67 is five under par for the 6,850-yard Alcoma Golf club course, where par is 36-36-72.  
 Delayed by a driving rainstorm, Snead needed five strokes on the par three, 250-yard second hole, but from there on he played virtually perfect golf.  
 Playing on a course made to order for his long-hitting game, the White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Clouter bounced back after that one bad hole to reach the turn in 34, two under-par.  
 Except for the delay, the weather didn't trouble the leaders. Bobby Cruickshank, little Pittsburgh veteran, had a hole in one on the same hole where Snead had his only trouble. Metz covered the short back nine in 31 for his 67 after a first-round 71.  
 Gene Webb, of Clayton, Mo., also had a 67 today to enter a three-way tie for third place at 138. Deadlocked with him were Dapper Lloyd Mangrum of Chicago, who finished in the rain for a 71, and Otto Greiner of Baltimore, who came in with 70.
